It was a cold and stormy night when business owners from Selkirk, St. Clements, St. Andrews and West St. Paul gathered for the Selkirk Biz's 122nd annual general meeting (AGM) last week. Along with the passing of the torch to the next round of board members, important discussions were had about priorities and what direction The Biz will be taking now that businesses are finally seeing the effects of the pandemic settle.

Selkirk Biz President Brett Mitchell called the meeting to order and adopted the meeting minutes from the last AGM before delivering the president's report.

"We're certainly not what we were back in 2018 and 2019. The world is certainly a different place and we're all having to try to get used to it. In

2023, it was a busy year for our organization," said Mitchell.

The Selkirk Biz is the name of the Chamber of Commerce organization that represents and connects business owners in Selkirk, St. Clements, St. Andrews and West St. Paul. The organization was founded as The Board of Trade of the Town of Selkirk in 1901 and though they have expanded as well as had a few name changes in their history, The Biz has been a continuously running local group for well over 100 years.

One of the biggest changes in the past year for the organization is the addition of Alice Skalesky as executive director replacing her mother Sheri Skalesky who previously held the position for many years.

After welcoming Skalesky to the group, Mitchell acknowledged some

of the high points of the year for the organization which included a complete revamp to their website and the Selkirk Parade, which the Selkirk Biz is the host of, coming back as an annual event as the pandemic cancelled such activities in previous years.

"The crowd was phenomenal and it went off without a hitch. Everyone who went had a good time there [were 42 floats]. It was an awesome event," said Mitchell.

He also acknowledged the hard work of Jim Pelletier this past year as volunteer coordinator mentioning his success in gaining volunteers which made events run smoother and more safely.

"We also had our first Biz Awards in three years. That was a fantastic occasion," said Mitchell, "It was so great to be able to get back together again and celebrate our business community."

Alice Skalesky then spoke briefly about the Biz's financials including their Biz Bucks program. In addition to loans being paid off, the Biz Bucks

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program continues to grow.

"From what I've seen from records, we have been steadily increasing sales each year. So, that's awesome. We've just passed the \$2 million mark also, which is very exciting. We had over \$100,000 in Biz Bucks sales during the holiday season so that was a lot of work in December," she said.

The discussion continued with mention of the various events that The Biz plans to host this year.

Nomination and voting for board positions were next up on the agenda. The new board of the Selkirk Biz in 2024 will see Jim Pelletier taking on the president role once again, Wendy Meger as 1st vice president and Kerri Portree taking the 2nd vice president spot. Brett Mitchell will be assuming the role of past president. The Biz is still actively looking for volunteers willing to take on secretary and treasurer roles.

In addition to the election of its executive officers, The Selkirk Biz will see six people take on director positions. They are Shawn Trudeau, Colleen Allan, Kelly Cook, Josh Zanewich, Meaghan Chromy, and Brittany Hiebert. Appointed representatives include Starlene Mosienko of the Lord Selkirk School Division, Coun. Justin

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Fiebelkorn of the RM of St. Andrews, Coun. Rob Belanger of the RM of St. Clements, Mayor Peter Truijen of the RM of West St. Paul and Tim Feduniw of the City of Selkirk.

Incoming president Jim Pelletier then came to the podium to discuss his top four priorities for The Biz for the upcoming year.

"My main priorities obviously are shop local initiatives. One of them is the Biz Bucks program and then the other one is our Chamber Channel," said Pelletier.

The Biz Bucks program is a wellknown gift card program in our community run by the Selkirk Biz that has local businesses selling gift cards that can only be used at their locations or the locations of other partnering businesses in the community. This keeps dollars circulating in our local area.

The Chamber Channel is an online shopping platform that connects buyers with businesses in our community that they can shop from. It combines the convenience of shopping online with the knowledge that residents are supporting their local community and not a large national or international corporation. Though this initiative has been in its beginning stages for some time now, The Biz will focus on bringing more businesses and residents to the platform this year.

"[The Chamber Channel is] going to be talked about a lot, a lot of advertising will be coming out over the next few months to different businesses, as well as on social media, just to draw more attention to it first. Before we completely roll it out to the public, we want more businesses to be enrolled," said Pelletier.

Pelletier's third priority for 2024 is the growth of The Biz.

"My growth goal every year is five per cent, year over year," he said.

One of the ways mentioned that The Biz plans to get the word out to the community is that each community within its region will see an event hosted in its region.

The final priority that Pelletier discussed with the group was continuing to support the health and longevity of The Biz. Some points related to this discussion that were mentioned were the possible expansion of The Biz to include businesses in East St. Paul, connecting with chambers of commerce in neighbouring areas to find areas of mutual interest and to exchange ideas, and expanding the organization's connectivity with other organizations in our region.

The floor then was opened to discussion where thoughts were shared about The Biz's future. Business owners made suggestions about connecting to young people, getting back to basics, connecting with more small businesses as well as concentrating energy on a smaller number of highquality efforts.

After the lively discussion, the meeting ended on a positive note.

"It's going to be interesting times in 2024 and very exciting times in 2024,' said Pelletier.

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Region comes together to replace portable toilets destroyed by vandalism

An unfortunate incident happened over the weekend of Jan. 6-7 when portable toilets at the Warner Road access point to Lake Winnipeg were vandalized. These amenities were used by anglers in the area. Luckily the Manitoba Wildlife Federation seeing the benefit that these toilets bring to the community as well as the lake, is fundraising to replace the damaged facilities and add preventative measures to keep this resource available.

Allstar Toilet Rentals is the local business from Petersfield that rents the three portable toilet units to the RM of St. Andrews. They've been available for residents to use for the past five or six winters.

"We normally put them out around December 15 and keep them up until ice break up around about the end of March," said Allstar Toilet Rentals owner Cory Douglas.

Douglas says that vandalism and tip-overs are part of the business when it comes to toilet rentals and is something that they deal with on a normal basis but vandalism in this location has been a bit more than he would normally expect.

"This has been twice this year. [The

first incident took place] on Christmas day, my wife and I got a Facebook message that the toilets had been pushed into the ditch up there, which is abnormal," said Douglas.

After having his parent look after the kids, he and his wife, Kelley Douglas, got to Warner Road and saw that all three portable toilets had been pulled into the ditch.

"These were actually pushed quite far into the marsh by, I would assume an ATV or a truck or a side-by-side. We went up there and cleaned them up that time, there wasn't a lot of damage," said Douglas.

Unfortunately, that wasn't the story last week when he received a call from the RM letting him know that some concerned residents let them know the toilets had been destroyed.

"It looked like a vehicle had completely run through them. They were literally in shambles and pieces. All three toilets were not salvageable," explained Douglas.

As a business owner as well as a family who take their children fishing and use that location as a launch point to the lake, Douglas said he was disappointed.

toba Wildlife Federation also felt that having these portable toilets in this location was an important resource for our community.

"Our organization, the Manitoba Wildlife Federation, understands that this is a popular access point for many anglers that visit Lake Winnipeg. Having those outhouses there also helps keep the lake clean, because now people are not having to do their business out on the ice. They can come back and use the facilities. We're initially just looking at getting those outhouses reinstalled, as well as building some sort of barricades so that people can't come by and destroy them again. [This is] to show support to our angling community, because it is a huge, massive industry in the province here and a really good opportunity for families and friends and such to go out and enjoy a day of fishing," said Chris Benson, program and events coordinator for the Manitoba Wildlife Federation.

Benson explained that getting the portable toilets back in place was a no-brainer as the location is an incredibly popular access point. Over the course of three days during the winter of 2020, MWF ran traffic counters at this location and counted 2364 vehicles. These vehicles had an average of three people per vehicle for a total of 7092 people.

"When we heard about this vandalism, it's something that right away, we thought, 'Well, let's do something about it. Let's be proactive and get those back up there.' And, also, what are the ways that we can prevent this from happening again," he said.

The fundraising campaign for the upgraded barriers and toilets is being collected by the MWF. They will not be keeping any of the funds but just be a collection point to facilitate the donation.

Upon hearing that there were peo-

ple who were willing to help out by fundraising to prevent this sort of damage from happening again, Douglas was "beyond surprised".

"We've had vandalism over the years and smaller cases, nothing like this, but nobody's ever reached out and offered to donate. Just the fact that somebody cares about a small business and keeping the area clean was mind-boggling to me. We do have insurance and it does cover a portion of the toilets. I'd be willing to put those toilets up there within an hour if somebody said they'd be safe. If we can get some barriers put up just to keep them safe [that would be great] I mean dealing with vandalism is part of my job, but I can't deal with another total loss of three units. It's amazing, I couldn't believe we got so many calls. I'd be super happy to see if between the RM and the Manitoba Wild Federation, if they could put up some barriers and create a safe area for me to work and a clean and safe area for the amenities," said Douglas.

He thanks the community for their support and all of the positivity and messages that he's



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The local RCMP encourages any and all vandalism in our community to be reported to them and asks that people do their part as the eyes and ears in their communities.

"We all have a job to do when it comes to fighting crime in our communities. If something looks odd or strange, report it. If you notice people are not home and there is suspicious activity call it in. If your neighbour's house was on fire, would you call 911? Of course, you would.

"Even if it appears after the fact that something has happened to a building or property, call it in. What you see and report helps us track the person's responsible," said local RCMP Community Policing Officer, Paul Human.

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Understanding Dementia and Brain Health at the Gordon Howard Centre

Last week the Gordon Howard Centre hosted Samantha Holland, Regional Coordinator of the Interlake-Eastern region for the Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba. She presented information about Understanding Dementia and Brain Health. This discussion brought more knowledge to our community about the latest research with regard to dementia and the different forms of dementia that people may experience.

Holland opened the presentation by talking about her own connection to dementia. Having two grandparents who have been diagnosed with dementia she allows her experience to inform the work that she does on a daily basis.

"Dementia itself is not a disease, but a collection of symptoms that are caused by diseases of the brain," explained Hollard.

In her presentation, she discussed the four most common diseases associated with dementia. There are over 100 different diseases and mixes of diseases connected to dementia so many people's experiences differ.

"Alzheimer's disease, as I said, being the most common accounts for about two-thirds of all cases. So, when you hear people using the words dementia and Alzheimer's interchangeably, they are actually different. We can say that everyone with Alzheimer's disease has dementia, but not everyone with dementia has Alzheimer's disease," said Holland.

Alzheimer's disease has a progression of on average eight to ten years

between when we notice symptoms and the time of the patient's death though there is a large amount of variation from person to person. It has a more gradual presentation and though we are not sure why, it does present more often in women.

Another common type of dementia that was touched on was Lewy Body dementia. This is a dementia that's associated with Parkinson's disease and affects both men and women roughly evenly.

"You might see more changes relating to a person's movement, their behaviour and how they change in potentially experiencing hallucinations, whether that's auditory or visual [with Lewy Body dementia]," said Holland.

Frontotemporal dementia is a bit on the rare side and can affect younger people in their 40s and 50s even in their 30s. As the name suggests this disease affects the frontal and temporal lobes of the brain and has corresponding effects.

"[Frontotemporal dementia] really manifests in personality and behaviour changes. So, things that are really uncharacteristic for the person and because it can happen in the younger years, it might happen when the person is still working or has children at home. Maybe they're making financial decisions that wouldn't have been normal for them in the past. This might also be [an instance when a] person loses their filter in social situations," she said.

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Strong connection between donors, recipients and a thriving community

If you've ever wondered what the connection is between donors to the Selkirk & District Community Foundation and non-profits who receive their gift, there's a quick answer - the connection is strong.

In December, the Foundation connected 20 organizations with grants totalling \$131,760. It's an incredible infusion of life into the community and it allows so many groups to do so many good things.

Some of the grant money went to the Clandeboye Pipe Band who will now be able to sound better than ever with the new chanters they'll purchase. The chanter is the part of the bagpipe that allows the player to create the melody - it has holes that you cover with your fingers to make different notes and looks a bit like a recorder.

"We're going to improve the sound of the band with matching chanters so that all of the pipers sound alike," said Band President Gary Alexander.

"It's kind of important. A lot of us play different types of bagpipes and to have matching chanters makes the band sound better and makes it easier for the people in charge to tune the pipes."

For Shauna Curtin, SDCF Chair, the grant to the Pipe Band demonstrates the wide range of groups who benefit from donors' gifts.

"I love this gift to the Clandeboye Pipe Band," Curtin said.

"Music is important, and especially this type of music that is so culturally significant. The Pipe Band is keeping heritage alive and connecting young and old with music that has stood the test of time. And it's donors who strengthen that connection and help make the Pipe Band better."

Alexander says the Pipe Band, which has been around for about five years and is a teaching band, features players who range in age from nine to 68. He laughs and points out that he's "the old guy", but wants everyone to

know that it doesn't matter how old you are, you can join and you can learn.

His own story is that he played the bagpipes when he was around 10 years old, but hadn't played for about 50 years before picking it up again. He's hoping others will come out and give it a try too.

"We're always looking to recruit," he said.

"We want new members and they can be any age."

If you want to learn more about the Pipe Band, they'll be part of the Robbie Burns celebration at the Clandeboye Hall on Jan. 27. You'll be able to take in their music, watch some highland dancers and of course sample the haggis.

Other groups that received grants include the East Selkirk Early Learning Centre, which, when all phases are open, will accommodate 74 kids. The Foundation grant will help furnish rooms in the new building.

The Selkirk & District Curling Club received a grant that helped pay for a new ice plant after the compressor in the old one crashed last year. The Riverside Grill is working towards reopening in the future and a Foundation grant will allow them to put in a new air exchange unit.

The Foundation is able to provide these important grants because of generous donors. In November the annual Endow Manitoba Giving Challenge saw 174 donors, over seven days, donate \$88,245 to the SDCF. This brings us back to that connection between donors and recipients – it's a strong connection.

The final type of dementia discussed was vascular dementia. In this type of dementia, cardiovascular occurrences like strokes can cause sudden drops in function.

"You might see drastic changes and then a stabilization or a plateau over time. Then another stroke occurs, and another drop in functioning. So, it kind of goes along in that stepwise fashion," said Holland.

She reassured residents with questions that not everyone who experiences a stroke has vascular dementia.

She also explained that it's a myth that memory loss is the first sign of dementia. Dementia occurs when daily life is affected and because there are many different signs can be different depending on the person and the cause. Some signs to look out for include:

changes in cognitive abilities including changes in judgment or decisionmaking or problems with abstract thinking

- changes in communication
- trouble completing things that they've done for most of their life
- putting things in inappropriate places
- changes in emotion, mood and

behaviour • apathy

Holland explained that most diseases that cause dementia don't have a genetic link, however, some conditions that increase the odds of getting dementia can be genetically linked like diabetes or increased blood pressure.

She then went through a list of modifiable and non-modifiable risk factors for dementia. She said that people should be reassured that the list of non-modifiable factors is much smaller than modifiable factors.

Non-modifiable factors can include age, gender, family history, and a gene called the Apo E4 gene which, though most cases aren't genetically linked, is a genetic factor that increases risk

Modifiable dementia risk factors include things like hypertension, diabetes, smoking, obesity, physical inactivity, high alcohol consumption, and hearing loss.

"If there's one takeaway, it's the fact that what's good for your heart is good for your brain. So, if you can think of a heart-healthy diet, it's going to be working twofold for you," said Holland.

Another thing that residents can consider when it comes to lowering their

risk of encountering dementia in their lives is increasing their protective factors. These include doing things that challenge us such as learning a new activity or increasing the difficulty of a current one, being socially active, making healthy food choices like following a diet recommended for reduction of risk, being physically active, reducing stress, managing cardiovascular risk and protecting your head from getting hurt.

"No single test can tell if a person has Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. There's not one way to diagnose it, but I would say the first step is to talk with your family doctor," said Holland.

She does, however, acknowledge that many doctors are retiring so that can be difficult for some people to navigate, also some doctors may not understand the severity of symptoms even when you go to them.

Holland recommends continuing to advocate for yourself and your loved ones. Another avenue to diagnosis could be through a community assessment program. Our community assessment program is the mental health team.

If you or someone you know has dementia the Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba has many programs that can help. They provide supportive

counselling for people with dementia and their care partners, family education, programs like Minds in Motion, and public awareness sessions. To learn more about dementia and the services that are offered through the Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba visit their website at https://alzheimer. mb.ca/.

UKKO Robotics doing big things in agricultural world

Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes' Ukkö Robotics is receiving a \$100,000 grant from the Manitoba government to better its innovative company as part of the Innovation Growth Program (IGP).

The Innovation Growth Program (IGP) is there to help commercialize their products and grow their business as the program provides cost-shared grants of up to \$100,000 to eligible Manitoba small and medium-sized enterprises to assist with the commercialization of innovative products or processes and accelerate growth.

Ukkö Robotics owners Daniel Badiou and Katrina Jean-LaFlamme are receiving the \$100,000 to commercialize their mobile monitored livestock shades and poultry micro barns that can move autonomously in pasture settings.

Badiou and Jean-LaFlamme were thrilled to learn that they have successfully secured the Innovation Growth Program from the Province of Manitoba.

"Ukkö Robotics specializes in automating the return of livestock to pasture," said Daniel Badiou. "Given the nature of our work, extensive research and development efforts are invested in creating new products for our farmer customers. Utilizing the grant to offset some of these costs will expedite the introduction of new products to the market."

Raised on a dairy farm near Notre-Dame-des-Lourdes, Badiou developed an unparalleled knowledge of agricultural machinery and animal farming from an early age. He continuously strived to learn more about the mechanical operation of agricultural machinery, finding solutions for problems and designing his own multi-purpose machines.

Badiou designed, developed and implemented an autonomous barn. He tested it on his own farm to better understand the needs of chicken farming and adapt his future machines.

Ukkö Robotics was launched in September 2016 with the goal of using technology to transform the traditional barn, making pasture-based farming more accessible. Partnering with

mechanical engineer Katrina Jean-Laflamme, Ukkö specializes in manufacturing an all-in-one autonomous barn that falls under the company's ROVA Series.

ROVA provides farmers and aspiring farmers with never-before-seen flexibility, allowing individuals to raise their animals on pasture while having the same benefits as most

high-tech barns.

In 2021, Ukkö Robotics first launched its flagship product, the ROVABARN PRO, and has since experienced exponential year-over-year growth.

"Our primary customers are farmers engaged in pastured poultry farming, aiming to scale their operations without increasing labour demands," said Badiou. "Our units reduce the labour required for raising true pastureraised poultry by 90 per cent. The ROVABARN autonomously moves birds to fresh pasture multiple times a day, handles automatic feeding and watering, provides automatic ventilation, and is solar-powered, with connectivity to smartphones. Our barns are operational across provinces in Canada and in certain states in the United States. Additionally, we are in the process of sending our first batch of units overseas this year."

Ukkö Robotics has much more in ern homesteaders, accommodating the works going forward as they are developing the capability of the ROV-ABARN to bring smaller livestock to pasture.

"In the near future, we plan to initiate testing for larger animals such as cattle and sheep. Furthermore, we are working on introducing a micro ROVBARN model designed for modup to 12 hens, which we anticipate will be popular on many farms and acreages.'

Excitement is building for when the top female curlers from across Manitoba arrive in Morden for the 2024 Morden Scotties Tournament of Hearts next week.

CurlManitoba executive director Craig Baker anticipates Morden will be putting on a great week for the curlers and fans alike.

"We expect to see a fair number of people, and I think part of what helps is there's one team that's fairly local," Epp said in reference to the Carman foursome skipped by Shaela Hayward.

The excitement built even further Monday when the volunteers came to pick up their clothing and materials, Epp noted.

"It will the first time that about 200 of us are all together, and I was really looking forward to it. It was exciting." And he paid tribute to the volunteers and other supporters who have really rallied to make the championship a success.

The third seed is CTRS #9 Jolene Campbell, who returns to the Manitoba Scotties after a disappointing first appearance a year ago with Chelsea Carey. She and teammate Rachel Erickson have joined forces with Abby Ackland and Sara Oliver, the other half of last year's finalist team.

The #4 and #5 seed positions go respectively to CTRS #14 Beth Peterson (Jenna Loder, Katherine Doerksen, Melissa Kurz, Kelsey Rocque) and CTRS #20 Kristy Watling (Laura Burtnyk, Emily Deschenes, Sarah Pyke). Peterson's Assiniboine Memorial team had a 5-3 record a year ago. Watling and her East St. Paul team won the Scotties berth bonspiel and a strong local bonspiel showing placed them at the top of the MCT rankings. Two other Manitoba teams, also ranked in the top three of the Cana-
