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Ice Fishing program offers land-based learning for Indigenous children

Selkirk Onashiwin Aboriginal Head Start Program helps preserve traditional knowledge

A group of children and their families were out on the frozen Red River. Some kids are chasing each other, and some are building a snow fort. A few are snowshoeing, while others are roasting wieners and bannock over a

But the real reason they were there is to learn how to ice fish.

The Selkirk Onashiwin Aboriginal-

Head Start Program received funding through the Public Health Agency of Canada and Cabela's to put on a weekly ice fishing program, which started Jan. 9.

"Traditional knowledge has been lost, and we are trying to bring that back to families in order for them to embrace their cultural heritage," said program coordinator Kathy Duncan.

Thanks to the funding, the Head

Start Program has purchased supplies such as ice fishing shelters, portable heaters, fishing rods, an ice auger and other tools required for ice fishing.

"Our goal is to incorporate [a] landbased curriculum, providing and retaining culturally relevant education, which has the capacity of empowering our children by developing their own connections with the land and nature," Duncan said.

Two fishing facilitators, Trevor Rundle and Seth McMahon, helped launch and implement the weekly fishing program. Each week, they set up the fishing area by putting up the

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shelters, drilling holes, and getting the rods ready for when the kids ar-

Rundle's daughter and McMahon's sister went through the Head Start Program,

"With both having such a strong previous connection to Head Start, it feels like we have come full circle with their involvement back in the program," Duncan said.

Most of the kids taking part haven't been ice fishing before, so the facilitators show the kids fishing tips and

a hook. They also talk about what kind of fish are in the river. And, while in the shelters, people share stories.

"We want to instill a love of culture when it comes to fishing," Duncan said. "We want [the children] to be excited when they know it's a fishing day."

The Onashiwin Aboriginal Head Start Program is a school readiness program for Indigenous three and four-year-old children. The program is funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada and sponsored by the Selkirk Friendship Centre. There is no cost to families, besides putting in volunteer hours.

Onashiwin means to mentor and guide in Ojibway. Through the Head Start Program,

tricks, like how to bait children take part in cultural activities, such as Indigenous drumming, powwow lessons and fiddle lessons.

The families of the Head Start children have the opportunity to take part in activities as well, such as the fishing program.

Duncan said parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts and other family members have been joining the three and four-year-olds on the ice. The response from families has been posi-

"It's about the whole family and enjoying a good quality children's activity," she said.

Tracy Merkel, librarian at Ruth Hooker School is one of the educators involved with this and other I Love to Read Month activities this month. She says that thanks to a committed school community and committee, this month is packed with many extra reading activities for kids to enjoy.

"We have kindergarteners and

"[For the Bomber players' visit] We're going to read two stories, one

each for 15 minutes. We're going to have questions and answers after. It's pretty exciting for our community," said Merkel.

With all the fun, students will be enjoying many books this month, but it can't always be fun, sometimes the students need a serious challenge. That's where Aaron Hoium from No Frills has stepped in. He has issued a challenge to the students to fill the school's 'candy shop' with pictures of candies they get every time they read. If enough candies are earned to fill the shop then the students will get a sweet treat.

"For the younger ones, they can read books, and then for each book they fill in a paper candy, they colour in the spots on it. Then for the older kids, they can read for 10 minutes and then they can colour them in," said Merkel.

Volunteers gather supplies for 250 Easter baskets for kids

Initiative supports 'families and children in a time when they're not remembered'

A team of volunteers is spreading Easter cheer by putting together Easter baskets for children who might not otherwise receive them.

Tanya Pilat, who lives in West St. Paul, and other Discovery Toys representatives are collecting donations to provide more than 250 Easter baskets for children and families staying in Dignity House Inc., Ronald McDonald House and women's shelters in Manitoba, including Nova House in Selkirk.

"It's one of those things where we don't want [children] to be forgotten when other kids are receiving special treats and being celebrated and having those happy memories as a child," said Pilat.

This is a company-wide initiative for the toy company Discovery Toys. Throughout North America, representatives of Discovery Toys select charities that are meaningful to them and offer support through the Easter basket project.

"It's a way to help families and children in a time when they're not remembered, in a sense. Everyone thinks about children at Christmas, and they donate to lots of hampers, but there are other meaningful events that come around throughout the season and throughout the year," Pilat

"We need to celebrate [Christmas], but there are other moments when kids need to be kids and have those fun moments."

Each basket includes toys, treats and toiletries for children ages one to 16. Because the anticipated numbers of required baskets can change overnight, Pilat says her team gives extra items for emergency intakes as well as to help stock birthday cupboards at the charities.

Since the initiative started in 2015, Pilat said the volunteers have assembled more than 1,200 Easter baskets for charities in Manitoba.

"It's a lot of work, but it's such a blessing," she said. "We get those little notes from shelters after about how they've touched specifically someone. It's very meaningful to us."

Last year, Pilat's team received a letter from Dignity House, which provides transitional housing and a recovery program. One woman who was at Dignity House said that the Easter basket program allowed her to connect with her kids in a new way.

"She was so excited to be able to bring an Easter basket to her kids last year. It opened up a conversation, and they had an hour-long dialogue and interaction with the kids," Pilat said. "You hear those stories, and it makes you realize how meaningful such a small act of kindness is.'

WHO declares COVID an ongoing public health emergency

Ten more people in Manitoba died from COVID, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for the period Jan. 22-28 (reporting Week 4). There were 15 deaths reported the previous week.

There were 11 new hospitalizations for COVID in Week 4, with two people admitted to the intensive care unit. The previous week's report showed 10 new hospitalizations with four people admitted to the ICU.

There were 62 new cases of COVID reported in Week 4, a slight decrease from the 59 new cases reported the week before. Provincial data are an undercount of the true number of infections as the government restricts PCR testing and rapid antigen test results aren't tracked

Despite a decline in new COVID cases, the surveillance report says wastewater data for Winnipeg and Brandon show "sustained" activity.

The government no longer provides in its surveillance reports the names of hospitals and personal care homes experiencing COVID outbreaks.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,418 as of Jan. 21, according to the federal government's COVID webpage. Canada's death toll now stands at 50,380.

Influenza cases continue to decline. There were nine new cases of influenza A and one case of influenza B reported in Week 4. There were 10 new influenza A cases and zero influenza B reported the previous week.

One person needed hospitalization for influenza in Week 4, but no deaths were reported. There were 18 new hospitalizations the previous week, along with two deaths.

There were 76 respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases reported in Week 4, down from the 105 reported the week before.

"The WHO Director-General concurs with the advice offered by the Committee regarding the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and determines that the event continues to constitute a public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC)," says the

The past eight weeks have seen over 170,000 new COVID-related deaths, underscoring the continuing threat the virus poses. Health-care systems are still under pressure and virus surveillance has dropped off.

"While the world is in a better position than it was during the peak of the Omicron transmission one year ago, more than 170,000 COVID-19-related deaths have been reported globally within the last eight weeks," says the statement. "In addition, surveillance and genetic sequencing have declined globally, making it more difficult to track known variants and detect new ones. Health systems are currently struggling with COVID-19 and caring for patients with influenza and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), health workforce shortages, and fatigued health workers."



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Wonderfully wintry Gimli Harbour Trail pulls visitors; surprise features coming

The Gimli Chamber of Commerce's Destination Brand Committee celebrated the opening of the Gimli Harbour Trail, which has already seen skaters and other winter sports fans take to the ice in droves to enjoy its twists and turns and Mother Nature's reasonable temperatures.

The roughly one-kilometre-long trail on Lake Winnipeg opened Jan. 15 and includes three ice rinks. The big rink has already been completed. A little rink and crokicurl (a hybrid game of curling and the board game Crokinole) rink are in the process of being built.

The ice trail, which is protected by the harbour's walls, snakes past berths, runs along the Namao research vessel that's moored in the harbour and includes a warm-up shack by the big rink and hay bales. It's part of the area's winter village, which encompasses all the entertainment offered on the lake. There are also land trails through quiet forests for skiers, snowshoers and hikers.

The chamber's Destination Brand committee chair Cheryl Buhler said the committee is partnering with the Gimli Community Development Corporation (CDC), the RM of Gimli, the Gimli Ice Festival committee and other stakeholders to bring the winter village and all it entails to Gimli.

"We all know Gimli is a wonderful place to spend the summer at the lake, as well as in the lake, and we want everyone to know it's an amazing allyear-round destination," said Buhler, who owns the Robin's Donuts coffee shop in town and is past co-chair of the chamber. "There's so much to see, experience and enjoy during the winter season on the lake that you simply don't want to miss. There's ice fishing day or night, skating on a lighted trail on one of the largest lakes in Canada, skiing on groomed trails, playing crokicurl, shopping at local boutiques and so much more."

The Destination Brand Committee creates tourism opportunities, helping to make Gimli a first-choice destination for visitors from across the province and beyond.

An ice road from Goldfield Drive by the library leads out to the fish huts (fiski kofi in Icelandic) on the lake and includes several culs-de sac so that you can find the "perfect icefishing neighborhood," said Buhler. There are plenty of huts for rent seven days a week, including heated overnight fishing campers available from Stringer Rentals.

Visitors enjoying ice and snow sports in Gimli have plenty of restaurants and coffee shops to choose from when they get the nibbles, and boutiques and other stores for those seeking a little retail therapy.

Going forward, Buhler said there will be a number of "reveals" springing up along the skating trail and near the harbour. The top fun features are top secret for now, but they're guaranteed to brighten up and entertain visitors.

"Every week we're going to unveil different features," she said.

The Gimli CDC and the Gimli Ice Festival will be helping maintain the ice trails and the rinks.



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

Stony Mountain ice tower a sight to see

It's a bird. It's a plane. It's an ice

Located two miles east of Stony Mountain, the ice tower is a new take on a traditional rock climb. This winter, the tower is bigger and better than

In early winter 2022, with the help of friends who were also climbers, Ryan Munro put up two hydro poles, then he started flooding water over it once temperatures were -20 C and below.

This was critical, as if you flood over

In previous years, the Munro family had a 22-foot-tall tower in their backyard with only two sides. This year, they got a good deal on hydro poles, so they decided to make it bigger and better by expanding to four sides. The 35-foot tower has three hydro poles in a triangle with 8-foot sections in between each pole. They flooded the

skating rink at the bottom.

front and back two sides so climbers could climb inside. People can climb any path up, even on the aretes. Each side is a different level of difficulty. Ice axes and crampons are attached

to your boots to climb up the ice tower. They are like spikes on the bottom that stick out the front to sink into the ice as you kick your feet in, to stand up as you climb.

The climber wears a harness attached to a rope that goes through anchors at the top. The other end is attached to the belayer's harness using a belay device on the ground that feeds the rope through so they can pull up the rope as the climber climbs

when it's warmer, you just get a giant to make the fall safe, and not so long if they were to fall. Many safety checks are involved, and you must trust your partner before climbing on.

> There are various boots and harnesses in women's and men's sizes to use on location.

> The ice climb is not open to the public. Ryan and his wife, Brittany Munro, are very involved in rock climbing outside in the spring and fall, so the ice climb is a way to keep up their endurance training for the warmer months. However, with the magnitude of the climb, it's not an activity meant for everyone.

> The climb can be quite physically demanding for beginners, but it is fun, said Brittany Munro.

> Aside from the couple, they have only had others climb the tower who understand the risks and have previous climbing experience.

> The ice climb is free of charge to try. Anyone can view it anytime from the road. Those interested in trying the ice tower climb can reach out to Brittany at brittany.munro39@gmail.com.

There was a time when folks lined up to see the latest movie playing at the Garry Theatre and those lines returned recently when the city engaged the public to hear what they want the storied theatre's future to be.

Some of the lines were actual, with people at the theatre for the open houses during Holiday Alley and some were virtual, with online completion of surveys, but either way, you made it clear the Garry is important to you.

"We were thrilled with the response rate, the impressive number of people who completed the survey," said Jeff Palmer, a community planner with Urban Systems, part of the team responsible for developing the Garry's business plan.

"The City of Selkirk did a great job with promoting everything and the take up of people in the community responding was through the roof and really positive."

The city purchased the Garry Theatre in 2021 with the intention of it becoming a community-run space.

Small single screen theatres have become increasingly unfeasible in recent years and countless numbers have closed their doors across the country. The Garry's previous owner, Landmark Cinemas, accepted that reality and shuttered the Garry, along with three others, in May 2020.

From Day 1 the city's intention was to gauge public opinion on possible future uses for the iconic movie house.

Selkirk CAO Duane Nicol said he has confidence that if there's a desire to reinvent the Garry Theatre, community members will come together with the gusto and enthusiasm needed to create something great.

"Running a theatre is outside of the city's scope of practice. We are truly living our mission statement here by acting as a 'catalyst for partnerships that enhance opportunity and quality of life for all citizens'. We're acting as a hub for the community to come together and envision and take ownership over this asset. What we've seen in our scan is that the most successful projects of this kind are the result of community leadership," said Nicol.

A total of 1,158 people took the survey and their response to the city purchasing the Garry was overwhelmingly positive. Palmer said they were more than pleased with the response, as they had only anticipated receiving

between 200 and 300 responses.

Palmer said when a survey moves such a high number of people to participate, it can mean one of two things.

"Usually it means that you feel very strongly about a project - either you love it or hate it. Most often in our line of work, it means you're really opposed to a project. But in this case, it was the complete opposite. It was overwhelming support," Palmer said.

"I don't recall hearing from anyone that they thought buying the theatre was a bad idea. There was very strong support for purchasing the theatre, regardless of what it becomes, so that's good. It was an ambitious move and so we applaud the city for taking that initiative."

Palmer and Urban System's Hillary Beattie even went to the Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School and brought students in Global Issues Teacher Kevin Lopuck's class into the fray - and they had plenty to say as well.

Vanessa Figus, marketing and communications coordinator with the city, said including young people in future plans is crucial.

"Not only did we engage the community in the form of a survey and the open house; we went to the high school and got the youth involved, because their opinion matters too," Figus said.

Students were also hired to help out at the open house.

Love for the theatre was revealed in the survey which asked respondents for their favourite memory of the Garry.

"Lots of people talked about spending time there with family and friends, popcorn and affordable movies, and it just shows how important the Garry Theatre is to people in Selkirk, which was great to see," Palmer said.

Sixty-two per cent of survey respondents were city residents, 31 per cent said they work in Selkirk, 30 per cent visit regularly and 16 per cent said

they used to call Selkirk home. Five per cent own a business and seven per cent checked the 'other' box.

Ellie Longbottom, Selkirk's culture coordinator, said the non-resident response to the survey showed the reach the theatre has.

"The respondents weren't all from Selkirk," Longbottom said.

"They were people who work in Selkirk, who visit here regularly. People from surrounding communities took an interest in doing this survey as well, because Selkirk is a hub, and those people feel the Garry is important too."

The survey revealed that the top three most desired events to be hosted at the theatre were – movies, musical concerts and theatrical performances. The top three amenities were – a stage, licenced bar and dance room/ coffee shop.

Beattie said. among the impressive numbers gleaned from the survey, was the percentage of respondents who were willing to help out at the theatre.

"It was great to see how many people who responded said that they would be willing to volunteer at the theatre in the future in some capacity," Beattie said.

"Almost half of the respondents, 47 per cent, said they would be willing to volunteer either during construction or once the theatre is up and running. That was really remarkable to see.

Urban Systems will now determine the feasibility of all realistic survey suggestions and will present a draft business plan to the city this spring. A second round of public consultation will take place shortly after.

Nonstick cooking spray

3 cups halved cherry tomatoes

2 teaspoons olive oil

1 teaspoon minced garlic

1/2 teaspoon dried oregano or dried dill weed

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper, divided



Feta Roasted Salmon and Tomatoes

1 1/2 pounds salmon or halibut fillets, cut into four serving-size pieces

1 cup (4 ounces) crumbled feta cheese Preheat oven to 425 F. Line 18-by-13by-1-inch baking pan with foil. Lightly spray foil with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside.

In medium bowl, toss tomatoes, olive oil, garlic, oregano or dill weed, salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

Place fish pieces, skin side down, on one side of prepared pan. Sprinkle with remaining pepper. Lightly press feta cheese on top of fish. Pour tomato mixture on other side of prepared pan. Bake, uncovered, 12-15 minutes, or until fish flakes easily with fork.

Place salmon on serving plates. Spoon tomato mixture over top.

15-Minute Weeknight Pasta

1/2 cup smoked provolone cheese, shredded

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley (optional)

Parmesan cheese (optional)

Bring water to rolling boil and prepare pasta according to package directions for al dente texture, reserving 1 cup pasta water.

In large skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Stir in onions, carrots and sweet bell peppers. Saute vegetables about 5 minutes, or until they brighten in color and begin to soften. Add tomatoes, salt, pepper and garlic. Cook and stir 1 minute to allow tomatoes to release juices.

Pour reserved pasta water into skillet, stirring well. Bring sauce to boil. Reduce heat to medium-low and simmer 3 minutes. Taste sauce and adjust seasonings, as desired.

Transfer drained pasta to skillet along with lemon zest and smoked provolone cheese, tossing well to coat. Serve immediately with fresh parsley and Parmesan cheese, if desired.

Ask the Money Lady

Dear Money Lady: I have life insurance and I was considering getting disability and critical illness insurance too. It's a lot more expensive, and I don't know whether I should spend the money on it. I'm self-employed. What do you think? Doug

That's a great question Doug – and my answer is a resounding Yes! I want to share with you a story about a long-time client of mine who was gracious enough to allow me to share it with you. Once you read it, you will see why any type of personal insurance is never quite enough, especially when you are self-employed. Today, income protection (disability insurance) is often overlooked and considered too costly by most Canadians, who often feel they have sufficient insurance with their employer. Instead, most people concentrate on life insurance only; however, it is important to remember that 95 per cent of accidents do not result in a death and you are more apt to be badly hurt, disabled or in some way unable to continuing working as you did before.

The story begins with a past client of mine, (we will call him Dr. X) that had a very successful dental practice and after discussing his situation agreed to purchase a guaranteed renewable disability income policy that would give him income protection for his business. Dr. X would always call me and complain about the payments but knew that he had to protect his business income since he was the primary breadwinner in the family. He had four girls and a wife that did not work. Dr. X had a big Honda Goldwing motorcycle that he rode in the summers and decided to join a friend by taking a motorcycle driving course at a local college. The friend was a new driver and was not yet licensed. This course apparently had something for all – promising to provide new driving techniques for already licensed drivers, like Dr. X. So, the two men went to the course one Saturday, however they were not allowed to use their own motorcycles. The school provided learning bikes and Dr. X was given a dirt bike. Well, let's just say that didn't work out well. Dr. X flipped the bike and was badly hurt. He broke four fingers on his right hand and shattered his elbow, ulna, and wrist. With no use of his right hand or arm, Dr. X was forced into retirement at age 51 and thanks to his disability insurance could expect a tax exempted monthly income of \$18,600 until he

The moral of the story is that you never know what will happen in

the future and unfortunately, no one is immune to career change or failure, personal accidents, or financial ruin. Things just happen. Life has a way of taking us on a rollercoaster ride of ups and downs and insurance is there for the "what if's" that we hope never actually materialize. Insurance is costly and I know most Canadians will often make excuses to avoid the added expenses to their already tight budgeted lifestyle. But maybe we shouldn't be so quick to decline it. Those people that live paycheque to paycheque nowadays are especially vulnerable, and could be placed is a very comprising position if they were severely hurt and could not work again. Planning for your future must include planning for possible unexpected events. I know that insurance is expensive however, I have yet to come across someone who got an insurance payout, and said: "I got too much insurance money – take some back." On the contrary, after something happens, they always wish they had more.

Here is an insurance stat to leave you with: one third of Canadians aged 35 or older will suffer a disability lasting at least 6 months before they reach 65. Of those who suffer a disability between age 35 and 65, 50% of them will have the disability for 5 years or more and 30% will be disabled for life. If you want to consider critical illness insurance, remember 2.4 million Canadians are diagnosed with a critical illness every year. Here are the stats: cancer affects 2 out of every 5 people in Canada, 97,000 Canadians will have a heart attack or stroke every year and 58% of critical illness claims come from men with a median age of 54. Remember, it is your responsibility to protect yourself and your family.
