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Kerri Einarson talks sports psychology with a class at the Comp

Students learn how professional athletes learn mental and physical toughness

Professional curler, Kerri Einarson shared her knowledge competing on the national and international stage with a group of Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School students last week. The informative question and answer session for Samantha Russell's sports psychology class had Einarson sharing personal stories, some strategies she uses when in high-pressure situations and her thought processes in high pressure circumstances.

She started off by sharing her background in sports and how she started on her path to becoming a professional athlete.

"I started curling when I was eight years old, and it was always something I was interested in doing. My uncle was world champion and I really looked up to him so when I saw

him win the Brier and then win the worlds I knew right away that was something I wanted to do," said Einarson

She is a Comp Alumni and has been curling for about 27 years.

"When I step on the ice I'm just like a totally different person. I'm just in the zone and it's a pretty amazing feeling," said Einarson.

Being a professional athlete is an important part of her life but we all have many aspects of ourselves that we need to balance. Balancing her home life and the sport that has become her career is something that Einarson spoke to the class about.

"I recently just quit my job about a vear ago to be able to focus on curling and be able to be at home with my family. I found that was really chal-

Last week BPW Selkirk once again hosted its annual Community Vigil Walk. This walk takes place annually in honour of the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. Residents walked from the Selkirk Friendship Centre with candles to the Selkirk Civic Office where a presentation took place.

The National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women takes place on Dec. 6. It takes place this day in remembrance of the 14 young women at École Polytechnique in Montréal who were murdered over 30 years ago in an act of violent misogyny.

The presentation opened with a welcome from Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson.

"These walks should be in every town, in every city. We can never forget. We have to do these walks. We have to tell other people. They have to look [the École Polytechnique tragedy] up to see what it was about and to understand it and to remember," he said.

Colleen Allan, BPW Selkirk, then introduced Minister responsible for Gender Equity Nahanni Fontaine who spoke about how it wasn't actually that long ago that the École Polytechnique tragedy took place.

"[Folks] should be researching it because it is a part of our history. It's a part of Canadian history, in which 14 women, young women, pursuing their goals of education, trying to live their best life and having opportunities were preyed on, stalked, and slaughtered. I know that a lot of people get a little bit nervous with the language that I use, but violence against women deserves language that really highlights and showcases what we are up against as women," she said.

Allan came back to introduce local Community Policing Officer Cst. Paul Human.

Human read out all 14 names of the women killed in the École Polytechnique tragedy because he wanted residents to really think about them, how they were individuals and how they are no longer here.

Lori Fiddler daycare director of the Selkirk Friendship Centre then came up and discussed the many programs that the Friendship Centre hosts to help families in our communities. There are many factors that influence violence in our community and through their work they look to address some of them.

Allan then came back to the podium and shared her story.

"[The École Polytechnique tragedy] was the first time that people saw the reality that it just was not domestic violence. This was the first time that they witnessed misogyny, and the killing of women and the murder of women [just because they were wom-

en]," said Allan.

Though misogyny and violence against women come in a variety of forms Allan shared a story about how a family member of hers, many years ago, slipped through cracks in the way that domestic violence against women was handled. This relative was being abused by her husband who was an alcoholic.

"The social system at that time, said, if you want help, you have to leave. So, she left," said Allan.

Unfortunately at the time that this happened harassment laws were not in place as they are today.

"She moved to where she thought would be close to her sister. He swore he would kill her," said Allan.

Though Allan's relative called the police because of the threat and stalking behaviour nothing could be done until a crime was committed.

Allan's relative lost her life when the

perpetrator killed her.

Allan says that this experience and the connections that she made in her professional life allowed her to work with others to advocate for change to the mental health act so that situations like this can be acted upon sooner.

"We have made great strides. Sometimes it feels like we have not but we have," said Allan.

She ended the presentation with a prayer for those living in violent situations.

lenging to be able to juggle my work life, my family life and my curling. I would get off a plane at midnight, not get home until 1:30 in the morning, and then get my girls up in the morning, off school and I was off to work. It was really draining," she said.

Dealing with pressure and stressful situations is something that someone competing on Einarson's level knows well.

"At first, it was hard. Being on TV for the first time, like oh, yeah, I was just shaking. It was tough but when you're doing it all the time and getting yourself in big pressure situations you get more relaxed and used to it," she explained.

Some techniques she mentioned using were breathing exercises to slow her heartrate and having a routine when she goes to make a pressure shot already in place so that she's going at a slower pace.

Einarson then took the class through some video clips of her at a previous Scotties Tournament of Hearts bonspiel.

She talked about a situation where she made a momentum changing shot where she felt that change and how she used that energy to propel her and her team forward. She mentioned "celebrating the simple shots," as a way to keep positive energy up. She also discussed a shot she missed saying, "I gave myself 30 seconds to

be absolutely [upset]. My self-talk is like 'Kerri you have to be better.' My self-talk isn't always nice but it's just something that I do to motivate myself to be like, 'No, you can do this,'" said Einarson.

She explained that losses are an important part of sport because you learn from them and then you carry that knowledge forward.

Einarson finished the discussion by giving the students some tips for when they find themselves in high

"It's okay to miss, you're human. It's okay to mess up. It's just part of the game. We're not perfect. It happens so don't be so hard on yourself. Knowing to forgive yourself and be like, 'Hey, I'll give myself like 30 seconds to be mad,' and get over it and move on. That is something that I've worked extremely hard on and I think that I'm really good at that I can pull myself out pretty quickly," she said.

In his first member's statement at The Legislative Assembly of Manitoba local MLA Richard Perchotte praised Inclusion Selkirk.

Perchotte decided to recognize Inclusion with this first statement because of the work they do.

"All citizens of Selkirk are extremely important to me. I wanted to show honour and respect to the unique and incredible organization of Inclusion Selkirk and all that they do for people living with intellectual disabilities and their families," said Perchotte in an email to the *Record*.

He said he was very proud to be able to showcase Inclusion.

Maria Freeman the executive director of Inclusion Selkirk said that it was a great honour to be acknowledged.

"There are so many great organizations within our community that he could have chosen. Having him choose us felt really, really positive that all the work we've done around community development has been recognized and noticed. "It means a lot to me because Inclusion does a lot of things for us," said Croy.

Freeman thanks Perchotte for using this opportunity to honour Inclusion

Selkirk.

Evaluate ice conditions before heading onto the river and lake this winter

The Manitoba government is reminding ice fishers and outdoor enthusiasts to carefully evaluate ice conditions before venturing onto Manitoba lakes and rivers due to the warmer than usual weather, Economic Development, Investment, Trade and Natural Resources Minister Jamie Moses announced.

"Manitoba has a lot to offer for those who enjoy winter activities like ice fishing, cross-country skiing and ice skating on our waterbodies, especially with the recent mild weather conditions," said Moses. "We want to remind people to keep themselves and their families safe by thoroughly checking ice conditions, and by following local municipal rules, before they venture onto lakes and rivers."

This time of year, especially in southern Manitoba, ice is still forming and could be dangerously thin.

'Check conditions often as you travel across the ice as ice thickness can vary from one location to the next,"

said Moses.

Last week the RM of East St. Paul issued a reminder to residents to please stay off of retention ponds because the ice is unpredictable, can be thin, and extremely dangerous.

The email blast from the RM explained, "Melting snow can combine with sanding salt and when it flows into the ponds it can cause the ice to melt and thin very quickly."

Recreational activities like skating and hockey are not allowed on the ponds nor are patio furniture and equipment of any kind. This is because though the ice might look safe it could be susceptible to cracking.

Local artist Brandi Vezina wins country music award

A Winnipeg musician who grew up in Stony Point is the winner of Manitoba Country Music Association's NCI FM Indigenous Country Music Award.

Brandi Vezina received the honour in November at the association's annual awards night. She also had nominations for female artist, interactive artist and video of the year.

"It's an honour to be able to make music, let alone have people listen to my music," said Vezina. "I'm just grateful that my hard work has been recognized."

Vezina grew up in a musical Métis family in Stony Point, the traditional name for Patricia Beach Provincial Park. While she loved music, she didn't pursue it as a career right away. She earned degrees in environmental science and teaching and started working as a teacher.

She enjoyed working in the classroom, but something was missing.

"My passion for my music, I wasn't utilizing it, so I was getting pretty depressed, to be honest," she said. "I decided to get serious about my music and really learn about the industry and go to all the conferences I could, especially during the pandemic, and just learn about the business aspect of music, and as a result, I'm very thankful I've had a lot of success."

Vezina took a leave of absence as a teacher to pursue music, and after returning to the classroom, she reduced her contract to part time to continue focusing on music.

Her music is categorized as country, though she's inspired by many genres. She grew up in a country music-loving family, but she also loved rock and roll.

"My producer, Murray Pulver (who played with Crash Test Dummies and Doc Walker), made it very clear in the beginning of us working together that what I'm doing is authentic to me, and I'm not chasing a different sound. I want to make music that I love," she said.

"I love classic country. I love the fiddle. I love the steel guitar. I grew up on Patsy Cline and Johnny Cash and Loretta Lynn, so you can hear that in my music. I'm not a pop country star. That's not my intention. I'm staying in my own lane and making music that I love, and I like writing songs that are meaningful to me."

Among many themes, her music touches on relationships, hardships and her sobriety, something she said has had a major influence on her life.

"I wouldn't be making music today if I wasn't sober," said Vezina, who's been sober for 11 years. "It's interwoven in there."

She said her family and culture have also been major influences on her life and music. Vezina's grandmother even sings on one of her tracks, "Dodged a Bullet."

In Stony Point, she and her mom lived with Vezina's grandparents, and her grandparents and uncle helped raise her. She remembers often going to Selkirk with her papa, a fisherman, to deliver freshwater fish.

Vezina's new single "Old Fashioned Values" is about learning from your grandparents and passing on those traditions.

"I can't separate my music from my culture. It's just a piece of who I am," she said. "I am proud to be Red River Métis, no matter where I go. I carry that with me."

Leaving her secure teaching position was a big risk, but it's paid off, Vezina said. Her music has had lots of airtime since the release of her first single in 2019, and she's played many shows throughout Manitoba.

"It's time for me to expand outside of Manitoba and make authentic relationships with other artists and music industry professionals outside of Manitoba because my intention is to be a touring artist, and it's just a matter of time," she said. "It's happening. It's coming."

Dates for upcoming shows and links to Vezina's music, including her 2023 release "No More Tears This Christmas," can be found on her website (brandivezina.com). She will be releasing new music in 2024.

For her upcoming EP, Vezina has worked with songwriters from across North America, including songwrit-

ers from Nashville signed to the music publishing company Warner Chappell. She has also been working with a writing team in Alberta.

"I continue to push myself to work with artists who are more skilled songwriters and people who have more experience than myself, but I think I've been able to move pretty quickly as a result of my hard work and my determination," she said.





Book by local author raises money for aid in Ukraine

Kaitlin Vitt is a reporter with the Selkirk Record. In 2017, she published the book Planted: Stories From Manitoba's Natural World, which she rereleased in 2022 to raise money for aid in Ukraine. Below, she shares the inspiration behind the book and how you can support her fundraising efforts.

There's a network of threads beneath the earth connecting plants to one another, allowing the transfer of nutrients. This web, the mycelium, is the root-like structure of fungi and, if stretched out, can cover thousands of kilometres.

Throughout life, I've often felt the connectedness of everything, my interests weaving together, the people I meet one day showing up years later, the experiences I have today shaping my tomorrow — much like the mycelium joining together the natural world.

My Ukrainian ancestors had a deep love and appreciation of nature, with the natural world appearing in songs, traditions and folk beliefs. This love was passed on to me and bloomed while growing up in St. Andrews, playing outside in the forest beside my parents' house and going critter dipping in the ditches in the front yard.

My interest in science and writing led me to publish my book *Planted: Stories From Manitoba's Natural World* in 2017. In the style of narrative nonfiction, I share the experiences of eight people who are inspired by nature and have stories to tell because of it.

There's the survival story of Nadia, my godmother's aunt, who got lost in the forest while searching for mushrooms near Stead. There's the story of Les, someone I met at the opening of a new walkway when I worked for a rural newspaper, and his story of coming across a hard-to-find orchid. There's the story of Dave, a Wisdom Keeper I met through someone else I interviewed, who invited me on a medicine walk.

I made revisions to *Planted*, including updates to some chapters and new illustrations by my sister, Rayna Meakin, and rereleased the book in 2022 to raise money for aid in Ukraine as it defends itself against Russia.

My family has always celebrated our Ukrainian roots, through Ukrainian dance, holiday customs and traditional dishes. In 2017 to 2018, I had the opportunity to live in Ukraine to study dance, language and culture. I visited with family, met many friends and got to know the country of my ancestors in a deeper way.

When Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine started in February 2022, I think like many people, I experienced lots of emotions, like anger, heartbreak and helplessness but also so much hope for Ukraine.

In addition to raising awareness about the war, making donations can have a major impact on helping

Ukrainians defend themselves and rebuild their country, which is what inspired me to republish *Planted* to raise money for Ukraine.

The book costs \$25, with free shipping or delivery, and \$12.50 from each book sold goes toward aid in Ukraine. Each time I sell 60 books, I donate to a different organization providing aid in Ukraine.

So far, I've donated \$775 to Lifeline Ukraine, \$770 to Cobblestone Freeway Foundation, \$770 to Ukrainian Patriot, \$997 to Come Back Alive and \$860 to the Educational Cultural and Art Center Aelita. (Whenever people give me more than \$25 for the book, I donate the extra money to whatever organization I'm raising for at the time.)

The Interlake Handmade Boutique showcases local talent

Step into the world of local artisans and talented vendors at the Interlake Handmade Boutique, a hidden gem nestled within Gimli's Lakeview Resort on First Ave. This cozy and inviting space is a haven for local artists, vendors, and small businesses to showcase their talents and creations. It's the brainchild of Anita McAlinden, a passionate individual who recognized the need for a year-round market to support vendors from local outdoor markets.

This boutique is a testament to the creativity and craftsmanship found right here in our own backyard. McAlinden and her husband Robert purchased their future retirement home in the area in 2013, and moved here permanently in 2016 from Winnipeg. They enjoyed attending local farmers markets and came to know many of the vendors over the next few years. Although the vendors were able to sell their wares throughout the summer months, as soon as the school year began, the markets began to dismantle and many vendors were left to their own devices until the Christmas markets began. Having a year round place to sell their products all week long rather than just on weekends made perfect sense to McAlinden, and therefore she created the Interlake Handmade Boutique.

The Interlake Handmade Boutique opened its doors in November 2020, welcoming around 20-25 dedicated vendors eager to share their crafts with customers far and wide. However, just days after its grand opening came unexpected restrictions due to COVID-19. But McAlinden didn't let that deter her passion or commitment to supporting local artisans.

Adapting swiftly, she turned towards Facebook advertising as a means of reaching customers during this challenging time. Curbside pickup became the norm while free delivery options were extended even as far as Winnipeg.

"I still worked in the city so this was an option', explained McAlinden.

"In January of 2021 we were able to open the shop with restrictions in place. Our capacity was normally 19 at the time when the shop was half its size. With the restrictions in place only 2 people were allowed in to shop at one time, but somehow we made it work."

Linda Weshnoweski was one of the first vendors on board with the idea of a year round shop to sell her home made preserves and jams. Weshnoweski grew up on a farm and has been gardening and canning for over 50

years.

"My 'From Lindas' Kitchen' preserves and jams are all garden to table, or made with hand picked wild berries and berries grown in my own garden," said Weshnoweski.

"My biggest sellers are my diabetic jams that I make with Monk Sugar, and my Million Dollar Relish," she smiled, "however I don't do it for profit, I do it out of love of the process".

"Everybody needs to have this type of shop in their communities", expressed Weshnoweski.

Marlane Lillian Mazur, known as the Coffee Shop Writer, had written her first book entitled *101 Blessings in* 2016.

"I just decided I wanted to write about all the good things that happened to me', Mazur said. In 2019, Mazur wrote her second book, 101 *Promises*.

"Interlake Handmade Boutique approached me two years ago and I now have my books and paintings for sale in their store. Rob suggested a trilogy, and so I wrote *101 Roads*, which will be out this month. Rob has made me a lot more outgoing. He would call me over to the store and say 'someone wants to meet you', and so I would go", said Mazur.

Etch N Ideas is a local small business that offers laser engraving on slate, wood, and glass, as well as

include gold tee tags, pet bowls, cutting boards and key chains.

McAlinden said we have grown to have over 70 different vendors and needed more space so we added the shop next door and took out the wall.

Although the shop was run by McAlinden, while her husband worked elsewhere, he often offered to work on Sundays so that she was able to catch up with other tasks.

"These days became known as 'his days' at the shop", said McAlinden.

Sadly, Robert McAlinden passed away on June 25 of this year at the age of 52.

"I recently realized that this is where I was supposed to be when I lost him," said McAlinden.

"The support from the vendors, business owners, customers and towns people has been incredible. They have given me the strength I need to move for-

Like the mycelium underground, sometimes things in life are connected in ways we can't always see. But one small thread can lead to something bigger —a mushroom, a book, a life's journey.

Make plans for a safe ride home this holiday season

Local RCMP officer recommends people have plans and backup plans to make sure they get home safely

The holiday season is a time of togetherness and celebration. Part of many people's holiday traditions involve going to gatherings where alcohol is served. Local Community Policing Officer Cst. Paul Human wants to remind people that they should have plans in place ahead of time to make sure that they get home safely at the end of their celebrations.

"There's nothing worse than if you had a celebration at your house or an event and somebody was hurt or killed because of an accident that could have been prevented. We all talk about 'Oh, it's storming out, I shouldn't be driving to Winnipeg,' or 'I shouldn't be driving at all,' and yet, when we've had one or two drinks, we think, 'Oh, I'll be fine. I'll be fine. I'll get home Okay, I've been doing it for years.' I hear that all the time from people who have been pulled over and I know they've been drinking. The thing is, with alcohol and with

other intoxicating substances, such as marijuana, or illicit drugs, they all affect us differently," said Human.

He said that depending on your genetics, the amount of sleep you've had, and how much you've eaten lately even the same person may process substances and alcohol differently.

"Here's the rule. If you have one, don't drive. If you've had illicit substances or marijuana, don't drive," said Human.

There are many options that people can use to get home safely. Taxis or rideshare services are options but people can also plan to have friends or family pick them up or even plan to stay the night if they are at someone's home that has room.

The step that keeps you and others safest is making these plans before you take your first drink. Human

says that in addition to your main plans, you should also have some backup options.

"Have a plan B, and C. I've always instructed my children and the younger generation, if you're somewhere and you need a ride home, I don't care what time it is [if I'm your parent.] If you don't have parents like that, set up something like that. Maybe have an additional friend [that you can ask, 'Hey, can I make you my emergency call? Can I make you that person that I can call at two in the morning to come pick me up?' And if you've got a best friend like that, they'll all say yes and it can go back and forth," said Human.

He also notices that people who drink while impaired also bring up the fact that they can't leave their vehicle behind or need it the next morning. The best way to make sure that isn't an issue is to not bring your vehicle in the first place. If you get a ride or taxi to the celebration, this becomes a non-issue.

Residents should also take into account that substances like marijuana *Cont. on next page*

or even certain prescription medications can impair them as well. If a substance says not to operate heavy equipment or even if it has the side effect of causing drowsiness, caution should be taken.

Human says, because of holiday parties, the RCMP does notice that there are more drivers who are intoxicated regardless of the time of day or day of the week at this time of year.

He also confirmed that there will be checkpoints once again throughout the region.

"We start in December and go right till January," said Human.

Residents should know if they are caught drinking and driving there are some pretty serious consequences.

"Number one, you'll be arrested and charged under the



Criminal Code for impaired operation of a motor vehicle, which means you'll have to go to court at a later date. If you're going to court, you're very likely going to need a lawyer, which is going to cost you money. Your driver's license is immediately suspended, which means you cannot operate a motor vehicle. So that privilege is taken away and your vehicle gets towed which means it'll also be held for a number of days and when it's held, you get charged daily," said Human.

This is just what happens if it's your first offence. Repeat offenders have

more serious consequences. Human says that this is actually get-

ting off lightly. "If I got you at a checkstop that's actually a really good thing. I'd rather catch you at a checkstop, than do a breathalyzer or do a breath demand or blood demand in the hospital after you've been in an accident. So, please don't drink and drive," he said.

He urges everyone to be safe this holiday season.

"This year let's make it better, plan, and have a fantastic Christmas season," said Human.

Selkirk Judo Club athletes competed at the Manitoba Provincial Championships held in Winnipeg on Dec. 10 and returned with three gold and one silver medal.

Eva Everett won gold in U14 Female under 58 kg, while Daniel and Sarah Ekosky won provincial championships in U21 Male under 81 kg and U21 Female under 70 kg, respectively. Sarah's win at provincials came the day after she earned her seconddegree black belt (nidan) following a grading test before the Provincial Grading Board at the University of Manitoba.

"On Judo Can-

ada's grading points system, Sarah needed 170 points to be eligible to test for nidan. In only two years since her last grading, she accumulated over 650 points, mostly based on her competitive wins," said Brian Jones, one of the club's coaches.

Some of those points were earned on a recent trip to Montreal with the provincial team. On Nov. 11-12, Sarah and her brothers, Daniel and Damien, competed at the Quebec Open.

Sarah placed third in the U21 Female under 63 kg division. Daniel finished just off the podium in fifth place in U21 Male under 81 kg, while Damien was seventh in Senior Men under 73 kg.

kg. "The Quebec Open is the largest tournament in Canada with around 1,200 entries this year. Our athletes had good performances in a very difficult tournament," said Jones.

Following a training camp at the

National Training Centre, Daniel and Sarah then competed in the Montreal Pan Am Cup held on Nov. 16-19, an international event drawing competitors from across Canada as well as teams from numerous other countries including the U.S., Brazil, Denmark, Great Britain and Slovenia. Sarah won a gold medal in the U21 Female under 63 kg division at this tournament.

Sarah will next compete at the Elite 8 National Championships which will be held in Edmonton on Jan. 13-14.
