



Local girls break their record for number of monarchs raised this year

Sara and Hailey d'Auteuil help caterpillars make it to butterflies

Sisters Sara and Hailey d'Auteuil with their parents have been learning a lot about butterflies, endangered species preservation and creating an environment where all creatures have the space they need to thrive. The girls have once again raised monarch caterpillars into butterflies and this year they have had their best success so far with 19 butterflies having either grown up and left or being well on their way.

The sisters started this butterfly raising project six years ago when their mom, Kristy d'Auteuil, a teacher at Mapleton School brought home a milkweed plant.

"Monarch butterflies love laying their eggs on milkweed. So, when we saw that we could actually have some butterflies in our house and get the experience to actually raise them and see the butterflies fly away, Mom and Dad pretty much thought that that would be a fun experience. And when we did it, we had fun over the years," said Sara.

Sara is ten years old and Hailey is seven but will be eight very soon. Their mom said that she wanted to teach them about the butterfly's lifecycles and how to raise them.

"I like how they change into beautiful butterflies. Basically, they go from eggs to caterpillars to butterflies and then we let them go," said Hailey.

The sisters start their annual project by looking for caterpillars and bringing them to a little caterpillar

house which is made of a net with solid sides so that they are protected. They feed them every day and then when the time is right the caterpillars make their chrysalises and eventually emerge. The girls then wait for their wings to dry off before letting them out of the monarch house to go do what butterflies do.

"It actually feels nice [to hold a butterfly in your hands]. It kind of reminds me of holding a dragonfly too, because of their little claws. They're nice and friendly so when I hold them, I always feel safe with them instead of other bugs that bite that sometimes scare me," said Sara.

Kristy says that this year is a much better year for their monarchs than last year where they didn't manage to find any caterpillars. The most that they've had in previous years is 10 or so, so this year's total is wonderful.

"It's an endangered species and it's great to see them around. Even after we let them go, we see them," she

Kristy says that this is a pretty easy project if other parents also want a hands on activity for their kids this summer.

You'll need milkweed for the monarchs to lay their eggs on and to check for caterpillars. The caterpillars are quite distinctive because of their unique white, black and yellow colouring. You can then either buy a special house for them or make one out of a mesh food protector or mesh pop-up style laundry basket. The cat-

erpillars need to be fed fresh milkweed every day for the two weeks between when they hatch and when they make their chrysalis and then when they hatch as butterflies and have dried wings they are let go.

Kristy says that this is a very educational experience for kids and that they will continue to raise monarchs as long as they get caterpillars.

MB government offers free provincial park entry July 10 to 16

Don't miss Canada's Parks Day this weekend

The Manitoba government is once again offering free entry to all provincial parks for a full week in mid-July, including Canada's Parks Day weekend, Natural Resources and Northern Development Minister Greg Nesbitt announced July 4.

"For the third year in a row, our government is providing week-long free provincial park access to coincide with Canada's Parks Day," said Nesbitt. "This initiative allows all Manitobans to enjoy our parks' extraordinary natural beauty, intriguing historical sites and diverse recreational activities."

Vehicle permits will not be required to visit provincial parks from July 10 to 16. Overnight camping fees still apply, as do entrance fees to national parks. Manitoba's provincial park entry fees are among the lowest in Canada, this week-long offer and other free park access at various times throughout the year help ensure that cost is not a barrier, noted the minis-

The calendar of free interpretive events and experiences including guided hikes, historical tours and campfire talks, is available at https:// gov.mb.ca/nrnd/parks/educationand-interpretation/event-listings.

Several campgrounds have also organized special events to celebrate Canada's Parks Day on July 15. Visitors can check with the local campground office for details on any activities happening in the park.

Individuals who wish to camp in a provincial park can make a reservation through the Parks Reservation Service at www.manitobaparks.com or by calling 1-888-482-2267.

Tips for visitors and campers at Manitoba provincial parks include:

- check the Manitoba Parks website at www.manitobaparks.com for advisories before travelling;
- all campers must check in at campground offices upon arrival to receive camping permits;

- be 'Wildlife Smart' by maintaining a clean campsite, keeping all food, trash, toiletries and cooking utensils locked in a vehicle or trailer, and pack out trash and recyclables before leaving;
- keep all pets on leash; and
- keep all campfires in approved pits such as those found in campsites and check with the campground office for any campfire restrictions.

Campers are reminded that because the emerald ash borer has been confirmed in Winnipeg, no firewood can be transported outside the city. Transportation violations can result in charges and fines of up to \$1,300 for individuals or \$15,000 for businesses. Firewood is available for purchase from local retailers at most campgrounds.

Per parcel rates in a letter received by residents are: For MHK residents \$35,416.67 per parcel or \$3,447.72 per parcel levied annually for 20 years.

For ENB residents \$27,314.81 per parcel or \$2,659.03 per parcel levied annually for 20 years

I encourage all MHK and ENB residents to attend this meeting and inform West St. Paul council that these prices are not acceptable to rate payers. Alternate funding must be obtained to ensure that a significant lower cost is achieved.

Lower Fort Garry to host summer of educational and fun activities

Get your '20s groove on this summer

Lower Fort Garry has a long and interesting history being the location where the first of the Numbered Treaties was signed and a stronghold for the Hudson's Bay Company, to its current status as a historic site and education space. This summer there will be more to do than learn, however, as they host a bunch of fun activities with a little something for everyone to enjoy.

"The fort itself was built in the 1830s by the Hudson's Bay Company and it's been used for a number of things in Manitoba's history since. For example, [it was] our first penitentiary for many years. It was also a Motor Country Club and, alongside, the field was used as a golf course. But eventually, Parks Canada, took it over, and it was turned into a National Historic Site," said Ben Gillies vice-president of the Friends of Lower Fort Garry.

Today the Friends of Lower Fort Garry is a non-profit partner and the Fort is managed by Parks Canada.

You can go there and learn about Manitoba's history from trade to Indigenous history and more but there are also non-historical activities on of-

One of those activities is that every second Saturday they are offering yoga at the fort from 10 to 11 a.m.

"We've done that, in the past, it's gone over really well. It's been really, very well received. It gives people a chance to come out, [it's inclusive of] people who have different experience [levels] with yoga to be really accessible to everyone. It's very much a relaxing session meant to just help people enjoy the site," said Gillies.

The next session is on July 22.

They are also hosting an event to herald the return of the roaring 20s now that group activities are back in full swing. As the fort was a car club in the 1920s, they have plenty of history to draw inspiration from.

"It's called the Beep and Bop and will be a 1920's garden party," said

"Through the 1920s, people would

come out. You could go golfing. You could bring your car out and just have a really lovely time out in nature. And so, we want to bring that back by having this garden party. Basically, people will be able to come out, and we're going to have some swing dance lessons that people will be able to enjoy. We're going to have some live music, some bands that'll be performing jazz from the 1920s, 30s and 40s eras. You can take a dance lesson and then try [out what you've learned] with the live music. There'll be some period games that are out and we're going to have a fun take on horse racing, which was very popular back then as well as some really neat food that is of the period as well."

There will also, of course, be some vintage cars to check out.

Summer wouldn't be complete without some special activities for kids and this year the fort's Adventurers' Day Camp is back.

"It's a chance for the kids to come out to the site. They get to dress up in historic costumes. They get to be with other kids exploring the fort. They'll play a few things that are more historic games, but they're also doing a lot of crafts. They're doing sporting activities too and the staff who are working the event adore kids; they are oftentimes in education themselves. We're really trying to focus on how can we make this a really fun week for the kids," said Gillies.

Each camp is five days long and details and registration can be found on the Friends of Lower Fort Garry web-

In October, the fort will continue the fun with their ghost tours. With a site with such rich history, comes many stories to tell.

"There are a lot of stories of experiences that people have had at the historic site over the years, which makes sense given that it is hundreds of years old. And so we're going to be running those tours," said Gillies.

In the later part of the year, residents should also stay tuned for their holiday markets.



RMs close to Winnipeg advise residents to be aware after coyote attacks

Never feed coyotes or their prey like birds and rabbits

After two recent coyote attacks in the northern part of Winnipeg, both the RM of East St. Paul and the RM of West St. Paul have issued bulletins advising that residents be cautious.

The attacks that took place in Winnipeg were in the North Kildonan neighbourhood which is close to the northern border of the city.

These coyote attacks took place on June 24 and June 30.

Although experts advise that coyote attacks are extremely rare, one adult coyote has been located and humanely euthanized as part of efforts by the Manitoba Conservation Officer Service.

The Province is reminding people to take extra precautions especially

when outside with children and pets. Residents in East and West St. Paul are reminded to have their pets on leashes at all times when walking

Other things you can do to reduce the risk of conflict:

- Feed pets indoors.
- Neverfeed coyotes, either directly or by feeding coyote prey like birds and rabbits. Coyotes are attracted to food and food waste in yards, like fallen fruit, pet food, bird seed and garbage. Coyotes that have been fed by people are more comfortable approaching people and become increasingly aggressive.
- If you see a coyote, try hazing it by making noise or waving a jacket or bag in the air. Do what you can to appear large, if you are in a group, stay with the group and do not run as it may incite the coyote to chase you.

Summer flies by with mayflies and french fries at the East Beaches

Ok. French Fries are a matter of taste. We can choose to order them or not. However, any connoisseur of deepfried potatoes knows that the best way to have them is on a hot summer day leaning against an outdoor stand with the beach not far away. You can find french fries on the menu at most of the sixteen participating venues on the Dine Around 59 – explore – eat – vote promotion from July 7 to 21.

Now about those mayflies.

An entomologist or 'bug' specialist will explain that this seasonal insect is a close cousin to the lovely dragonflies that come and go throughout the summer and are responsible for eating those pesky mosquitoes. Dragonflies likewise offer this service as a matter of habit and without any thought to our subsequent comfort (such as it is). The dragonfly is always welcome but for most humans, the mayfly, known to Beachgoers as a fishfly, doesn't appear to have a purpose and in late June and early July they can be a pesky nuisance.

The entomologist will explain to you that the presence of the 'Mani-

toba fishfly' signals a healthy body of water.

In the East Beaches area, the fishfly has become a rite of summer and typically one can and should, expect the appearance of hordes of these creatures anywhere from mid-June until the August long weekend. They are encouraged when there is a combination of hot weather and rain.

Some fish fly facts:

These harmless little creatures begin their cycle in the early spring as eggs which drop and sink to the bottom of a freshwater breeding ground. Think - shoreline of Lake Winnipeg. Here they lie basking on the water until conditions are conducive to growth. Think - hot weather. Occasionally in Manitoba, the fish fly hatches first in May but is much more likely to be witnessed with a second birth season in mid-summer.

A female can produce anywhere from 4,000 to 8,000 eggs on the water's surface.

The average lifespan of a mayfly is only one or two days.

Many mayflies live for only two

hours. They spend most of their twoweek lifespan in the nymph stage.

They do not bite. They can't! The mouth of a mayfly is not present and its digestive system is filled with air. It is important to note that their only purpose in life is to mate.

Try to dwell on the positive. The fish flies are a vital food source for the walleye, perch, pike, sauger and other other water creatures popular with the commercial and recreational fishermen who frequent either fast or quiet Manitoba waters.

Besides being fish food, these little

winged creatures feast upon the algae which can also cause consternation for 'beach bums' here in cottage country. The fishfly is really very important in the aquatic food chain and those who detest their presence are missing the big picture. Fishflies in abundance is nature's promise of a healthy Lake Winnipeg.



150+ Organizations and individuals send open letter to province regarding Take Home Naloxone Program

On June 20, the Manitoba Harm Reduction Network, along with many other organizations and signatories, presented the provincial government with an open letter asking for greater responsiveness and transpar-

ency with regard to the Take Home Naloxone Program. This letter makes several clear demands, with specific recommendations in order for the program to increase its already proven successes in preventing drug poisoning deaths.

The open letter is also an invitation to collaborate with community-based organizations so that they, along with the province, can communicate expectations, experiences, and logistics in such a way that will address the pressing


need for greater access and stability within the program.

Tristan Dreilich, a Network Coordinator for the Manitoba Harm Network in Selkirk has said, "Naloxone is often the first line of defence, especially for folks in rural, remote, or northern communities, for responding to drug-poisonings. People who use drugs and our relatives in these communities depend on a consistent and reliable supply of Naloxone to keep people alive. Disruptions both in supply or communication around Naloxone supply are felt most deeply in these communities because of reduced healthcare service capacity the further we get from Winnipeg. We want to ensure our relatives have access to Naloxone when they need it,

where they need it."


In particular, the experiences of rural, remote, and northern communities must be prioritized during this collaboration as they experience the highest rate of drug poisonings by population, while frequently waiting the longest to receive their naloxone.



Selkirk going 'au naturel' on boulevards, in parks

The city is continuing to explore ways to naturalize areas where it makes sense to do so and is ensuring the eventual transition will go smoothly by testing small sections before making larger commitments.

Mihali Schindle, the city's Urban Forestry and Naturalization Coordinator, says four pilot projects this summer will inform future decisions on naturalizing boulevards, medians, and park spaces.

"Pilot projects help the city figure out what plants and cultivation methods work best in specific locations," Schindle said.

"Three of the projects will be cultivated in a row in Selkirk Park in the field across from the dog park and an additional plot will be added to the existing wildflower project on Main Street."

In Selkirk Park about 5,000 square feet will be used for wildflower meadow, tall grass prairie and organic sports turf test plots.

The wildflower meadow will consist of two plots and will be used to determine the viability of converting underutilized turf spaces into wildflower meadows that contain a mix of short prairie grasses and wildflowers that won't exceed three feet in height.

"These might be more desirable in park areas where we want to maintain a more clear line of sight, where we don't want plants that are six-feet tall, so along roadways in parks," Schindle said.

Two plots will be used for tall grass prairie to test the use of converting underutilized turfgrass into a tall grass and wildflower mix as well, but these will be taller and grow to about six feet in height.

Both the wildflower and tall grass require far less maintenance and reduce the amount of mowing and watering the city would have to do while dramatically increasing biodiversity and habitats for wildlife and pollinators.

The final park pilot project will be one plot that will utilize a mix of existing turfgrass, drought tolerant fescue grasses and micro clover for improving turf in outfields and also park areas where short turfgrass is required.

"The turfgrass project is to understand the viability for this type of plant community for improving outfields, and sports fields as well as park areas where we still want to maintain somewhat of a short turf grass aesthetic where people can walk on it and run around without damaging it," Schindle said.

The turf plot will also allow the city

to learn about using the mix on sports fields for a more environmentally friendly surface that reduces the need for irrigation and fertilizer.

"Sports turf does require cutting but the idea is to see if we can improve the quality of sports fields and turf areas where we still require foot traffic, without using fertilizers and pesticides to constantly maintain it and without having to remove everything that's there and start from scratch," Schindle said.

"We're looking at basically improving the turf grass that's already there with these other species as well as top dressing with soil. You could consider that organic, we're not using synthetic pesticides or fertilizers for that project.

"It's an overlap with sports field maintenance and naturalization. It's not pure naturalization but it still kind of overlaps on initiatives to cut back on using pesticides and fertilizer."

Finally, the city will add another wildflower test plot south of the existing one on north Main Street and will remove the existing turf grass and plant a mix of wildflowers, clover and salt-tolerant grasses from seed. The original wildflower plot was planted in the fall of 2020 and the second wildflower and clover plots were added last July.

"What we've noticed in the first plot as well as the clover plot is that some of those plants are really struggling with salt damage from the winter plowing. We want to try another plot and incorporate predominantly salt-tolerant grasses with a mix of the wildflowers to see how that will fair over winter and if it will be a bit more resilient than the first two projects," Schindle said.

"They've had their success but that is the one issue that we've noticed, some of the plants are dying off in the spring and we want to see if we can eliminate that."

Planting for the projects will begin soon.

What you should know about rabies

Now that summer is here, animal encounters might be more common during camping and cabin adventures.

It's important to be aware that rabies can be transmitted from animals to humans. The viral infection is most commonly transmitted through the saliva of an infected animal to fresh broken skin or a mucous membrane in the eye, nose or mouth.

Rabies attacks the nervous system, eventually affecting the brain, and it's usually fatal once symptoms appear.

According to the Provincial Rabies

Management Program, three positive animal cases were confirmed in Manitoba from January to March 2023. In 2022, there were a total of 15 confirmed animal cases. However, there

have been no reported human cases of rabies on record in Manitoba.

In Manitoba, skunks, bats and Arctic foxes in the north are the most com-

Personal care homes coming to the Interlake

Several personal care homes are coming to the Interlake area, including one in Stonewall.

On Friday, July 7, the provincial government announced that it would invest \$15 million towards the creation of six personal care homes (PCHs) with a total of about 670 beds.

One facility will be located in Stonewall with approximately 144 beds, as well as others in Arborg (60 beds), Lac du Bonnet (95 beds), Oakbank (96 beds), Winnipeg's Bridgewater area (143 beds) and Winnipeg's Portage Avenue (140 beds). The government chose these sites as areas with the highest needs.

"All six projects will be designed with a village or campus model integrated into other uses, depending on the needs as identified by their communities," said Scott Johnston, minister for Seniors and Long-term Care, during the announcement event at Niverville Heritage Centre.

"The village component will be unique to each respective PCH, and I will look forward to both physical and virtual components as most feasible for the community."

In addition, the provincial government will pilot a community supportive living program that will create a total of 288 spaces over two phases. The first phase of the pilot will be centred in the communities of Ashern/

Eriksdale, Selkirk, Swan River and Emerson-Franklin with a total of 105 spaces.

"It includes three different tiers of care to meet the varying degrees of chronic and complex needs for eligible older Manitobans, including those with dementia, to prevent premature PCH placement," Johnston said.

"In this new 'housing with supports' model, there will be 24-7 on-site staff for personal care home supports to meet scheduled and unscheduled care needs for residents, including nursing for residents that require more care."

There will also be onsite therapy and recreational supports, as well as access to other health-care profession-

"As much as possible, these spaces will be created in innovative campus of care or village models that purposely incorporates social interaction, functionality and intergenerational contact while continuing to maintain affordability and safety for our seniors," he said.

To access these spaces, individuals will need to have their health needs assessed by the regional health authority and designated health professionals, Johnston noted.

"Clients will rent their suite and pay for a service package that includes meals, laundry and light housekeeping. There will be provincially standardized accommodation and service package rates and new subsidy assistance for those that are eligible to make it more affordable," he said.

"After the launch, there will be an evaluation and decisions regarding expansion to additional communities, which will be determined as per the pilot program."

In late 2017, the Town of Stonewall submitted a formal request to a response from the provincial government to outline how capital for a personal care home could be arranged.

Leading up to the document submission, the town received support for the proposal from partner municipalities.

However, the Town of Teulon and RM of Rockwood withdrew their support for the project earlier this year. Now the project involves the Town of Stonewall along with the RMs of Rosser, St. Laurent and Woodlands.

Stonewall Mayor Sandra Smith shared her sentiments about the longawaited personal care home coming to the area.

"When we received confirmation from the government that our proposal was being selected for further development, we were ecstatic," she

"This has been an intense but exciting time for all involved. Over the last several months, we have been working collaboratively within our communities and alongside the IERHA, the team at Shared Health capital, the Department of Seniors and Long-Term Care and a dedicated architectural team and other specialists to help us get to this point."

Looking ahead, there is much excitement as the project comes to fruition.

"Our plan has been submitted and we are looking forward to receiving the government's approval to move ahead with construction of the PCH," Smith said.

'On behalf of our council, we would like to extend our gratitude to the leadership shown by reeves Chartrand, Mulligan and Oliver and their respective councils for recognizing that although the PCH is being built in Stonewall, it will benefit all of us in the region. We look forward to our continued partnership."

The Town of Stonewall has acquired nearly 20 acres of land near the intersection of 4th Street East and 3rd Avenue South. About five acres would be used for the personal care home, while the remaining 15 acres is set aside for an age-in-place campus, as well as possible office space and commercial opportunities.

The town is currently accepting proposals from firms that would be prepared to design, develop and build this development.

mon animals to transmit and become infected with rabies. All mammals can transmit rabies, including domestic pets like cats and dogs. However, there is no risk of rabies transmission for mice and squirrels that look and behave normally.

Even if an animal bite or scratch is an accident, it still needs to be reported to a health-care provider. When an animal bite or scratch occurs, Public Health conducts a no-blame follow-up meant to reduce rabies risk to humans. They don't take pets away from their homes.

"While the rabies virus is dangerous, post-exposure rabies treatments are highly effective at preventing rabies disease in people," said Joshua Aquin, public health physician with Manitoba Health. "Even if the animal exposure happened several days ago, it's not too late to get assessed by a health-care provider and find out if you need treatment."

If an animal bites or scratches you, immediately clean the wound with soap and water. If possible, take note of the animal owner's name and phone number. Visit your health-care provider, a Quick Care Clinic or walk-in clinic to get your wound assessed. If it's a serious injury, go to the emergency department. Your health-care provider will fill out an animal exposure form and send it to Public Health. If you haven't had a tetanus vaccine in the past five years, you might need to get one.

If you're not planning to get medical attention, call Health Links toll-free at 1-888-315-9257 to report the animal encounter. To report a domestic animal exposed to or injured by an animal suspected of having rabies where no human exposure has occurred, contact Manitoba Agriculture at 204-470-

Public Health discourages destroying an animal that was involved in an animal encounter. If you choose to euthanize the animal, do not damage the animal's head or put yourself at risk. You should contact Public Health before destroying a pet that was involved in a bite or scratch situation.

Public Health will follow up on the encounter, whether it was with a pet, a stray or a wild animal. They will contact the person exposed to the animal, as well as the animal owner to ask about the vaccination status and health of the animal. Public Health might ask the owner to observe and humanely isolate cats or dogs for 10 days. The quarantine period ensures pets are healthy, even if their rabies vaccinations are up to date since the vaccines are not 100 per cent effective.

When a healthy-looking dog, cat or ferret has rabies, they are only contagious to others for up to 10 days before they will become severely ill. However, some other animals have a longer quarantine period such as wildlife and livestock.

On Day 10, Public Health will contact the cat or dog owner to ask about its health. If the animal is healthy, then the rabies risk from that encounter is

zero. No further public health follow-up is required at that point.

If the animal has died, testing might be undertaken. If the test is positive for rabies or if the animal cannot be found, Public Health will discuss with the person exposed if post-exposure treatment is needed through a series of vaccinations. If it was an unknown animal, attempts will be made to find and capture the animal for quarantine. Bites from wild animals have a higher risk for exposure to rabies. If the animal can't be captured and tested, Public Health might recommend post-exposure treatment.

In an effort to avoid rabies, vaccinate your pets and don't let them roam free outdoors, especially at night. If your pet was in contact with a wild animal, do not touch your pet with bare skin. Wear work gloves when comforting pets or checking injuries.

You should also avoid wild animals — don't feed them or leave your pets' food bowls outside. It's important to teach kids to never approach an unfamiliar animal.

If you find a bat, alive or dead, don't touch it. If the bat is in your house, open windows to let it escape. If you find a bat in your bedroom, call Health Links toll-free at 1-888-315-9257 for advice since you might have been bitten while sleeping.

Tens of thousands of people gather to witness days of music

The 48th Winnipeg Folk Festival took place this past weekend and saw sell outs for both campgrounds, 4-day Festival tickets and Sunday tickets.

The 2023 Winnipeg Folk Festival saw an overall attendance of 74,500 held from July 6-9. This year is the second highest attended festival behind only 2019. The festival worked hard monitoring attendance and what the site and services can manage to provide the best experience for patrons.

The very first Winnipeg Folk Festival graced the grounds of Birds Hill Provincial Park in 1974. It was meant to be a single occurrence, a celebration marking Winnipeg being 100 years old. The event had a huge turn out, and has now become a tradition of almost 50 years, often exceeding an attendance record of 70,000 people.

This year's festival ran from Thursday, to Sunday, and showcased musicians from all over the world, including Faye Webster, Gregory Alan Isakov, KT Tunstall, Fleet Foxes, Vance Joy, Whitehorse, The War On Drugs, and many more.

Friday's line-up for this Folk Festival was extra special; it featured Arny Margret all the way from Iceland, Rufus Wainwright and family, Winnipeggers FONTINE and Field Guide, and folk-country icon Emmylou Harris.

Festival-goers this day were also able to see workshops like All in the Family, where Rufus Wainwright, Loudon Wainwright III, and Lucy Wainwright Roche played songs together and individually, including the family anthem Loudon had written for the whole family, "Meet the



Wainwrights."

Another workshop was Wheatfield Soul, featuring Matt Foster, FON-TINE, Field Guide, William Prince, Andrina Turenne, Fire & Smoke, and Leaf Rapids, and was put together with the intention of hosting artists all from Manitoba who would honour the legendary Canadian musician Gordon Lightfoot, who recently passed away.

By Friday evening, a sea of people had gathered to see the sets on the Main Stage, tarps and chairs set up all the way back to the treeline. Poles decorated extravagantly were set up at some tarps so people could find their way back to their spots, which did prove difficult due to the immense population of the area. Main stage attendees, which was likely most of the festival-goers for the day, saw exceptional performances from Adia Victoria, Fruit Bats, Rufus Wainwright, and Emmylou Harris.

This year, the festival honoured volunteer coordinator Lisa Sinnicks and the festival's former long-time Main

Alec Baldwin golden at the Special Olympics World Games

Gimli's Alec Baldwin earned three medals (two gold, one bronze) last month at the Special Olympics World Games in Berlin, Germany, and received an outpouring of praise from the local community.

Alec competed in track, relay and the running long jump at the games, which were held June 17-25, and earned a medal in each event.

He said he "was excited and very happy" to receive two gold medals and that it was his first time competing at the world games.

"I'm doing great because I earned [medals] in three events," said Alec, who has autism and is well known in Gimli for his annual community dog party and his outstanding artwork. "I earned two gold medals. One for 800 metres and when my time was two minutes and 18 seconds. And another gold medal for running long jump. That's when I made my personal best. I ran for 25 metres [then jumped]."

Alec and three of his Canadian teammates scooped up the bronze medal in the 400-metre relay event, completing it in 54 seconds. Alec ran in third position, handing the baton to the last

He said he wants to improve that personal best time.

"If I don't get a personal best time, everything is OK," he said. "We proved ourselves to run quicker [in the relay event] and we had speed in a flash."

The Special Olympics World Games had about 7.000 athletes from 190 countries competing in 26 sports that included track and field, cycling, equestrian, artistic and rhythmic gymnastics, judo, powerlifting, sailing, swimming and basketball. The games are the world's largest inclusive sporting event, allowing athletes with intellectual challenges to compete together and achieve recognition for their dedication to athletic train-

Alec said the Special Olympics games help promote inclusivity and generate conversations around people with intellectual challenges. TSN even interviewed him at the games for German TV.

"It's a great phenomenon when we talk together and start conversations and asking questions. It was awesome," he said.

Alec's mom, Tanis Benson, said the response from people in Gimli to Alec's performance at the games was overwhelming.


"He had such a great response from people locally on Facebook. He's got so many people who like him. It's just amazing," said Benson, who attended the games with her husband and daughter. "I did Facebook live for the opening and closing ceremonies and after he won his medals, and we had hundreds of people congratulating him and telling him they were so proud of him for representing Gimli and Canada."

The RM of Gimli and Canada Day organizers invited Alec to participate in the parade through town on July 1. Alec dressed in his Team Canada uniform and wore his medals.

Alec qualified for the Special Olympics international games in Berlin by competing against other athletes from Manitoba. He ended up tied for points (he placed first in the 800 metres and second in the running long jump) with another athlete. His selection for Team Canada came down to a random draw made by computer.

Alec is already a seasoned pro at distance running, but it was the first time he trained for and competed in the running long jump.

"He had to learn how to perform the running long jump," said Benson. "Alec is with Interlake Athletics in Selkirk and his coach, Lena Kublick, helped him train for the long jump. She had to measure the distance he

should run to get the best jump because it's different for each athlete. He started from 25 metres, had to count 16 steps and then jump. He didn't get enough practice with this to really feel confident, but he still pulled it off at the games."

Benson said they also got him a personal trainer, Tina Perkins, who gave him different exercises to work on his jumping power. He trained six days a week and included strength training and yoga. He also did one long run each week to maintain his endurance and used the treadmill to increase his


The family's chiropractor, Dr. Roch, also stepped up at the very last minute - the day before Alec flew to Berlin – to help him be at his physical

"When he did the 800-metre event in Berlin, you could see the smile starting when he was close to the finish line," said Benson.

Alec, who sings and plays piano, was invited to sing O Canada at a Family and Friends Reception at the Canadian embassy in Germany.

"He loves to perform. He and the gymnastics athlete were also interviewed for a documentary on the Canadian athletes," said Benson.

Alec has qualified for the Special

Olympics national winter games in Calgary next year, she said, and he'll be competing with the provincial team in the snowshoeing 800- and 1,600-metre events.

Weihs will be entering his final season of junior hockey this fall. He feels priviledged to represent Canada on an international stage.

"It's a really exciting feeling, obviously. I got the invite in October of last year so I was super excited about

it. I went (to the Worlds) back in 2019 with the U16s and to represent (Canada) again for ball hockey for U20 was super exciting," said Weihs. "We had a really good team...it was super exciting and I was super honoured to be on that team."



Take control of your cortisol (stress) levels

Poor cortisol gets a bad rap, but the truth is that it is an essential hormone that affects each organ and tissue in the human body. While it can be problematic and lead to increased belly fat when unbalanced, we need cortisol in healthy quantities to:

- Help control sleep-wake cycle
- Regulate blood pressure and blood
- Suppress inflammation
- Aid in controlling your body's use of macronutrients (aka metabolism)
- Regulate your body's stress response

How can you make sure that cortisol is released at the correct time during the day, and what can be done to manage chronic elevated cortisol levels? Read on, my friend.

The first thing we want to pay attention to is our sleep behaviours:

- Your body can be affected by blue light emitted from your devices, so turn on night shift if it's after dark. This alters your screen to display warmers colours, filtering out blue light.

- Go to sleep by 10 p.m. most nights, and avoid evening snacks at least three hours before bedtime. This helps with melatonin and HGH production, which helps us get better quality rest.

- Black out your bedroom completely. This can be achieved by removing night lights, putting up thick window coverings to block street lights, and ensuring electronics with power indicators are facing walls or moved to an entirely different area of your home.

Next, consider how we start each

- If you live in the country, try leaving your blinds open so the sun wakes
- Spend up to ten minutes in direct sunlight as soon as possible every day. If it's cold out, this can be accomplished in a window. Avoid wearing

sunglasses during this time.

- Try a cold morning shower, by cranking the tap to icy for the final few minutes of your usual cleanse. Bonus: this is excellent for hair and
- Keep up your morning coffee habit.
- Give intermittent fasting a go, ideally for 12-16 hours overnight.

Your diet and activity level is important as well, when it comes to maintaining healthy hormone levels. Avoid sodium-rich foods, processed items (especially those high in sugars), and reduce alcohol to avoid developing chronically elevated cortisol levels. You can try increasing your vitamin C intake to fix an existing condition, and exercising regularly with both stress training and cardiovascular activity will have a noticeable effect on your overall stress, and there help regulate cortisol in your body.
