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## Dunnottar's sustainability plan aims to combat climate change

There is an accelerated need for all communities to adopt a plan to combat climate change caused by global warming.

Village of Dunnottar Mayor Rick Gamble gave this warning last Saturday morning just before the village council unveiled its recently passed sustainabilty plan during a public meeting at the Matlock Recreation Centre.

"The need for action has changed from urgent to critical," Gamble said, citing this summer's world-wide forest fires and floods plus the harmful algae destroying fish and plant life off the Florida coast.

Gamble hopes other communities will follow on Dunnottar's heels in de-

veloping their own sustainability plans. The village plan - three years in the making - is intended to guarantee Dunnottar's future as a sustainable community environmentally, economically, socially and through community partnerships. It was prepared by council representatives and village volunteers with guidance and assistance from St. Andrews-based consultant Tanis Os-

termann, the owner and principal of CanSustain Management Solutions.

Ostermann opened the meeting by briefing the 60-person audience on the major elements of the plan. She said the four pillar plan has eight sub themes including the maintenance of water quality, natural areas, green infrastructure, renewable energy, heritage, wellness, finance and the local economy, and connections to other communities.

"Implementation of the plan is going to be a resident-driven process and everybody must get involved if it is to succeed," said Ostermann who noted initial input in the plan's preparation also came from the East Interlake Conservation District and Community Futures East Interlake.

Gamble said the plan was financed with the help of a \$38,000 grant from

the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and a \$19,170 grant from the Manitoba Government. He said council has money to start implementing some of the recommended actions and others will be financed by more grant applications.

"We'll also be appointing a community committee this fall to monitor the plan's progress," the mayor said. "We'll look at how we're doing in every three-year period."

One audience member, Mark Myrowich, said he set up a Facebook page for the sustainabilty cause while the meeting was still in progress.

"We have to use multiple platforms to get everybody involved right away including young people," said Myrowich who is a Matlock cottager and owner of the Erosion Control Blanket environmental company in Riverton.




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## **Bears spotted in Grand Beach**

# Cottage owners seek alternative solution to costly wastewater project

A new wastewater proposal system for Grand Beach could have cottage owners paying \$585 towards a new lift station for the next 30 years.

The Grand Beach Cottage Owners Association held a meeting with Parks Canada last Wednesday. The province is proposing creating a lift station, as well as upgrading a sewage plant, to help stop wastewater from harming the environment, which according to cottage owners, will cost them \$585 a year for roughly three decades.

Bruce Mineault, manager, development and operations at Manitoba Sustainable Development, said the current system is seeping sewage into the ground, and they don't have the capital to fund this type of project.

"We are not a crown corporation, we can't spend money like that. We have to get our budgets approved, and we have to work within a lot of rules and regulations," Mineault said. "We're trying to deliver services in a more economic way ... We are exploring other options, but we have not been meeting wastewater standards for years now, and we don't have a lot of leeway within our model."

Mineault said the province uses the "delite" model for calculating the cost to cottage owners. The model collects data based on a number of predetermined factors, such as how many potential bedrooms are in a cottage. to determine how much the cottage owners are responsible for. Cottage owners will be paying for 58.5 per cent of the proposed cost of upgrading the system.

But some cottage owners question how they came up with that number, and why they have to pay for a problem they aren't causing. They say most of them have private septic tanks, which they already pay to have pumped.

Brent Olynyk, president of the Cottage Owners Association of Grand

Beach who also owns a cottage in the area, said they are encouraging the province to find other options.

"I think a lot of owners realize they have a responsibility to do what's right. (Cottage owners) are willing to pay their fair share to upgrade the lagoon, if it's needed," Olynyk said. "But most cottage owners already pay to pump their tanks ... (Cottage owners) want the province to consider alternative options."

During last week's meeting, many cottage owners said the province is making them pay twice, and that most of the sewage problems come from the public bathrooms. Olynyk said the peak tourism time in Grand Beach, which is located roughly 65 kilometres north of Selkirk, is in July and August, and the province is trying to solve an issue created by shortterm tourism.

Olynyk said the cottage owners have put in an Expression of Interest to negotiate and enter talks with their local government to find an alternative solution.

### Seven more names added to memorial for victims of impaired drivers

A Manitoba memorial for impaired driving victims in West St. Paul is starting to run out of space after seven more names were added to it over the weekend.

Every year, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) invites those who have lost loved ones to visit the permanent memorial located at Glen Eden Funeral Home and Cemetery. The monument, which was built to honour those who have been killed in drunk or drug-related driving incidents, was built three years ago and it now has a total of 70 names engraved

Gillian Phillips, victim services manager for western Canada MADD, says she hopes drivers are getting the message about impaired driving.

"There have been so many deaths involving impaired driving that we're starting to run out of space on the memorial. That's incredibly sad," Phillips said during a special ceremony last Sunday."It's a tragedy. This year we've added seven names to the monument, and every one of those deaths were preventable."

Of the seven names added last Sunday, four were from the Mate family. Mate attended the ceremony last Sunday to add the names of his brother, his brother's wife, and their two sons who were killed in a crash involving a drunk driver in 1985. He said this is a good way to honour their memory.

"I was thinking about a roadside monument, but those things tend to be temporary," Mate said. "I'm glad that they'll be remembered here. Somewhere I can visit them."

According to Manitoba Public Insur-

ance, 107 people were killed on Manitoba roadways in 2016 and 36 per cent of those crashes involved impaired driving. Impaired driving continues to impact communities across Manitoba. More recently, on Aug. 10, Ben Harris, a 15-year-old St. Andrews resident, was killed by an impaired driver while riding his bike moments from home.

Phillips said MADD is also concerned about the upcoming legalization or recreational cannabis and how that will affect impaired driving.

She added if someone wanted to add a name to the memorial, they would have to apply through their MADD victim service representative.

The applicant has to make sure that all the court documents were recorded, as they must prove that their loved one's death was caused by alcohol, drugs, or a combination of the two. Once the process is done, and an affidavit is signed, their name will be added to the memorial.

The monument can be viewed in West St. Paul at Glen Eden Cemetery, located at 4477 Main St.



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### New park in Dunnottar opening this fall to honour distinguished citizen

The Village of Dunnottar council will open a new park this fall to honour the memory of a local citizen who made a significant contribution to banking and the Indigenous community.

Dunnottar Mayor Rick Gamble announced the creation of the Linda Park promenade at a luncheon last Saturday at the Matlock Recreation Centre. The new park will be on the south side of Whytewold's Tugela Creek near the midway point of the village's walking trails.

Park died at the age of 58 in 2007 after a distinguished Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) career where she spearheaded numerous programs involving the Indigenous community in banking.

She grew up in the Matlock area and prepared for her career by acquiring a

Bachelor of Arts from the University of Winnipeg and a diploma in business administration from Red River Community College before working for the Royal Bank in Winnipeg, Montreal and Toronto.

The highlights of her career were recalled at the luncheon by retired Royal Bank executive Reid McLellan and Park's sister Wendy Phillips who also works for RBC in Toronto.

McLellan said Park was a dedicated banker who forged strong ties between RBC and the Indigenous community.

He said she was responsible for the first RBC branch to open on a reserve at Peguis First Nation, the formation of the bank's Aboriginal banking division and for the establishment of the bank's annual Aboriginal youth achievement awards in 12 different categories. Park also championed the first program for Aboriginal youth at the University of Manitoba.

"Linda was a pioneer of sorts who pushed the envelope on projects," McLennan said. "She also had the ability to look at both sides of arguments."

Wendy Phillips said her sister's heritage traced back to her grandparents

Gilbert and Jane Harper who lived on the St. Peter's reserve near Selkirk and moved to Matlock so that their children could go to a good school. Linda grew up in a large family whose matriarch Jenny Park is still active in the Dunnottar community at age 93.

"Our parents carried on the tradition of our grandparents who were active in the church and community activities," Wendy Phillips said." It was this foundation that shaped Linda's values and created her desire to make a valuable contribution to the world."

Also speaking at the luncheon was Rev. Robin Mather, an Anglican minister and prominent Dunnottar citizen. "This community is Linda Park's extended family," Mather said. "Her new park will be a place of respite and quiet as people walk along our network of walking trails."

The luncheon announcement was just the first phase of bringing the new park to life. It will be officially opened and blessed in early fall by Rev. Stanley McKay, a Petersfield resident and former head of the United Church of Canada.

# Entrepreneurs invited to create foods, drinks for 12th annual food fight

### Chief aims to bring balance, inclusion to Brokenhead Ojibway Nation

The new chief of Brokenhead Oiibway Nation (BON) says it was her passion for the community she grew up in that prompted her to run for chief a second time.

"There's different people that throw their hat in the ring and each have a different vision and skill set and I believe that I have a vision for Brokenhead,"BON Chief Deborah Smith said during a telephone interview with the Record last Wednesday. "I also saw an opportunity to come home and work with the people, to work at developing a governance structure that is accountable, open to working with the community but that also tries to strengthen those foundational pieces and looks at long term stability and growth but also making sure that we always keep our identity and values ... as part of that process."

The First Nations community, which is located roughly 36 kilometres north of Selkirk, elected its new chief and council on Apr. 18. The two new council members are Naomi Nicholas and Harvey Olson and returning are councillors Winston Desjarlais and Shawn Kent. The new council is currently serving a two-year term.

Smith says she has spent the past few months settling into her new role and is looking forward to serving her community.

"I come from a family that has a long understanding of the history of this

community and was also raised by respected elders that were also very community orientated," she said. "I was always raised to be involved in my community and work at trying to help build my community."

She said the new council is trying to create an approach and tackle various areas of concerns for community members including health, education and housing.

"We need to open up the doors of communication," she said, adding since the new council has been elected, they have hosted three band meetings so far.

Their first meeting was a sharing circle for community members to come and voice any concerns they may have, their second meeting was to give community members a financial update and the third was in response to the community's concern surrounding education.

"Since that time we have ... reinstated our local education committee and they are starting to seek input from community members to become more engaged," she said.

Smith said council members meet weekly and their goal is to have monthly band meetings. Meeting dates will be posted on social media as well as on the community's website, brokenheadojibwaynation.net.

"We're just trying to present the information, share the information and make sure we're consistently trying to

have that information flowing to the community," she said, adding she is always willing to meet with community members."I kind of have a policy where if you have a concern, you can come and sit down and talk with me. I may not always have the answer but I will certainly listen to what the concern is."

Smith said the new council is working on getting the community's finances in order. They also plan to work with the First Nations Financial Management Board to help build good governance and finance practices.

"We also need to work on creating internal processes and making sure our policies are up to date," she said. "To make sure that we are operating effectively and efficiently."

She added one of her main goals as chief is to ensure information is being relayed throughout the community.

"I think with any organization there's always room for improvement on how we can meet and serve the needs of our people," she said. "Everything is a work in progress and we're just trying to create an approach that is balanced and that's inclusive but also an approach that incorporates our values as Anishinaabe people."

BON is an Anishinaabe (Saulteaux/ Ojibwa) First Nation. As of May 2010, the First Nation had a registered population of 1,733 people, 598 of which

### Livestock producers can temporarily cut hay, graze animals on Crown land

Livestock producers will temporarily be able to cut hay and allow animals to graze on Crown land not normally designated for agricultural use due to dry conditions across parts of the province.

"Pastures and forage crops in parts of Manitoba have been greatly affected by low levels of rain and dry soils this summer," Agriculture Minister Ralph Eichler stated in a release last week. "By providing producers with additional options, such as access to Crown land, we are easing the burden on farmers who are seeing low yields on forage crops."

Under certain circumstances, Crown land can be made available for agricultural use. The Agricultural Crown Lands Leasing program will administer the use of available land and provide necessary permits. Livestock must be removed when the naturally existing forage is exhausted or by Oct. 31, 2018. Baled hay must be removed by Nov. 15, 2018.

"With many beef producers facing

poor pasture conditions and a shortage of feed, having the ability to graze and hay these Crown lands is both necessary and welcomed," said Tom Teichroeb, interim president, Manitoba Beef Producers."Cattle grazing inside these wildlife management areas can deliver important conservation benefits as well as be an important strategy during times of feed short-

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ages."

Manitoba Agriculture provides a number of additional tools and resources for producers affected by dry conditions which can be found at gov. mb.ca/agriculture/livestock/beef/index.html#resources. The resources include the Manitoba hay listing service, information on managing pastures during dry conditions, alternative feed for beef cattle and options to stretch feed when supplies are tight.

# Cooking fish over an open fire

Hi gang,

The first signs of fall have quickly appeared it seems and it is time to squeeze in a few last summer activities other than fishing. I say that because last week when I went to the three fishing spots I wanted to feature, I found only solitary couples. Fortunately for us, they all had good fishing stories. Early in the week, upstream of Selkirk on the banks of the Red I found a kindly, quiet fellow fishing with his not so quiet, energetic daughter. As I picked my way down a narrow steep trail to the flatter bank, the girl jumped up from her folding chair turning to me with a big, bright smile as I called out, "Have you had any luck?""You bet," she remarked as I handed her my card. "I'm Ria Giroux and that's my dad, Romeo Siminig, sitting in the shade of the willows over there," she said as she walked to the water's edge and pulled up a string of bass and walleye. "Is there a fishing experience that you would like to share with your fellow anglers?" I asked. She thought for a moment, then launched into story from her youth saying, "I was 12-years-old when mom and dad began taking me fishing and I loved it. Dad taught me how to clean and cook a fish over a fire. Once I could do that he gave me his knife and soon when I caught fish, I would go off by myself, make a fire, then cook and eat them." I remember my mom would call out to me, "I see smoke, what are you eating?"

Around midweek I thought it was time to visit anglers at Pine Falls. Again there was no one around except for one couple. I parked and carefully walked along the wobbly pier being pitched about by choppy waves. "How's it going guys?" I made to open a conversation. "Nothing yet," a jovial chap in shorts and a hoodie responded. "We're Vance and Nancy Flett from Winnipeg," when I asked. Nancy also in shorts and a hoodie

seemed a little cold from the wind with her hands in her pockets and her rod imprisoned between her legs and chair. As we talked I could feel their deep understanding of nature and their bond to each other."Thirty years we've been together,"Vance declared, "and we've fished everywhere. I remember last year we were boat fishing on the far side of the river here on an overcast day with choppy waves and I thought I got a snag. I lowered my rod reeling in then hauled up on what felt like dead weight. Again and again I reeled and hauled, and then a curious wave moving in a zigzag fashion with smaller waves on either side appeared on the surface about ten boat lengths away. Abruptly the

spinney back of a sturgeon came out of the water. With a slow strong whip of its tail it ran with my line." Vance loosened the drag and let it go. "How long have we been going?" he called to Nancy. "Two hours, have you had enough?" she asked. "No," he grunted rocking back and forth in time with his reeling and hauling as the tug of wills went on. Slowly he brought the grey-white four foot long delta tailed sturgeon to the boats side with Vance's arms aching and rigid from hours of tension. Then suddenly a rogue wave slapped the side of the boat rocking it wildly and his line snapped. The fish was gone. Vance shook his arms back to life, smiling, looking at the water where the fish had disappeared. It had been a good fight.

Last Saturday I strolled down the Gimli pier and again I could only see one couple fishing. I approached them as they sat tending their rods and asked if they had a story. Like the Fletts they were open and friendly. They started chuckling, eyeing each other as a story came to mind. "Can I ask your names?" I quickly interjected before they started. "We're Moises and Helena Rego from Winnipeg," they chimed in. With graying hair, round faces and comfortable bodies cradled in well used chairs they told how last week Moises nephew, Nuno met them on the Gimli pier with his three year old son, Leo. Moises had bought little blond haired Leo a kids' fishing rod. Now Moises has a sense of humor and when the Leo wasn't looking he snuck a big minnow on the boys' hook and tossed the line in the water. "Leo, come reel in your fish!" Moises called to the lad. Leo was beside himself trembling with excitement as he grabbed his rod and furiously reeled in that minnow. Now, Leo is constantly after his dad to go catch "baby fish"!

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# Interlake landscape, history inspires comic book artist

At a recent farmer's market along the Selkirk Waterfront, as residents walked along the fresh bread and local crafts, passerby also came across a giant grizzly bear. As it towers over them, they might think it's cartoonish. But it contains a sense of detail and maturity to it that brings the bear to life.

This is Nyco Rudolph's comic stand. After growing up in Gimli, he spent the better part of a decade in Winnipeg's budding comic book scene before finally settling down in Selkirk in 2016. Rudolph said he's surprised how much his work has resonated with Manitobans.

"When I sell at shows, it's usually people my age who are buying (my art). Buying pictures of bears and dinosaurs, something that might be considered childish," Rudolph said. "But I filter it through a mature lens. These kids who used to love reading comics about bears, those kids are now adults, and they want to enjoy those things in a new way."

Rudolph said he's been drawing since he could hold a pencil. His career started almost a decade ago, where he would create art for posters and album covers in the Winnipeg music scene. He said he worked with heavy metal and punk bands, which featured very graphic and gore-filled art, a sharp contrast to the more toned down work he creates now.

His most popular prints are from his "Bears Invade" series, which

features Canadian bears in Second World War era propaganda, trying to recruit more bears to invade Canada. Although Rudolph spent most of his time in Winnipeg, many of the posters involve the bears travelling or fighting on

Rudolph said his work is inspired from a love of the Interlake landscape, and a love for local history.

"My wife and I went on a Canada wide road trip in 2013 ... I kind of had this perception of Manitoba where it was just like Winnipeg," Rudolph said. "It wasn't until discovering spots outside of winnipeg, discovering Selkirk, this beautiful community on the river, I realized that Manitoba is pretty diverse. I'm even thinking about having Selkirk make a cameo in the comic I'm working on."

Rudolph's comic is a continuation of his war time bear posters: Bears discover a bunch of decommissioned military bases, and launch an invasion of Canada. Each chapter will focus on a different province, and how they would handle the bear invasion. Rudolph said he's excited to become a part of the Selkirk community, and he's looking to set up some public events, like some workshops or paint nights.

The Old Stone Church recently displayed handmade in Manitoba quilts along it's pews, quilts that were made to keep Canadian soldiers warm.

The Manitoba chapter for Quilts of Valour held a small gallery showing in the St. Peter, Dynevor Old Stone Church, just north of Selkirk on Aug. 18. The quilts were handcrafted by Manitoban artists, which are donated to sick and injured army veterans from Manitoba.

Edith Taylor, the representative for the Quilts of Valour Manitoba chapter, said she loves presenting the quilts to the veterans.

"The vets are so darling. They light up whenever they see them, it just goes right to the heart," Taylor said. "It's something that's very meaningful for both sides, we want to share our appreciation and love towards the soldiers.

"They've been through so much, and we think of our quilts as a hug, a thank you for all their years of service."

Taylor said she was approached by some members of the church. The church wanted to do an open house, and Quilts of Valour wanted to bring attention to their organization, so they decided to team up. Around 30 quilts were displayed, all of which go to Integrated Personnel Support Centres in Winnipeg and in Shilo, Man.

Taylor said they make sure that the quilts go to Manitoban soldiers only.

"I get a lot of questions, people are asking 'will you be sending some quilts to B.C.?' Nope, these are made in Manitoba, and Manitoba is where they will stay. We make sure the quilts go to Manitoban soldiers," Taylor said.

According to Taylor, Quilts of Valour has given away more than 10,000

quilts to soldiers and veterans across Canada.

# WSP council to vote on retail sale of cannabis after election

Whether or not the retail sale of cannabis products will be allowed in the RM of West St. Paul will be voted on after the upcoming fall election.

West St. Paul council members voted to leave the issue of cannabis products to the next council late last month. The Liquor And Gaming Authority of Manitoba also suggests RMs hold a public vote, also called a plebiscite, to determine if retail cannabis sale is desired in a community.

West St. Paul Mayor Bruce Henley said council felt they didn't have enough time to consider the issue.

"It can't be up to council, we would have to hold a plebiscite. If we were to make it an election issue, we'd have to have our paperwork in place by July, and we felt that just wasn't enough time," Henley said. "We thought adding one more item to the agenda was just going to create problems."

Henley said that council had two options: Either they'd put the issue on the upcoming election ballots, or they would push it to the next council, who would have until 2020 to make a decision.

Henley said there hasn't been a lot of clarity from the province surrounding cannabis legalization, and council does not have enough information to make a decision at this time.

West St. Paul resident Renee Bernard said he believes this is the right move. He added this will give residents more time to think about it.

"I understand that (marijuana) is going to be legal whether I like it or not, but I'm not sure I'd enjoy having a store here in the RM," Bernard said.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced in June that Canadians will be able to consume marijuana recreationally without criminal penalties starting on Oct. 17, 2018. Although the federal government is the one legalizing marijuana, provinces and territories are responsible for licensing and overseeing its distribution and sale.





# **Selkirk Park Pool to host** K9 swim, splash Sept. 9

The Selkirk Park Pool and Splash Pad will stay open until Saturday, Sept. 8 this year, providing 13 extra days of swimming.

On Sunday, Sept. 9, the pool goes to the dogs for the third annual K9 Swim and Splash.

Shelly Leonard, the city's program coordinator for culture, recreation and green transportation, said the city wanted to extend the pool's opening after a cracked outlet pipe delayed the pool and splash pad opening earlier this summer. Pool hours during the extended opening will be: Aug. 27 – Sept. 3 open from noon to 8 p.m. and Sept. 4 – 8 from 4 p.m. – 8 p.m. The K9 Swim and Splash on Sept. 9 runs from noon to 6 p.m.

"We've been able to extend summer staff to keep the pool and splash pad open an extra two weeks so the public can continue to enjoy the pool in the nice weather we're having," Leonard stated in a release last week."And we're super excited to have the K9 Swim and Splash back to close out the season."

Selkirk CAO Duane Nicol says the city is happy to have the pool open longer, especially with the nice weather that is expected to continue into September, and just as happy to have the popular doggie swim back as well.

"It's been a terrific summer and we're thrilled to be able to keep the pool open a couple weeks extra. Thanks to city staff for working hard to make this happen," Nicol said. "The K9 Swim and Splash was very well received both years. We heard from a lot of people who said that if they'd known about it, they would have come out, so we hope even more people and their dogs come out and enjoy it this year."

The final day that people can swim in the pool this season is Sept. 8. The next day the pool will go to the dogs where all sizes and breeds will be welcomed from noon to 6 p.m. The swim will end at 6 p.m. and the pool will be cleaned and drained for the season.

Leonard says she's hoping to build on the success of the past two years.

"It's a great way to end the season, and a great way to extend one of the city's best assets to people and their

While the dogs are taking over the pool for the afternoon and evening, there are rules the dogs, and their owners, will have to follow.

The pool and splash pad will be open to all dogs, but owners must bring proof of current vaccinations to the

pool entry gate upon registration (no pre-registration required). A vaccination card from your vet is the only acceptable proof of vaccination and must show rabies, distemper/parvo (DA2PP) and bordetella vaccination.

**Pool Rules:** 

- You are responsible for your dog and its behaviour while in the pool, including your dog's interaction with other dogs.
- For the safety of all dogs visiting the pool & splash pad, The City of Selkirk requires all our canine visitors to be vaccinated for rabies, distemper, parvo and Bordetella. Proof of vaccinations must be submitted when registering your canine. (Dog tags are not suffi-
- Please attend to your dog at all times. There is no doggy lifeguard so this is especially important while your dog in in the water.
- Dog must be on a leash while outside the gated pool area.
- Each dog must be accompanied by an adult handler age 18+.
- No human swimming!
- No food or treats inside the pool
- Incontinent dogs are not permitted in the pool area for health reasons.
- No dogs in heat.
- Clean up after your dogs. Poop bags are provided.
- No muddy dogs in the pool. A rinse hose will be provided.

# Strategies parents can use to motivate students

Whether it's during the school year and part of their curriculum or on summer break, encourage kids to engage in subjects that interest them. As kids learn more about the topics and subjects that interest them, they may develop a passion for learning that they can then take with them to the classroom.

· Express an interest in the subjects children are studying. Another way to motivate students at the dawn of a new school year is to express an interest in the subjects they're studying. Ask questions about their studies and encourage them to share



# Student cyber security precautions

Students should implement cyber security practices at home and in school.

Thanks to advancements in technology, students and educators are increasingly turning to birth, tablets and computers when working on daily assignments and classroom activities. Students rely on the internet for research and keeping in touch with teachers and other students, and work is even assigned and completed via digital platforms.

Despite the upside of technology, cybercrime is a potential pitfall of all that time spent online. The internet provides instant access, and that can put students at risk.

According to Verizon's 2016 Data Breach Investigations Report, the education sector ranked sixth in the United States for the total number of reported "security incidents." Schools are data-rich, meaning they give hackers access to information like identification numbers, birthdates, email addresses, financial data, medical records, and more.

Students must understand cyber security risks when working and sharing data online. The following are some tips students can follow.

· Protect passwords. Students are urged to keep their passwords to themselves. This prevents others from using accounts maliciously or even in seemingly harmless ways that can put you in trouble, such as searching for inappropriate content in school. Choose complicated passwords that can't be easily guessed, and opt for two-step authentication whenever offered.

· Use secured WiFi networks. Free or open WiFi connections are not encrypted, meaning they can be accessed by anyone. Many cyber criminals gain access to information through these channels. Schools should have encrypted systems in place.

· Limit what you share on the internet. Students are urged to be aware of what they share online. According to DataManagement, a computing ser-

vice, information posted to social media is permanent, and deleted items aren't necessarily gone. Exercise caution on social media. Don't post unless it is something you would be

· Watch out for phishing scams. Phishing usually occurs through fraudulent email messages that mimic the look of reputable solicitations. Scammers rely on these tactics to tempt people to click on links or download attachments that can put malware on a device and steal personal data. Exercise caution with all links and downloads.

· Schedule routine backups. Data can be lost if a device crashes, so routinely back up personal devices and home computers. Backups can be stored on external hard drives or with cloud services.

· Exercise caution when filesharing.

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# Hundreds visit Marine Museum during free admission day

The Marine Museum of Manitoba hosted a doors-open, free admission day in celebration of its new and renewed exhibits on the S.S Keenora last Tuesday.

Shay Nordal, the museum's general manager said more than 670 visitors stopped by the museum throughout the day.

"We almost had more visitors today than the month of June. Today's attendance works out to a 1.5 visitors for every minute we were open," Nordal stated in a release last week.

Duane Nicol, chair of the museum's board of directors, estimates that the museum's open house generated more than \$10,500 in sales for local businesses.

"Last year we embarked on a comprehensive program of visitor tracking and experience surveying. As part of that we asked visitors to tell us how much they spent during their time in the community before and after the visit. Based a conservative calculation

of that data, we found for every visitor we see, \$15.75 is spent in local shops and restaurants," said Nicol."Not only does the Marine Museum play a criti-

cal role in preserving our local heritage, but it's a pretty important tourism asset."

Established in 1972, the Marine Mu-

seum of Manitoba has been an iconic piece of the local landscape, attracting thousands of visitors each year over its summer-time operation. Over the past few years the Museum has undertaken a concerted renewal effort, building new exhibits and refreshing existing ones. New interpretive signage, and even interactive digital displays have been added to make the visitor experience more engaging and hands on. Nordal says that all of this work is thanks to the hard work of the Museum's Exhibit Committee, and financial support from grantors and donors.

"The Selkirk and District Community Foundation, the Thomas Sill Foundation and the Province of Manitoba have provided critical funding for this work. We must also thank the many people who donated personally to these projects. And of course without the City of Selkirk's annual grant the museum just could not operate," said Nordal.

## Six new confirmed cases of West Nile virus reported in Manitoba

Manitoba Health, Seniors and Active Living reports the total number of confirmed human cases of West Nile virus (WNV) this season has risen to seven

Three new cases have been identi-

fied in the Interlake-Eastern region, two in the Prairie Mountain region and one in the Winnipeg region. The first case, reported earlier this month, was confirmed in the Southern Health – Santé Sud region. The region of residence may not correspond to the re-

gion of exposure.

To date, two of the confirmed patients have required hospitalization for symptoms related to WNV this summer. More information continues to be collected by the department as part of its ongoing surveillance ef-

forts.

Manitobans are reminded the mosquito season is not over. Continued warm and dry conditions are ideal for Culex tarsalis, a carrier of WNV. Culex tarsalis typically feeds between dusk and dawn and often goes unnoticed when biting, and will start feeding earlier as the days shorten in September.

While mosquito numbers are low in most communities, surveillance shows the numbers of infected Culex tarsalis remain high throughout southern Manitoba. It only takes one bite from an infected

Culex tarsalis mosquito to be exposed to WNV. The risk for potential human exposure to WNV is high at present and will likely remain so for the next few weeks.

Manitobans can reduce their risk of mosquito bites and potential WNV exposure by:

- reducing the amount of time spent outdoors during peak mosquito hours (between dusk and dawn);
- using appropriate mosquito repellent;
- wearing light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing; and
- maintaining door and window screens so they fit tightly and are free of holes.

Manitobans can reduce the number of mosquitoes around their homes by eliminating standing water. To prevent the development of Culex tarsalis mosquitoes, homeowners can:

- clean eaves troughs and regularly empty bird baths and other items that might collect water;
- ensure rain barrels are covered with mosquito screening or are tightly sealed around the downspout;
- clear yards of old tires or other items that collect water; and
- improve landscaping to prevent standing water around the home.

The riders stayed overnight in Gimli in tents, trailers and hotels before completing the last leg of the ride Sunday. They also enjoyed a beer garden and a Saturday dinner before they pedalled off into the sunset.

"This is not a race and we've shortened the distance in recent years to make it more fun for the participants," Huan said while noting there are similar rides in all Canadian provinces."All this effort goes into improving the quality of life for MS patients."


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# More girls speeding onto Interlake Dragway

It only takes Emily Wruck a few minutes to get suited up for a drag race.

The list of protective gear is long – a helmet, a neck collar, arm restraints, shoes, pants, gloves and a jacket – but for Wruck, it has become something of a routine.

Behind the wheel of her car – a purple 2011 Hercules junior dragster covered with skulls, barbed wire and flames, and adorned with her first name in a brassy font on the side – Wruck acts like an old pro. And although at 13 years old and 4'10 (or "basically 4'11," as Wruck said), she may not be exactly what people picture when the phrase "drag racer" comes to mind, Wruck is one of an increasing number of young girls joining the sport.

"When my son started, I think there was maybe three girls, and like 12 boys," said Wruck's mom, Brandy, who has been running the Interlake Dragway with husband Darryl since 2012. "It's dominated by girls right now."

This shift at the dragway has been happening slowly over the past five years, Brandy said. Of the 10 kids enrolled in the junior dragster program at the dragway this year, six are girls. And as the Wrucks expect at least five

more to join the program next year, and two boys to age out of it, the number of girls participating in the sport is continuing to increase, said Wruck.

While drag racing may not be what everyone thinks of as a family activity,



Brandy said that's exactly what their family business has become.

"Anybody will do anything to help each other," she said. "If you're racing your best friend, well, you guys are enemies. But as soon as you cross that finish line, what happened there stays there."

Racing can also become something of a ritual between parents and kids, said Darryl.

"Every parent here, when it's eliminations, has their own little thing they do with their kid," he said.

For Darryl and Emily, it's a handshake they do just before she starts the race.

"The key to winning is doing the same thing over and over, just to be a routine," he said. "And it works."

As the Wrucks gear up for their last big event of the summer coming up on September long weekend, they said they're hoping to get a big crowd out to see what drag racing is all about.

"Lots of noise, adrenaline," said Brandy. "It's just pure excitement."

After a decade of advocacy work on credit card processing fees, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) welcomes the new agreements between the federal government and major payments brands announced earlier this month.

Starting in 2020, Visa and Mastercard have vowed to reduce the fees they charge retailers to an average annual effective rate of 1.4 per cent from the current 1.5 per cent. American Express announced a separate agreement to increase transparency and fairness.

"These new measures build on the positive momentum in improving the power balance between major card brands and smaller merchants that began with the adoption of the Code of Conduct for the Credit and Debit Card Industry in Canada," said Dan Kelly, CFIB president. "For years, CFIB has encouraged the payments industry to close the gap between the rates small businesses pay and those available to large firms. The new agreements with Visa, Mastercard and American Express provide greater opportunities for small firms to benefit from lower credit card processing fees."

The fees charged by credit card companies have an unseen impact on all levels of the economy. They have been estimated to total as much as \$5 billion per year and ultimately find their way into the prices Canadians pay for goods and services.

CFIB has been a leader in working to lower credit card processing fees for small business for many years. It was the first group to propose the Code of Conduct, which was adopted in 2010. CFIB also struck separate agreements with the payments industry, giving its members access to lower Mastercard and American Express rates.

"The measures announced today will help small businesses to be more competitive with their larger counterparts," said Corinne Pohlmann, CFIB's senior vice-president for national affairs and partnerships. "We applaud the federal government, Finance Minister Bill Morneau and the major credit card brands for reaching this important agreement."


The top six teams make the playoffs but Selkirk FC's schedule is a tough one down the stretch.






