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Selkirk history buff marks milestone

Popular author celebrates 90th birthday with walk down memory lane

For former Selkirk resident Ken Howard, cruising up and down the city's streets now is like taking a trip back in time.

"It evokes a lot of memories much of which there's no trail of up until this point," Howard said sitting at the head of his dining room table inside his Winnipeg home recently."Where I had most fun as a kid was at the dock, of course that dock doesn't exist anymore."

Howard, who turned 90 years young last Saturday, can still picture what the city looked like in the early 1940's while he collected stories for the then edition of the Selkirk Record.

"It was a wonderful time," Howard said with a smile. "I wrote editorials, and features and stuff like that ... in the same building that it occupies now."

At that time, he had completed high school at Selkirk's Devonshire Collegiate Institute and was starting university in Winnipeg where he would later go on to complete two masters' degrees.

Howard holds his memories of growing up in Selkirk close, as he believes there hasn't been a reasonable approach to documenting the city's history, which is why years ago he de-

cided to do something about it.

It's been nearly four years now since Howard released his book "Stories of Selkirk's Pioneers and Their Heritage." The book was printed to commemorate Selkirk's 125th anniversary and is dedicated to Howard's late grandmother, father, and mother and to "all Selkirk, Manitoba's pioneers, upon whose shoulders we stand."

As Howard flips through a copy of

his self-published 506-page book, it's easy to see it's one of his greatest life achievements. The book, which took him eight years to write, includes stories from the more than 100 interviews he conducted.

"I'd say, 'are you from Selkirk? Tell me about your family. What was it like when you were a kid?' and off we'd go."

Howard's curiosity about his own

father's past is what motivated him to dig deeper into Selkirk's history. But as he talks about how important it is to preserve that history and ensure those stories get shared, Howard struggles to hold back tears.

Recently Howard tried to go back and visit some of the people he interviewed for his book only to learn many of them are no longer alive or are unable to communicate.

"That was a real eye opener for me ... it hit me very hard," he said wiping away tears. "Those wonderful people they're not here and they gave me the privilege of telling their story.

"That's how important it is to me."
Besides combing through provincial archives and old newspapers of the time, Howard said nothing beats hearing a story told straight from someone's mouth.

"Each one of these is their own story," he said holding up his book. "This will benefit so many people ... and it's never ending."

As for Howard's own story, it's not even close to coming to an end. Even at the age of 90, he shows no signs of slowing down.

He's currently in the process of moving into a new home and continues to write a history column for the Record.

He's also working on a new project, a book about Selkirk's steamboat era, that he hopes to finish in the near future.

As for his 90th birthday plans, Howard said family and friends are making their way to Winnipeg later this month for a special gathering.





7th annual Ride for Dad raises over \$261K

More than 1,200 riders help raise funds for prostate cancer research

The sounds of engines throttling echoed throughout much of the Interlake and Selkirk on Saturday as more than 1,200 bikers made their way from Winnipeg to Gimli for the seventh annual Ride for Dad.

"We're ecstatic, the ride today went off today without a hitch," spokesman Ed Johner said Saturday.

Although numbers weren't finalized, as of Saturday evening more than \$261,000 had been raised during the ride for prostate cancer research.

That means Ride for Dad has now raised more than one million dollars since it began seven years ago, Johner

He added a few bikers went out of their way this year collecting pledges noting two men raised more than \$20,000 each, while many more individuals also collected thousands in donations by themselves.

"It's just phenomenal how it's grown over the years," Johner said.

Participants paid a \$30 registration fee to take part in the day-long ride that kicked off at Polo Park in Winni-

Riders made stops in Selkirk and other towns while on their way to

"We're big on the Interlake," Johner said. "Really the ride virtually spends the whole day between Winnipeg and the Interlake."

In Gimli, the town's main drag was shut down completely to allow for motorcycle-only parking.

"It looked like a mini Sturgis it

was absolutely incredible," Johner said.

Morris resident Jack Courtemanche made the trek to Gimli and stopped in Selkirk around lunchtime for a quick break.

It was his first time taking part in the ride and he said he would definitely be taking part again next year.

"It's a good cause I like it," Courtemanche said.

Johner also made sure to stress the importance of early cancer detection.

In 2007 at the age of 49, he was diagnosed with prostate cancer, and it came

as a shock to Johner who showed no cancer symp-

"So for me early detection was critical and I mean here I am eight years later enjoying life and here to talk about it," Johner said.

His story is similar to many other men across the country.

"1.2 million men in Canada have prostate cancer and 960,000 of them don't realize they have it," Johner said, adding it's important men have conversations with their doctors about prostate cancer.

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

Community groups get \$165K funding boost

Nearly three-dozen charities and community groups got a big boost from the Selkirk and District Community Foundation last Thursday.

More than \$165,000 was disbursed to 32 different area organizations through its 2014 -15 grant program.

Health, education, and heritage nonprofits were among the many who received funding.

Some grant recipients who already received funding for their projects were among the many in attendance that spoke at the event.

"It was so nice to hear from the grant recipients about their programs," Selkirk and District Community Foundation executive director Bev Clegg said.

New grants were also announced for some charities at the annual celebration held at Larters Golf and Country

"It was a great night," Clegg said.

The Selkirk Friendship Centre Daycare received \$7,000 earlier this year to pay for the cost of new outdoor shelters children will learn under.

The centre has a 'Leave No Child Inside' program that sees children play and learn outside as much as possible.

Daycare program co-ordinator Lorie Fiddler said the shelters will mean kids can stay outside all day, noting the children won't be glued to computers and other electronics inside.

"No computers, no iPads, no nothing, because we're just trying to limit that for children and re-connect kids to nature," Fiddler said.

The shelters won't be closed in, but will have roofs that will help keep ev-

"Even if there's rain or UV factor we can still be outside underneath our shelter," Fiddler said.

Foundation chair Kelly Lewis said their list of donors is growing, but stressed the importance of reaching out to others since many still don't understand how the foundation works, she said.

RCMP probe alleged community club fraud

RCMP have launched an investigation into financial irregularities at the St. Andrews Community Club after a substantial amount of money was allegedly spent on purchases it has no record of.

The police probe was launched last month after board members with the community club filed a complaint with Mounties.

The club has not been able to complete financial reports for the 2011 and 2012 fiscal years, and still has no explanation for how roughly \$90,000 was spent on credit cards it used to have.

"We have a lot of finances that we still can't finalize," St. Andrews Community Club finance chair Patrick Gordon said.

Gordon, who is also the club's former president, said the questionable finances stem as far back as five years.

"We found a few irregularities with the financials and we've taken the records that we've put together into the RCMP, and they're in the process of doing an investigation," he said.

Gordon added an internal audit done by a charted accountant raised some red flags. He said when the

club began looking into its past Visa records it became clear suspicious spending occurred.

"We put a fairly strong case together that we think stuff went on and we've taken that case to the RCMP," Gordon said.

Last August, club president Kurt Procter told the *Record* nearly \$90,000 in purchases made during the 2012 year could not be accounted for.

Last week, Procter said since the investigation is ongoing he could not

confirm the amount of suspected fraud police are investigating. However, he said it's fair to say the amount of questionable spending is "substantial."

RCMP spokesperson Sgt. Bert Paquet said it's not too late for charges to be laid if there was any criminal wrongdoing that occurred at the club.

"Depending on the specific charge, some investigations can go back several years, and still be prosecuted," Paquet said via email.

The St. Andrews Community Club was in financial ruins three years ago. Alarm bells went off when Manitoba Hydro phoned Procter informing him the power would be cut off to the building since the club's utility bills had gone unpaid.

At the time the club was running a deficit of nearly \$80,000.

The phone call triggered the founding of a new finance committee after a new board was formed, in addition to the internal investigation, which left more questions than answers about the club's finances.

"It was difficult to get answers from the previous board," Procter said.

Changes were also made to accounting practices at the club including a new mandatory receipt rule for all reimbursements.

"If you don't have receipts and justification for spending that money and a board approval we don't reimburse you for it," Procter said.

The club also stopped relying on credit for its purchases. It cancelled its two credits cards and no longer uses a line of credit, Gordon said.

Gordon told a small audience at the club's annual general meeting last Tuesday its finances are now back in order.

"We have a balanced budget going forward."







St. Andrews council debates fees for sewage haulers

St. Andrews council members are trying to put a stop to septic haulers dumping their sewage into a lagoon the RM owns free of charge.

The RM took the first step in banning the practice by giving first reading to a new bylaw that outlines fees for sewage haulers at their council meeting last Tuesday.

The bylaw states haulers will have to pay a fee ranging from \$20 to \$40 every time they discharge a load into the lagoon, which has been stagnant for months.

The funds collected will be put aside into a reserve fund that will pay for the construction of a new lagoon.

"We need to put money aside in the reserve because we're going to have to build another lagoon someday," Coun. Russ Paradoski said.

Deputy Mayor Laurie Hunt expressed concern over the set fees haulers could have to pay, adding they may be unfair as sewage truckloads can vary.

Coun. Rob Hogg said the RM can't monitor the size of every load that is dumped into the lagoon.

"There's no way in the world that we can regulate those kind of situations unless we have somebody at the lagoon 24 hours a day," Hogg said.

The Petersfield Lagoon has been full for months and sewage haulers have been forced to take their waste to a neighbouring municipality or the City of Winnipeg.

This caused an uproar amongst some residents who claimed their sewage bills skyrocketed after their septic providers had to make the move.

The Record reported earlier this year septic companies from other municipalities were dumping in the lagoon for free, when they shouldn't have been at the time it reached capacity.

Crews are currently working to remove sludge on the lagoon so dumping can resume.

Council said it hopes the lagoon will be back in full operation by the middle of June.

Green Team wages lowered

Two students working for the RM this summer won't be receiving as high of a salary they may have been hoping for. A report tabled at council states the students will be paid

\$16.37 per hour, and not \$19 and change as council said during its last meeting.

Coun. Joy Sul expressed concern over the two jobs and



asked why there was no formal job description for the positions.

She also asked what determined the students' wages.

Mayor George Pike wasn't sure if a union contract applies to the jobs, but said he would look into the matter.

Paradoski said he thinks residents would be happy to know the RM is hiring two students who will work over the summer to keep the community looking clean.

"It goes towards improving our community," he said.

The students are expected to do low-key jobs like painting signs, trimming grass, and other tasks regular workers can't get to.

The province will pay for a portion of the students' wages through the provincial Green Team program.

CAO still absent

There was a different face sitting in the CAO's chair last Tuesday.

Assistant chief administrative officer Deb Murphy filled in for Sue Sutherland who was absent from council.

Sutherland has been on paid leave, but was expected to be at the meeting.

Pike explained Sutherland is now on sick leave and didn't know when she would be retuning to work.

Hi, my angling friends.



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St. Andrews couple still shaken by double tragedy

Friend who escaped blaze recovering from her injuries

Tony and Ana Herntier have had the unthinkable happen to them, but the St. Andrews couple is still full of joy and doesn't appear to be dwelling on a double tragedy that has shaken their

The tragic loss of Gracie, their seven-year-old granddaughter who was mauled to death last year by Alaskan malamutes, combined with the loss of the family's home to an April fire that nearly killed Ana and a visiting friend has left the couple on edge.

On April 13 sometime around midnight, Ana noticed the smell of smoke while her friend Judy Bailey-Smith slept unaware of a fire that had begun to rip through the St. Andrews home on Schreyer Crescent.

The night is still a blur for Bailey-Smith, but she remembers putting pillows in front of the bedroom door while Ana began to head for the win-

She tried to phone 911, but had difficulty because of the "horrible" black smoke that started to pour into the

"I was pressing the numbers and they were all lit up nice and big and bright, but I couldn't see them and I was getting mad because I didn't have my glasses," Bailey-Smith said.

After pushing Bailey-Smith through the window of the second-storey room, Ana made the decision to jump onto a roof of a sunroom before eventually making a final leap to the ground.

"The fire was taking over so we had a choice, we either had to jump or go with it," Ana said.

Bailey-Smith was scared and remained on the roof until firefighters arrived. Although reluctant at first, she jumped and landed partially into one's arms.

"I just said I got to go so I went," she said.

Both women say if they didn't escape as quickly as they did they wouldn't be alive today.

"We could have both been dead within 10 minutes," Bailey-Smith said.

The thought of the fire constantly haunts the woman, who is still recovering from her injuries.

Bailey-Smith received a black eye, broke her heel, has difficulty walking,

and still can't drive.

"It was horrible," she said tearfully last Sunday.

Ana escaped the fire with minor injuries, but the real pain for her and her husband, who was not home at the time of the fire, has been the loss of Gracie's belongings the couple cherished after she died.

Many were stored in a memorabilia

box in a room dedicated to her mem-


"That's all gone," Ana said.

The Herntier's said they plan on rebuilding their home and are currently staying in a rental home in East St.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

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Zebra mussels found lurking in Red River

Officials say the invasive species were recently found underneath a dock near Selkirk Park

The province appears to be on the losing end of the war it started with zebra mussels last year, and has now lost its fight to keep the invasive species from entering the Red River.

The mussels were recently found underneath a dock near Selkirk Park meaning the species are now in the Red River — something the province vowed it would fight to stop from happening after mussels were found at several Lake Winnipeg docks in 2014.

Conservation and Water Stewardship Minister Tom Nevakshonoff made the announcement in Winnipeg last Friday.

He said the mussels were found on the float underneath a dock and appeared to be dead. Officials believe they were likely from last year, but one was still "firmly" attached to the dock's float.

The announcement took Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson by surprise.

"It's just sad that they're here," Johannson said. "We're very very concerned."

The mayor said the City of Selkirk will do whatever it can to deal with the

problem, but Johannson wasn't oblivious to the fact the muscles spawn at extremely rapid rates and are nearly impossible to eradicate once they've entered a waterway.

"We have to look at a way to eradicate them all together," Johannson said. "They're like a bad weed. If you leave it untreated it just multiplies and I think the bigger problem is trying to get the muscles out of the Red



River and the lakes."

Zebra mussels can grow up to five centimeters long, attach themselves to solid objects, plug drains, affect fish and other aquatic life, and even sink buovs.

"Fighting the expansion of this highly invasive species takes a concerted effort by everyone who enjoys our lakes and rivers," Nevakshonoff said.

A handful of decontamination units have already been set up throughout the province and conservation officers will continue to check boats the invasive species may have clung onto, a press release stated last Friday.

Conservation officials also plan on using a specially trained dog to sniff out the mussels at different boat

launches across the province.

Last year, Manitoba proposed legislation aimed at preventing the spread of zebra mussels.

The legislation would prohibit the possession, transportation, and release of the mussels, and require trailered watercrafts to stop for inspections.

Johannson said the city plans to support remediation efforts at Selkirk Park again this year.

The process sees boats washed and dried when they leave the water, but Johannson ultimately wants to find a solution to what is now a very big problem.

"We want to do our part," he said.

Suspicious envelopes sent to courts not harmful: RCMP

RCMP say a string of suspicious envelopes that arrived at Provincial Court buildings across Manitoba last month were not harmful and have tested negative for dangerous substances.

However, several people felt ill after opening the

suspicious packages sent from China including two court staffers in Thompson, who suffered shortness of breath, burning eyes and throat.

From April 8 to April 23, a total of 16 packages were received at Manitoba law courts buildings, RCMP said last Tuesday.

Mounties say the packages contained courtrelated paperwork sent by a Chinese national, but the documents had no standing in Canadian courts.

RCMP added they don't believe any criminality was involved with the packages sent to Manitoba courts, but a national investigation is continuing.

The suspicious envelopes have been arriving at courts across the country, and some people had fallen ill after opening the packages. In April, the provincial court building

on Eaton Avenue in Selkirk received two of the suspicious envelopes from Hong Kong.

A source said the two envelopes contained a number of documents, and no one got sick after opening the packages.

RCMP spokesperson Sgt. Bert Paquet said there are a few possible reasons the employees in Thompson fell ill.

He said the type of containers the packages were shipped in from overseas could potentially be to blame, noting harmful substances could have been in the containers prior the shipping of the envelopes in them.

"Although some employees in Thompson may have experienced a variety of symptoms, the chemical and biological tests done on the packages and their contents were all negative for contaminants when they were analyzed," Paquet said.



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Local RCMP officers recognized for high-risk arrest

Four Selkirk RCMP members were recognized for their quick thinking and actions at this year's RCMP "D" Division Medals and Awards Ceremony.

All four constables were presented with a Commanding Officer's Certificate of Appreciation during the event at Lower Fort Garry on May 27.

The group was recognized for their actions during a high-risk arrest following a domestic dispute last year where the suspect threatened the officers with various weapons.

"Based on the course of actions and decisions the officers made at the time, the subject was subsequently arrested without incident," RCMP spokesperson Sgt. Bert Paquet said via email adding two of the officers are still stationed in Selkirk and area.

Not all of the four officers wished to be named so the Record is not naming them or printing their picture.

Among those in attendance at the ceremony last week was Lt.-Gov. Philip S. Lee and Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Manitoba Gord Mackintosh.

"On behalf of the people of Manitoba, I commend you and thank you from the bottom of our hearts," Mackintosh told recipients during the ceremony that was well attended by friends and family members. "You make us proud and you make us safe."

Several current and some retired members of the RCMP were also recognized for 20, 25, 30, 35 and 40 years of service.

Cpl. Kristopher Chornomydz also received the Commanding Officer's Commendation for Bravery for risk-

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Community celebrates student success

Hundreds gather at the Comp for 15th annual event

A long row of evergreen trees spotlighted by sunlight provided the perfect setting for the Comp's 15th annual Promoting Aboriginal Student Success event.

Selkirk and area students waved colourful Métis, Inuit and Canadian flags in the wind as a large group of local dignitaries and community members walked behind them to help kick off the event held at the Comp on May 27.

More than 200 people attended the opening ceremonies and more were expected to arrive throughout the afternoon.

"Today's event is a celebration of student success," Lord Selkirk School Division Supt. Scott Kwasnitza told the crowd, adding the gathering is always a highlight on the division's calendar each year.

PASS was originally started by a small group of students who wanted to ensure all of their classmates were being recognized and celebrated.

The group has now grown to include a youth and adult committee.

"That shows there's a definite need for our students to showcase who they are ... their culture and what they can accomplish later on," said Jacqueline Bercier, PASS adult committee chairperson.

More than 50 volunteers chipped in to help hand out various awards and certificates this year to aboriginal and non-aboriginal students from various schools and grade levels.

Among the group of graduating students being recognized was Grade 12 student Taylor Kent of Brokenhead Ojibway Nation.

Kent, who was forced to miss five months of high school following a bad car accident, credits the Comp's aboriginal student centre for helping her get back on track.

"We have a lot of support with PASS and the aboriginal student centre," Kent said. "My teachers were really understanding ... they helped me."

Nearly 200 students will graduate at the Comp at the end of this month, but only around 70 of those will be selfdeclared aboriginal students, Bercier said, adding that number continues to increase each year.

"It's because we're offering more supports to our aboriginal students,"

she said. "We're making sure they have academic supports, post-secondary supports."

She added when students build bonds at school they are more likely to go on to graduate.

"They need to feel like they're a part of something so that way they don't get lost in the shuffle or become invisible," she said. "We don't want that to happen to any of our students."

Victory for local thalidomide survivor

Selkirk man says annual tax-free compensation payments will 'go a long way'

Selkirk's Paul Murphy and at least 92 other thalidomide survivors will get to live their final years a little easier.

The federal government is now promising ongoing yearly financial support for thalidomide victims after receiving backlash for a compensation announcement it made earlier this year.

Minister of Health Rona Ambrose announced survivors of the 1950's pregnancy drug, which is estimated to have taken as many as 80,000 newborn lives while leaving another 20,000 maimed, will now receive yearly taxfree payments of \$25,000 to \$100,000.

The survivors will also have access to a special fund that will pay for extraordinary medical costs.

"Even in the absence of a legal obligation to provide support, we have a clear moral obligation to help meet the changing needs of survivors," Ambrose said in a statement on May 22.

The announcement was bittersweet for Murphy who is also one of five founding members of the Thalidomide Victims Association of Canada.

The association has fought for victim compensation for years, and two years ago launched a more robust

"We're thankful that we were able to finally get it done," the 52-year-old

amounts promised were fair, he said, "Can one do that?"

Murphy has suffered from the dev-

years and his health has deteriorated in recent years.

Hailed as a "wonder drug" for pregnant woman, thalidomide, a Health Canada approved drug, was a sedative that helped women sleep and combat symptoms of morning sick-

But the notorious killer and disabler had horrific consequences for women who took the drug between 1950 and 1960, and the children inside their fe-

Many children with mothers who took the drug were born with missing or malformed limbs. Babies were also born deaf and blind.

For Murphy, his legs are shorter than normal and he is poor-limbed. He get around.

Murphy said the new annual payments will give him peace of mind and will help him support his family.

"It will certainly go a long way."

The federal government did provide one-time payments ranging from \$52,000 to \$82,000 to thalidomide victims in 1991, but as survivors aged and costs associated with their disabilities rose, many pressed for more.

In March, the government announced survivors would receive one-time tax-free payment of \$125,000, and access to a \$168 million assistance fund, but the announcement also faced criticism from victims who said it wasn't enough.

Murphy said discussions about an additional compensation package were made years ago, "but it never came through."

He added the best part of the new announcement is survivors without an income will now have a yearly pension.

He also thanked the federal government, the Opposition, the Liberals, and the media for their continued coverage on thalidomide survivors.

He said the media coverage victims

received was phenomenal and helped to keep their fight in the public eye.

A total of 92 eligible survivors have already received the one-time, taxfree payments to cover their immediate needs. There may also be more eligible survivors that haven't come forward yet.

New individuals who believe they are thalidomide survivors have another six months to contact Health Canada.



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Doors Open sheds light on Selkirk's history

The doors to history were opened in Selkirk and neighbouring municipalities on Sunday.

Ten different buildings including churches, houses and even a bar, all with some kind of unique history, were open to the public on Sunday afternoon.

One of the historic buildings featured was the Bunn House in Lockport.

Built in 1862 by Samuel Taylor, the home belonged to Thomas Bunn who is credited with crafting the Bill of Rights that smoothed Manitoba's entry into Confederation in 1870.

History buff Rob Sarginson, who is also the chair of the Red River North Regional Heritage Group, said Bunn was a skilled Métis lawyer who wrote sections that guaranteed rights for education, religion, and language in Manitoba.

"He basically put Riel's ideas into the bill of rights for Manitoba and this formed the main part of the Manitoba Act," Sarginson said.

Bunn had the house built for his wife and children after flooding forced the family to leave their Winnipeg home in 1852. The lawyer had promised his wife a house that wouldn't flood, Sarginson said.

He added the house, which was built in 1862, is the oldest in St. Clements

and to this day hasn't flooded.

Winnipeg resident Esther Dueck and her daughter Janice visited Selkirk's oldest house on Pacific Avenue.

F.W. Colcleugh, one of Selkirk's for-

mer mayors lived in the home, as did American journalist Emma Shaw who was sent by an editor to write about the Red River rebellion, said Shirley Muir, the owner of the home. "THE MERCH HAS DONE VERY WELL OVER THE LAST 138 YEARS.

The Dueck's lived in Selkirk years ago and heard about the history tour on the radio and decided to come out to the event, which mirrors a similar annual event in Winnipeg.

Janice said she was happy to learn about some history that was right in front of her yet hidden for years.

"For me, as a child growing up here you walk by all these old houses and things and I never really thought about it," she said.

Selkirk's Merchant's Hotel was also part of Sunday's event.

Sarginson said the hotel was built by John Christian Schultz, Manitoba's fifth Lieutenant Governor, and was a hub for drinking in the city.

Labourers coming off boats at the nearby docks frequented the bar, he said.

"This place was kind of the crux of a social situation," Sarginson said noting the hotel has always offered folks a place to drink. "The Merch has done very well over the last 138 years."

City teams up with Recycle Everywhere program

80 new dual-stream receptacles popping up throughout Selkirk

The City of Selkirk wants to help make recycling easier and more convenient by teaming up with the Canadian Beverage Container Association's Recycle Everywhere program.

A cost-shared investment of \$100,000 has helped place 80 Recycle Everywhere dual-stream garbage and recy-

cling receptacles from the Waterfront to Selkirk Park and transit stops to street corners throughout the city.

The program is replacing the city's previous system which involved both garbage and recycling bins but not necessarily in the same location.

"We are grateful for our partnership with Recycle Everywhere," Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said in a release on May 22. "Together we are investing into this important green infrastructure for our community."

Recycle Everywhere is Canada's first permanent province-wide, away-from-home beverage container recycling program.

Recycle Everywhere has partnered with communities across Manitoba and provided them with the best recycling bins designed to suit their space.

Selkirk CAO Duane Nicol said improving public access to recycling is

all part of the city's Strategic Plan to improve its environmental stewardship

"With the new system there will be a recycling container attached to the garbage container, so there's parity," Nicol said. "We've also selected better locations; strategically placing the dual-stream containers in prime spots."

Nicol said the dual-stream system will also help reduce what's referred to as "recycling contamination" or the amount of garbage going into the recycling stream.

Selkirk residents have a long history of embracing the environment. According to Multi-Material Stewardship Manitoba's most recent statistics, Selkirk residents recycle almost one million kilograms, or 99.14 kgs per capita, per year, which is the highest rate among municipalities reporting in the Interlake region.

Canada said strides are being made in regards to research about the disease.

She told a packed parking lot on Sunday that Canadians are more susceptible to getting MS and stressed the need for a cure.

She said there have been recent developments in stem cell research, but the results of the research, which is still taking place won't be known for another two or three years.

The research is examining how tissue responds to stem cells extracted time if the goal was met.

from a person's hip when they are reinjected into the body.

"There is real hope," she said noting a clinical trial with 40 Canadians is currently taking place.

For Allardice, hope is what keeps him going.

"You can live with MS if you have a positive attitude and just keep plugging away," Allardice said.

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
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Derlago commits to Utica College next season

Heenan likes what Derlago brings to his


"Justin skates well, has shown a knack for the net, and has exhibited tremendous character in our interactions,"Heenan said. "We welcome Justin to Pioneer nation."



Cheddar-Parmesan Poutine with Gravy

Preparation

Soak cut potatoes in cold water overnight. Before deep-frying, remove potatoes from water and pat dry.

Using deep-fryer, heat canola oil to 375°F. Deep-fry for 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly golden. Remove fries from deep-fryer and drain on paper towels.

If necessary, in saucepan, reheat 2 cups poutine gravy and set aside.

Return fries to deep-fryer and fry for additional 3 to 5 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from deep-fryer to stainless steel bowl. Add gravy, cheese and herbs. Stir gently to combine. Season with salt and pepper. Serve.

Yield 4 servings / Serving size 1 1/2 cups poutine

Preparation

In large saucepan, sweat onion, carrot and celery in canola oil over medium heat until slightly caramelized. Stir frequently. Add sage and tomato paste and sauté for 1 to 2 minutes.

Sprinkle vegetable mixture with flour and combine to form roux. Heat for about 30 seconds. Add stock. Worcestershire sauce and garlic. Simmer for 35 minutes.

Season with rosemary, salt and pepper. Simmer for additional 10 minutes. Using immersion blender, purée gravy. Leftover gravy can be frozen for future use.

Yield 5 cups / Serving size 1/2 cup

Preparation

Heat grill to medium heat.

Cut potatoes in half lengthwise and spoon out the flesh, leaving half-inch shells. Mix garlic and melted butter. Brush potatoes on both sides with garlic butter mixture.

Grill franks 7 to 9 minutes, or until heated through, turning occasionally; slice into rounds. Grill potatoes until crisp, about 4 to 4 1/2 minutes on each side.

Spoon sliced franks into the potato shells; drizzle with barbecue sauce and top with cheese. Grill until the cheese is melted. Top with sour cream and chives.
