The Thomas Sill Foundation ceased operations in Dec of 2023 and has created endowment funds with several Manitoba community foundations including SDCF to continue its namesake's wishes.

The SDCF is a charitable organization that is built on endowments such that donations provide continuous

support for the communities of Selkirk, St. Andrews and St. Clement because the original fund stays intact and the interest is dispersed. This has allowed donations to go to many local organizations and groups

Barbara Knoll, treasurer of the SDCF, explained how without the Thomas Sill Foundation's generosity the SDCF may not have come to be.

"Thomas Sill lived in Winnipeg. He was a shrewd investor, and a great philanthropist. When he died in 1986, his will simply stated that he intended to create a charitable entity. His colleagues did not really expect the estate to be very large because he had given so much money away during his lifetime. It was [in fact in] excess of 30 million. His accounting firm, Sill Streuber Fisk, had offices in Winnipeg, Brandon, Selkirk, Morden, Winkler, and Altona and the first board members of the Thomas Sill Foundation were drawn from the accounting community," she said.

The Thomas Sill Foundation issued a challenge to communities in Manitoba in the form of a challenge grant program. Selkirk was one of the communities to take up the challenge and the beginnings of the SDCF were sparked.

The Thomas Sill Foundation provided \$2,500 for start-up costs for the Foundation and by 1999, the SDCF had received its \$100,000 grant from the Thomas Sill Foundation.

The Thomas Sill Foundation was not the only do-

nor back then, however, they did start a trend of generosity that has been taken up by many in our community.

Founding SDCF Board Member Bill Findlater and former Board Member and Treasurer Bill Bodman were also acknowledged at this event for their work working with the Thomas Sill Foundation in the early days of the SDCF.

Beverley Clegg, executive director of the SDCF then made the official announcement.

"Today's Chairperson Shauna Curtin, along with the entire SDCF team are thrilled, over the moon, to announce the establishment of the Thomas Sill Fund which is being created with a \$1.3 million donation," she said.

Clegg explained that this fund is an undesignated, named community fund. This means that future grants will assist in funding for the community's greatest needs.

Knoll and Clegg both thanked those who've worked hard over the years to make the SDCF what it is today.

"On behalf of the current board of directors, I would like to extend a sincere thank you to the founding members of the Foundation, to all who have volunteered their time and expertise over the past 20 years and to the Thomas Sill Foundation for providing the incentive and financial resources to create and support the Selkirk and District Community Foundation. If there had been no Thomas Sill Foundation,

would there be a Selkirk and District Community Foundation today?" said Knoll.



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Ice Fishing Village in Lockport now officially open

Many activities for non-anglers who also want to enjoy time on the river

Red River Cats and the members of the Lockport Community Development Group are able to welcome anglers and winter enthusiasts down to the river in Lockport again with the official opening of the Lockport Ice Fishing Village taking place last week.

'The ice fishing village is just that. It's a village that we make up and we make roadways on the Red River in Lockport. We clear them to give easy access for people to come down and take advantage of all the amenities that we put up down there," said Collin Stone, co-owner of Red River Cats and board member for the Lockport Community Development Group.

The Ice Fishing Village is an annual event in the community. Roads are created and cleared of snow on the ice so that residents can drive down with their vehicles.

"You don't need four-wheel drive vehicles or anything like that. You can bring your pop-up tents and icefish or you can bring your permanent shack and set them up in one of our cleared bays. [There are also incentives to come by and fish.] What we do is install street signs all the way along our main road along the river. Each one of those streets is a sponsor, so, for instance, A&W is a sponsor and they decided to name their road, Root Beer Road. When you catch a fish, and you take a picture under Root Beer Road, you get entered in to win a whole bunch of prizes that we have. It really is just something fun that we do here in Lockport and offered totally free of charge to the community," said Stone.

The idea for the village came about on one very snowy year a few seasons

"This was just an opportunity to say 'Hey, why don't we do this.' We can help promote all the amazing things and the great fishing here in Lockport and do it safely," said Stone.

The safety portion of this event is a high priority for organizers. As of last week, Stone says that ice thickness was measured at 16 to 18 inches. This means that it's safe for residents to drive onto with their vehicles. The ice thickness measurements are taken

several times a week and well before the ice gets too thin to drive on the ice fishing village is closed for the season. This is why the village is opened a little later this year than last because this year we have had a more mild winter and the ice took longer to freeze up.

This year with the understanding that people might want to try something on the ice other than fishing, the Ice Fishing Village has expanded its offerings.

"We're going to have a Crokicurl, which is like a crokinole game played with curling rocks. We have a skating rink. We have an ice-pickleball rink for people who want to put on a pair of skates and play ice-pickleball right on the ice. We have walking trails. There are snowmobile trails here. It really is going to be a neat village this year," said Stone.

The Ice Fishing Village is on the Red River going through Lockport. Because of this, people have to get on to the ice safely. The two access points onto the ice are now ready for visitors.

"One is through Red River Cats at 669 River Road. We have our boat launch that takes you right onto the ice. We actually make a roadway all the way down. It really is the best roadway and has the easiest access to get on the ice. But if you go up straight up Henderson Highway heading north, there's a little floodway road there that continues on and you can also access the ice through that way on the east side as well," said Stone.

He also reminds people that though the village is free and open to the community they should be prepared to bring their own ice fishing equipment which includes augers, fishing equipment and shacks/seating if you wish to have them.

Red River Cats does rent and sell equipment should your favourite lure be lost to a dastardly fish.

Stone says that so far this year the fishing in the area has been very promising.

"It's been pretty good. A lot of sauger, some burbot and some pickerel of course, are common fish that we catch here on the Red. Although you can

certainly catch the odd sturgeon and there's bass, of course, and goldeye that we also catch here and northern pike," he said.

He also wants potential new anglers to know that this is a friendly and welcoming space for them to come and see if fishing is for them.

"You can get into the sport really cost-effectively. A fishing rod and reel might cost you 25 bucks, and it doesn't cost you a whole lot of money to get into this sport. It really is accessible to the vast majority of people,"

Residents should also know that this is a free place to come and enjoy some time fishing and being outside, however, since there was a call from the community to be able to support this event there has been a Gofundme page set up should residents want to donate. Rounding out the top five seeds will be Fort Rouge's Braden Calvert (Corey Chambers, Kyle Kurz, Brendan Bilawka), Assiniboine Memorial's Jordon McDonald (Dallas Burgess, Elias Huminicki, Cam Olafson) and Assinboine Memorial's Brett Walter (JT Ryan, Graeme McFarlane, Hugh McFarlane).

The Interlake will also be represented by Winnipeg Beach's Justin Reynolds (Nick Weshnoweski, Josh Maisey, Sean Giesbrecht), who won a spot through the same regionals as Ede. Kyle Einarson is curling with Justin Richter, Jared Litke and Mitch Einarson and are representing Beausejour.

The Carman area has a pair of entries in the Viterra Championships as Carman's Dean North (Brad Wainikka, Rob Van Deynze, Mike Orchard) and Holland's Jeremy Sundell (Elliot Sundell, Paul Sundell, Thomas Huggart) each won a berth through the southern regionals event.

Full Event Passes for the championships are available for \$150 and Single Day Passes are \$50. They can be purchased here: https:// curlmanitoba.org/viterrachampionship/. Tickets can also be purchased in person (cash/debit/credit card) at the Club

There will be a "Quarry Patch" where fans can come out before and after games to socialize. It will be open from 9 a.m. to 1 a.m. from Wednesday to Saturday and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday.

At the "Quarry Patch," there will be

DJ music on a few of the nights, Neil Kitching performing on Thursday night, Grant Leutshaft on Friday night, and Grant Leutschaft/Bruce Jacobs performing on Saturday night. These musical performances will take place from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. each night.

The winner of the Viterra Championships will represent Manitoba at the 2024 Montana's Brier in Regina, Saskatchewan, from Mar. 1-10. This will be the first Brier under the sponsorship of Montana's BBQ & Bar, following the departure of Tim Hortons as a sponsor.

A total of eighteen teams will qualify for the 2024 Brier. The fourteen Canadian curling member associations will hold playdowns to determine who will represent their province or territory. Team Canada is represented by Newfoundland and Labrador's Brad Gushue, who won their second consecutive Brier championship at the 2023 Tim Hortons Brier.

In a change in the qualification format, the Brendan Bottcher of Alberta and Matt Dunstone rinks automatically pre-qualified for the 2024 Brier field based on their 2022-23 Canadian Team Ranking

Standings (CTRS), which meant they bypassed the provincial qualifiers. A fourth qualifying team will join the field as the top non-qualified team on the 2023-24 CTRS standings following all of the provincial and territorial playdowns.

The winning team at the Brier will ultimately represent Canada at the 2024 World Men's Curling Championship in Schaffhausen, Switzerland.













Manitoba Provincial Men's History

Provincial

From 1925 to 1958 teams played a straight knockout format. This was played in conjunction with the MCA Bonspiel. In some years as many as 64 teams qualified. Exceptions to this included 1930 to 1932 where the MCA Bonspiel Grand Aggregate Winner was declared Provincial Champion. In 1949 a round robin format was used with 12 teams. In 1959 the current format of a maximum of 32 teams was started, however if a team qualified twice, the numbers were reduced accordingly. In 1965, minimum 32 teams became the yearly number to compete. There have been various types of draws used to declare the champions over the years. In 1995, the 8 team qualifier was introduced and in 2003 the Final Four or Page Playoff was introduced. In 2021 there was no playdown because of the pandemic. Jason Gunnlaugson Team being last years champion was chosen to represent the province. In 2022 only 28 teams competed in a curling club due to restrictions

Canadian Men's

The idea of a national competition began in 1925, with the Manitoba Champion heading east to play a series of exhibition games against eastern teams. In 1927 the first Brier was held with 8 teams competing with only one team representing Western Canada. The teams played 14 ends against each of the other teams with no playoff unless the teams were tied for first place. In 1928, the games were shortened to 12 ends with 10 teams competing. In 1936, PEI and British Columbia were added and in 1951 Newfoundland/ Labrador, in 1975 The Territories were added. In 1977, games were shortened to 10 ends. There was no Brier held from 1943-1945. in 1979, the last Brier was held where no playoff games followed unless teams were tied. In 1980 the playoff format was changed to the first place team receiving a bye to the final and the second and third place teams playing a semi-final game to see who would advance to the final. In 1995, the Page Playoff format was adopted. In 2018, the event was expanded to 16 teams in two pools of 8 teams. A wildcard entry was added. In 2021, because of the pandemic the championship was expanded to 18 teams in two pools of nine. Two additional wildcard entries were added based on the ranking system, one of the wildcard teams was from Manitoba. In 2022, three additional wildcards were added. Two pools of 8 with top three playing down to four and page playoff final.

Men's

In 1959, the first world men's championship was held with teams from Canada and Scotland competing. In 1961, the USA joined as did Sweden until finally 10 teams qualified in 1973. The teams played a round robin followed by a straight knockout involving the top four teams with 1 vs 4 and 2 vs 3. There are now 12 teams that compete. In 2005, the Page Playoff format was adopted. The championship was not played in 2020.

Provincial Final

Since 2003 the Page Playoff has been used to determine the champion. In the 18 years of this playoff system, the winner of the 1 vs 2 game has gone on to win on 13 occasions. On 4 occasions the loser of the 1 vs 2 game has come back to win (2008 Burtnyk, 2010 and 2013 Stoughton, 2017 McEwen). Only once has the 3 vs 4 winner claimed the championship. (2012 Fowler).











































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


in the sitcom script you are about to write about them, obviously.)



Thank you to Gilbart Funeral Home for the prompt and personal attention they always provide for our family.


