

LSRCSS's 2023 valedictorian talks of growth and the benefits of failure

Jackson Doak speaks about what high school was like for 2023 grads

Starting their first year at Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School as part-time online learning students made the class of 2023's high school experience very unique. Jackson Doak, valedictorian of this year's graduating class reflects on what school was like for him and

"[Going to LSRCSS] was definitely a huge change from what I was used. Growing up in Lockport, in St. Andrews, I went to Lockport School, which is a smaller school and [doesn't have a lot of kids. Then coming here, it was way different because there's


[way more] kids walking the halls," said Doak.

Doak will be in for a change again next year as he pursues an engineering degree at the University of Manitoba. Now that he's reached the end of his high school learning, he's taken time to reflect on his time at LSRCSS.

He says his favourite part of high school was the additional options it gave him in school. Being able to walk from class to class and learn from different teachers was part of the experience that he enjoyed.

At the same time, in his valedictori-

an speech, he reflected on his grade's first year at the Comp as being very affected by COVID.

"There was only ever half the total student body at the school on a given day, and even then, we could only see half of their faces. On the days when you weren't physically at school, we were on a teams call in bed. Not really a true high school experience if you ask me," he said.

Doak said that the real fun began in the class's grade 11 and 12 years which were more typical.

"We were finally able to see all of our friends again, enjoy our classes without having to be 6 feet apart, and could take part in school events like sports games, drama productions and rallies. We could finally do things together as a school. The royals pride we all felt when cheering on our friends as they strode towards their accomplishments was incredible. It was a sense of togetherness, not only as a school but as people. Something we so desperately needed after such isolation." said Doak.

isolation," said Doak.

Overall he believes that the experience helped the class learn to bounce back from adversity.

"Our last year of middle school cut off about halfway through so we got thrown into the deep end for high school and then we had to persevere through that. But I think it all turned out well. I think we're very resilient," he said.

Doak said that something that stands out about LSRCSS for him is the teachers.

"I find that the teachers really want

to get to know you. They're very personable with [me and my] fellow students. I have pretty good relationships with all the teachers I've had," he said.

In his valedictorian speech, he told his fellow students not to be afraid of failure.

"We should never be scared of failing because it's a win-win situation. You either succeed in what you're doing, or you gain valuable experience. Whether it's talking to someone whom you're too scared to talk to, returning to school as a mature student, or speaking your mind when you're fearful you're wrong, always throw yourself out there. Never let yourself become paralyzed by the thought of failing because you'll succeed a lot more often than you think," he said.


His advice to next year's upcoming high school students is to try new

things.

"Take the classes you want to take and take as many as you can, because it's free right now. You'll have to pay for it later. Don't take too many spares and just have fun," said Doak.

He left the class of 2023 with a quote from his favourite Chinese philosopher, Confucius.

""Our greatest glory is not in never failing, but in rising every time we fall.' I know for a fact, that if we adopt this mindset, regardless of what road life takes us down, no matter how windy and no matter how many potholes, we will succeed. We are all in this together, because at the end of the day, we are the class of 2023, and we can do anything," said Doak.

Three local schools get garden plots to teach students about growing

Three more local schools will be able to give their students the opportunity to learn more about growing their own food this year after a partnership between Communities in Bloom, Selkirk Home Hardware and The Flower Child helps fund new garden plots.

"We decided to launch a pilot to see how it would be received by the schools. What sparked the interest was that we had two grades from Robert Smith School that had plots at the water tower community gardens, and they really loved it," said Taylor Gyselinck, president of the Selkirk chapter of Communities in Bloom and owner of The Flower Child.

She says that the Robert Smith School students learned about different plants. At one point they had a pollinator plot and they have an annual vegetable plot which is planted with the vegetables that would be in a pizza. The students then have a pizza party to connect with what they were learning.

"I knew how much they loved it and I thought, 'Well, how could we bring this to other kids who aren't within walking distance of the community gardens?" Because so many schools aren't [close enough to walk over]. A

lot of schools, in their curriculum, do some growing but a lot of kids really still have no idea what you can grow here," said Gyselinck.

From there she reached out to the school division last year to get the ball rolling on some garden plots in Lord Selkirk School District Schools. In that first year of the program, Ruth Hooker School and Mapleton Schools received the materials to make their plots. This year they've donated plot materials to Daerwood School, École Selkirk Junior High, and Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary

"They're the same plots as at the community garden. They're four feet by eight feet. They're raised garden plots and they get all of the materials – a stain for the plots, they get the lumber, they get the screws, they get everything they need to build them," said Gyselinck.

The schools do fill their own plots with soil.

In addition to the garden plots, the schools from this year and previous years including Robert Smith School were able to send in a wish list of their desired plants and seeds to get them on their way.

Gyselinck feels that this project has

to expand in future years.

"[Speaking as the owner of the Flower Child], for me, this is my biggest donation I would say that I do every year. I really think it's important, especially now with produce in the grocery stores and how high everything is, for kids to learn about where food comes from. To learn they can grow their own food and to see the excitement on their faces when they see a tomato or a strawberry that they grew," said Gyselinck.

She feels that it's important from a young age for kids to learn that anyone can be a gardener and encourages people to give growing a try.

"It's not too late to start putting something in the ground. You can still try doing a couple of tomatoes in pots [that you purchase from a garden centre]. You can still seed a round of lettuce. You still have time to even seed carrots. It's never too late to try and

been a success and hopes to continue
I think for people who haven't tried starting small is always good. Anyone can be a gardener. There're all different ways you can garden whether you're in an apartment, and you have a balcony or you have a couple of pots with some fresh herbs, or you have a raised bed in your yard that you fill with just some cucumbers and some onions or you have an extensive, big in-ground garden," said Gyselinck.

West Nile virus mosquitos detected in West St. Paul this season

Precautions can be taken to reduce your risk of contracting virus

On June 30 the province of Manitoba issued a West Nile virus bulletin. Manitoba Health reports that Culex tarsalis mosquitoes carrying the West Nile virus (WNV) were collected from the Rural Municipality of West St. Paul during the week of June 18 to 24. This is the first mosquito pool that has tested positive in Manitoba this

The first positive pool was detected earlier than normal this year, likely due to warmer temperatures in southern Manitoba this spring and summer. There have only been three other times in the last 20 years where a positive mosquito pool was detected during this week.

A bulletin issued by the RM of West St. Paul on June 30 said that West St. Paul does not meet the Province's criteria for fogging at this time, and if and when the Province determines fogging is required in the RM, residents will be notified in advance. This is because the province monitors mosquito counts and determines if and when adult mosquito fogging is required in municipalities bordering the City of Winnipeg.

Larviciding, however, is already underway as The RM of West St. Paul, in partnership with the City of Winnipeg, began a West Nile Virus targeted Larviciding Program in the municipality on June 19.

Larviciding is the most effective and environmentally acceptable method of mosquito population reduction. Mosquito larvae are concentrated in water sites which makes them the most vulnerable stage of the mosquito lifecycle. By targeting larvae in standing water, countless numbers of mosquitoes are killed before they reach the flying adult, biting stage.

Biological larvicide VectoBac® is being applied where mosquito larvae are identified. This larvicide can be used in populated areas and is safe for humans and domestic animals.

All pesticide used and procedures applied are in accordance with federally approved label recommendations from the Pest Management Regulatory Agency, Health Canada and the recommendations set by Manitoba Conservation and Climate

The risk of WNV infection depends on various factors including time of year, number and location of infected Culex tarsalis mosquitoes, and the number of days with sufficient heat. The risk of exposure to WNV is currently low, but likely to increase in the coming weeks, as the highest risk period is historically in July and August. Manitobans are reminded that it takes just a single bite from an infected mosquito to contract WNV.

While most people who are infected will develop mild or no symptoms, some can develop severe symptoms that can result in hospital stays and even death. Recovery from WNV infection, particularly severe symptoms, can take months or years.

While Manitobans are encouraged to enjoy outdoor activities, it is critical to reduce the risk of mosquito bites and potential exposure to WNV by:

- reducing the amount of time spent outdoors during peak mosquito hours between dusk and dawn;
- using an appropriate mosquito repellent;
- wearing light-coloured, loosefitting clothing with long sleeves and pant legs;
- maintaining door and window screens; and
- cleaning and emptying yard items that collect water.

In 2022, there were seven cases of WNV in Manitoba, and five of those were hospitalized. No confirmed hu-

man cases of WNV have been identified in Manitoba yet this year.

Tickets are on sale for the Red River North Tourism 2023 Garden & Art Tour. The tour takes place Sunday, July 16 from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and features private gardens and other sites of interest in St. Andrews, St. Clements, and Selkirk.

In addition to seven beautiful private garden properties, public spaces on the tour include Red Feather Farm and Memorial Garden – honouring local World War I history. There horticultural guides will be available to discuss the plantings.

In addition, at the gardens at Kennedy House, an interpreter will lead Walk and Talk Tours at 1:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. sharing the life and historical significance of Captain William Kennedy. There is a heritage garden, spiral herb garden, and a secret garden to discover at The Rectory (St Andrews Heritage Centre) in St Andrews. Other stops on the tour include: the prairie habitat and multi-panel mural installation at the Gaynor Family Regional Library in Selkirk, and a visit to Prairie Originals in St Clements.

Artists will also be located throughout the gardens with works available for purchase.

In some locations musicians will entertain.

Tickets for the 2023 Self-Guided Tour are \$25. Guided VIP Bus Tour tickets are \$55 and seating is limited. The VIP Bus Tour includes free parking, lunch and tea with the Captain at the Marine Museum of Manitoba, a knowledgeable guide who will share the

East Beaches bounces and bursts into summer of 2023

July 1 brought people in droves to the East Beach-

The highways were bumper to bumper traffic. In Grand Marais, cars, trucks, motorcycles, and delivery vans were caught up in lines that stretched over two kilometers beyond the West gate of Grand Beach Park. Thousands were delayed in the hot sun along Highway 12 before heading on to the boardwalk and the gorgeous white sands of the Beach. A few dipped into Sandbar (the local pub) at the edge of the congestion to enjoy a pint and a foamcovered patio before heading on to join friends and family for Canada Day festivities.

At the Recreation Centre, a block from the congestion, families could find a pancake breakfast, two Canada Day Cakes, games, a silent auction and 50/50 draws in the cool of the community hall. Outside on the baseball field was a giant bouncy structure and the opportunity to play the competitive game of bubble soccer. Good fun on a fabulous summer day at the start of beach season.

As dark settled on the day – 10:30 p.m. to be precise - the sky ignited with fireworks. Manmade stars burst into the night sky. But not without considerable politics. A recent fire ban imposed by the RM of St. Clements was lifted just a day ahead of the planned explosions over the East Beaches and Grand Marais. Residents argued for and against the spectacular display, including an appropriate location for the event which in the end took place above the grounds of the Recreation Centre. Along the Lake, a few cottage residents and renters took advantage of the defunct fire ban to light up the Lake and neighbourhoods that line the eastern shores of Lake Winnipeg.

Across Canada, fireworks displays are being reconsidered. In Winnipeg, at the Forks, the formerly magnificent Canada Day fireworks display has been replaced by a plethora of drones which were arranged to honour Indigenous teachings as they hovered above the land and the people with the intent of creating a safe and spectacular display combining art and technology.

Likewise in other major cities – no more fireworks. Some pet owners, environmentalists and firefighters are truly delighted to forfeit the noise and threat of flames to landscapes and buildings.

Meanwhile, summer has been launched in East Beaches.

The Friday Market in Grand Marais and the Saturday Market in Victoria Beach were both on in full force with fabulous vegetable, fish, craft tables and food vendors with excellent goods for sale.

The ice cream on the boardwalk elsewhere was a welcome cool treat on a hot summer day. Indeed, summer has burst upon the East Beaches with more to come.

Stay tuned for the reopening of the Heritage Wing, Crusin'the Beaches Show & Shine, Summer Winds Festival, and for Beaches of 59 who are everywhere that there are Beach lovers, tourism and fun.

All this to follow in July and August.

Street where a male suspect entered a store, produced a knife, and demanded cash from the employee.



Environmental Licence for construction of solar glass plant in Selkirk approved

The behind the scenes work at Canadian Premium Sands (CPS) that will result in hundreds of jobs and hundreds of millions invested in the City of Selkirk is moving along nicely.

CPS has made significant progress, including securing its Environmental Licence to construct and operate its proposed patterned solar glass plant.

Tim Feduniw, the city's Director of Sustainable Economic Development, says there's been plenty of progress made on CPS's plan to build North America's only patterned solar glass manufacturing plant in Selkirk.

"We're moving closer and it's really exciting," Feduniw said.

"We continue to work closely with CPS and it's encouraging to see the progress they're making towards 300plus new jobs in the community combined with close to a billion-dollar capital investment."

The new plant will be located on 121-acres off Hwy. 9 in the city's original industrial park.

CAO Duane Nicol said the decision for CPS to locate here is akin to the arrival of the city's largest employer more than 100 years ago.

"This puts Selkirk on the map for the new green economy, and there's going to be spinoff industry that's going to come here, benefitting the city, bringing more jobs and more economic growth to the community," Nicol said.

"This will have a positive impact on Selkirk for generations to come. The location of the CPS solar glass manufacturing plant will be as impactful on our city as the mill was all those years

In May, CPS announced the appoint-

ment of Dana Partridge as Vice President of Glass Operations. Partridge brings significant glass manufacturing experience gained over a more than 20 year career across a variety of roles with Guardian Industries in glass plant operations.

During his time with Guardian Industries, Partridge had management oversight of multiple glass production facilities in the firm's U.S., Latin America and Asia-Pacific regions and he managed the construction, commissioning and staffing of a 500 tonne per day greenfield glass manufacturing facility in Saudi Arabia.

Following his career at Guardian Industries, Partridge contributed to the success of a number of manufacturing companies and is joining CPS from Tacoma Glass Manufacturing, in Burlington, Washington.

Partridge will work initially as a management consultant pending his relocation here.

Theresa Jester has joined CPS's board of directors. Jester has more than 40 years of experience as a corporate executive and board member in solar energy technology, engineering and hardware manufacturing organizations.

CPS has secured off-take agreements with three North American solar panel manufacturers for a combined total of 62 per cent of planned output capacity and an average renewable contract term of over 4 years. An offtake agreement is a legally binding agreement between two parties wherein a customer commits to buying all or a portion of a manufacturer's future production. These agreements include options to increase firm offtake volumes by an additional 15%

of planned output capacity to a combined total of 77%, subject to mutual agreement.

The finalized engineering and design of the Selkirk plant has been increased to 800 tonnes of output per day, up from the originally planned 500 tonnes per day, due to higherthan-expected demand.

"We are excited to have reached this important stage in the development of our integrated solar glass manufacturing project. With strong revenue visibility through binding commercial off-take agreements and a high degree of certainty with capital costs and operational performance through our EPC agreement we are confident in our ability to commercialize this high return project, supporting the global energy transition," said Glenn Leroux, CPS President and CEO.

"With our recent additions of industry expertise to the team, we look forward to a successful financing process that capitalizes our project and enables the delivery of our exciting business plan."

Statement from Manitoba's finance minister Cliff Cullen on Tax Freedom Day

For the second consecutive year, the Fraser Institute has named Manitoba the number one province for Tax Freedom Day, the day of the year when the average individual has earned enough money to pay their taxes. For 2023, Manitoba reached that day

on June 6, ahead of all other provinces.

Whether it is filling up the gas tank, buying groceries or cooling a home, the purchases Manitobans make daily are becoming more expensive. As Manitobans continue to face a rising cost of living, providing historic help to make life more affordable for Manitobans remains of critical importance to the Manitoba government.

Introduced in Budget 2023, new and enhanced tax measures will bring Manitoba's personal income taxes in line with other provinces. The changes in personal income tax will allow families to keep more of their income and will attract interprovincial migration to grow the economy.

Incremental savings from all tax breaks, school tax rebates and affordability payments from 2022 to 2024 will total more than \$1.8 billion. That is more than \$5,500 for an average two-income family.

A reduction to Manitoba Hydro fees will have a favourable effect on electricity rates and save ratepayers \$190 this year and more than \$4 billion over the next 20 years. Manitoba Hydro's rate application to the Public Utilities Board is now only an increase of

two per cent over each of the next two years compared to the proposed 3.5 per cent rate increase.

In addition, starting on July 1, Manitobans will see an increase in take-home pay on paycheques due to the largest ever enhancement to the basic personal amount to \$15,000. The savings to Manitoba taxpayers in 2023 will total \$311 million, with tax savings up to \$524 for individuals or up to \$1,048 for a two-income family compared to 2022.

In the last year, Manitoba's economy emerged faster and stronger than anyone could have anticipated. Over the last year, we have seen significant economic growth in our province and an influx of skilled immigration. We see tremendous opportunities ahead with continued improvement in our fiscal position as we work to create the right conditions for sustained economic growth.

Our government remains focused on maintaining a strong, sustainable fiscal foundation that will provide better services to all Manitobans. This includes investing in frontline services and lowering taxes to make life more affordable for Manitobans and more competitive for Manitoba businesses.

Make a list of your life achievements, personal strengths, and talents. Read this list every day.


Be kind to yourself. Leave past thoughts in the past and focus on new adventures. Focus on what you can do now and surround yourself with supportive, kind, and loving
