Heroic stranger helps rescue 2 men from Red River

Beausejour man now searching for the man who helped save him and his friend

Shawn King says the heroic actions of a total stranger are the reason him and his friend are still alive today after a horrifying incident in Selkirk.

King, who lives in Beausejour, was fishing last Saturday evening at the Selkirk Waterfront with a friend.

He said his friend, who asked not to be named, stood up while they were getting ready to leave around 9:30 p.m., tripped over his chair and fell into the Red River.

King knew his friend could not swim, so he had no choice but to jump in after him.

"I'm not a great swimmer but I knew he wasn't even going to be able to try to swim, he just would not know what to do," King said. "Plus he was wear-

ing full clothes and a jacket and shoes.

"As soon as he went in I just jumped right in."

But once King got in the water, him and his friend started to get caught up in the river's strong current.

"Once I was in the water I tried to get a hold of him, but he kept pulling me down with him," King said. "I screamed for help."

A man who had been fishing nearby with his family then jumped in to try and save the two men.

"Our only contact with him so far had been when he gave us a thumbs up when we caught a fish," King said.

"He jumped in and both of us were able to hold onto him and try to keep his head above water."

Another person on shore also got in-

involved with the rescue.

"A lady threw in a rope, we put the rope around the man's chest so he wouldn't go anywhere," King said. "And the last thing I remember is be-

ing dragged out of the water and I came to in an ambulance."

King said he spent about six hours in emergency after the incident but both he and his friend are OK.

He doubts he or his friend would be alive today without the help of a total stranger.

"Had it not been for him jumping in I would not have been able to keep him above water but I wouldn't have stopped trying, so if he didn't jump in we both would have been washed down shore."

In all the chaos following the incident King was unable to get the name of the man who saved him. He now wants to find him so he can personally thank him.

Making a splash

SwimAbility helping hundreds of children learn how to swim

Justin Hebert could hardly wait to jump into the pool last Saturday.

It was Justin's last swimming lesson until the fall, but if it wasn't for a little-known non-profit, he might not have been swimming at all.

The 12-year-old is one of about 300 students who have or are currently registered in the Manitoba SwimAbility program.

"I enjoy it," he said at the St. James Civic Centre Pool in Winnipeg last Saturday.

The non-profit program offers swimming lessons to children living with special needs, such as Justin, for a fraction of the cost of a regular lesson – it charges just \$2.

"The price of it, you couldn't do better," said Justin's mother Maureen Hebert. "He needs the one-on-one."

Justin's father Trevor Hebert said the volunteers behind SwimAbility are "fantastic."

"It's mostly university students," he said.

He added there are no longer one-on-one swimming lessons available for special-needs students his son's age in Selkirk, which the family calls home.

Liam Menec, 19, is Justin's volunteer swimming instructor.

"I love it," he said.

"I'm just learning how to teach Liam how to swim," Justin joked before his lesson started.

Maureen said she's seen her son's ability to swim improve greatly over the last two years.

"He's adapted from the shallow end to the deep end from coming here," she said.

"Any level of proficiency more than he had is just that much better of a chance he has if something does go

wrong," added Trevor.

The program's goal is to give kids the chance to be in the pool while still teaching them the basics of swimming.

The organization says drowning is the second-leading cause of injury-related death in children, but what's even more troubling is kids living with disabilities are 10 times more likely to drown.

"Cam Krisko (the organization's

founder) kind of saw a need for it," said SwimAbility marketing co-ordinator Courtney Bannatyne. "There wasn't anything in Winnipeg or Manitoba," she said speaking of the low-cost program, which is a chapter of the SwimAbility Canada program.

"We do a lot of fundraising," to keep costs low, she added.

RRC launches investigation into rehab centre staff beatings

Red River College (RRC) has launched an independent investigation after a vicious beating left two women in hospital with brutal injuries.

"In light of the tragic events that occurred on Sunday, May 29, 2016 resulting in the assault of an RRC student and a worker at the Behavioural Health Foundation (BHF) in Selkirk, Manitoba, Red River College is hiring an external investigator to launch an investigation into all circumstances surrounding the incident," RRC announced in a statement last Wednesday.

On May 29, RRC student Jackie Healey, who was on a work placement at BHF, which offers treatment to teens with addictions issues, and one

other female worker were beaten by two teens that used baseball bats and pool balls in socks as weapons.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with Jackie and her family, and the worker who was with her, during this very challenging time," Paul Vogt, president and CEO of RRC said in a press release.

"Our primary focus is on Jackie's recovery and the support we are

able to provide to her, both during and after her recovery."

RRC said the investigation would look at the circumstances surrounding the attack.

It will attempt to determine whether the employer (BHF) was meeting the terms of the agreement that RRC had in place, whether sufficient security and training was provided to the student while on her work placement, and whether the facility met the required standards and expectations that RRC has with their practicum sites.

The investigation will also determine whether RRC is at fault in any way, or if any policies or procedures need to be changed.

Healey, who is now recovering at home from her injuries, said she is happy to hear that RRC will be doing

their own investigation.

"I'm glad that Red River is doing an investigation," Healey said. "They need to know what they did wrong as well as what BHF did wrong in order to make sure this never happens again."

BHF executive director Jean Doucha did not return the *Record's* request for an interview before Monday's press deadline.

A 16 and 17-year-old boy were arrested in Winnipeg for the attack two days after the incident, and RCMP now say a third teen from Selkirk has been arrested for "his role in counselling another person to be party to a criminal offense."

The 16-year-old from Selkirk has been charged with aggravated assault, robbery, unlawful confinement and theft of a motor vehicle.

Rookie St. Andrews councillor appointed to prestigious committee

The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) has promoted a rookie St. Andrews councillor to a prestigious committee.

First-term St. Andrews councillor Joy Sul found out June 7 she has been appointed to serve on the Provincial-Municipal Justice Advisory Committee, after being approved for the committee by the AMM board of directors.

Sul said the committee is made up of six members chosen from across Manitoba, and will focus their work on justice and public safety issues in the province.

"It's really like a task force," Sul said. Sul applied for the position earlier this year and believes her background and experience are the reasons she was selected.

"I'm a former Magistrate so with my background I have the qualifications," Sul said.

Each member selected has to have a resolution passed by his or her individual councils, and Sul said St. Andrews passed the motion unanimously for her to join the committee.

She added that as a rookie councillor she is proud of the appointment.

"I am very happy about this, very proud," Sul said.

In a letter, the AMM congratulated Sul and also St. Andrews for having one of their councillors appointed to the committee.

"I trust your leadership and experience will help improve the safety of local communities throughout Manitoba," AMM executive director Joe Masi said in a letter addressed to Sul and the RM.

Sul was first elected as a councillor in St. Andrews in the 2014 municipal election.

Although the city has already made a list of problem streets, Johansson said they are encouraging residents to come forward to help pinpoint any areas they may have missed.

Crowd gathers to watch rescued eagle release

Event in Lockport sheds light on how trash can be dangerous for animals

A bald eagle looked up to the sky, spread its wings and took flight last weekend for the first time after being rescued and rehabilitated.

A juvenile bald eagle, which was injured after being caught up in fishing line and hooks in Manitoba, was rescued and rehabilitated about two weeks ago by Prairie Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre (PWRC).

PWRC spent two weeks rehabilitating the eagle and it was released back into the wild at an event in the parking lot of Canvasback Pet Supplies in Lockport last Saturday afternoon in front of a crowd.

The eagle seemed a bit shy about taking off in front of the crowd, as it didn't move for almost a minute after its cage had been opened.

A gentle nudge to the back of the cage eventually convinced the animal to take flight and it soared into the sky in front of an awestruck crowd.

Lisa Tretiak, president and co-founder of PWRC said they were lucky to be able to save the eagle.

"We were able to remove all of that right away," Tretiak said referring to the fishing line the eagle was caught up in. "Fortunately it had not been on him for a very long time, and what can

happen with fishing line, is it can get tighter into the skin and cut into the skin, so fortunately that was not on for very long."

The organization, which cared for the eagle for two weeks, and gave it antibiotics to recover, decided to release it back into the wild last Saturday during an event Tretiak said was the perfect moment for the release.

Canvasback Pet Supplies held an event in their parking lot last Satur-

day to create awareness about how leaving fishing line and other trash on the ground and in bodies of water can lead to animals being injured, and in many cases killed.

For the last two weeks Canvasback and local animal advocate Veronica Walsh had been asking residents to bring in trash they found that could hurt animals to the store that sits along Highway 4 in Lockport.

They displayed the trash on a grid

and will now take all that trash and create a work of art with what they have as a way to honour animals that have been hurt or killed by trash, and to show people how much of it is being left around in Manitoba.

They took ideas from residents on Saturday about what they would like the artwork to become and will now start working on the Fly Free-No Strings Attached project.

Winnipeg woman faces multiple charges after St. Andrews stabbing

A woman is facing multiple charges after allegedly stabbing a man with a beer bottle several times in St. Andrews.

On June 17 at approximately 11:51 p.m., members of the Selkirk RCMP responded to a report of a stabbing in St. Andrews.

The initial investigation revealed that a female struck a male inside a residence with a beer bottle then proceeded to stab the male multiple

times.

The male victim was transported to hospital in serious condition and is now in stable condition.

The female, Allison Bowers, 44, of Winnipeg has been charged with attempted murder, assault with a weapon, uttering threats as well as possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose.

She has been remanded into custody and appeared in court on Monday morning.

Cable ferry moved to Selkirk for Norway House

A massive 156-tonne cable ferry being moved from a City of Selkirk building site to a provincial site in Selkirk last Friday will serve the community and area of Norway House First Nation once complete.


The \$3.1-million ferry is about 75 per cent complete and will be finished on land at a provincial yard in Selkirk.

Once complete, C.F. Gilbert Laugher will be floated to the north end of Lake Winnipeg, portaged beside Seafalls along the Nelson River at PR 373. It will serve the community and area of Norway House First Nation along Nelson River.

It will replace the aging C.F. James Apetagon, in service since 1977. The Apetagon will see limited use at another location.

'Nice catch honey' at the Selkirk Waterfront

Welcome friends, if you've got a little time I think you'll get a chuckle out of the fishing stories our comrades in rods and reels offered us this last week.

There was no shortage of good natured anglers on the Selkirk Waterfront last Monday except maybe for those who needed a bathroom. Boy, it sure would be nice if we could get a port-a-potty somewhere there for the summer. Anyway, it was great fun walking up and down the pier passing the time with everyone and though no one had a story at that time I did meet this great couple, Claude and Jo Ann Dufour, from St. Vital.

They were so warm and friendly I had to share a picture of them with a fish they hauled in while we were talking. Luck decided to join me a few days later, when determined that I am, I went right back to the pier and found Joel Matewish who did have a funny fishing story.

Joel and his wife, Donna, were boat fishing on the Winnipeg River by Point Du Bois and he caught a sizable jackfish. Kneeling in the back of the boat with his wife, Donna, close by his side, he reeled the fish in with great authority. The fish put up a terrific fight splashing water all over as Joel attempted to net it and pull it up onto the backwash table of the transom. He almost had it up when the hook slipped out of the fishes' mouth.

Desperately, Joel now on his belly, his arms over the boats' side, grabbed for the fish with one hand and tried to net it with the other. He could hear Donna who had taken his rod, shouting encouragement. It didn't help though because the fish nose-dived to deep water and Joel's net slowly drift-

The Tyndall resident said while volunteering at a ranch she was introduced to mounted shooting and immediately wanted to try the sport.

She now takes part competitively, and is a member of the Manitoba Mounted Shooting Association (MMSA).

"We want to grow our club so there is more people to compete with," Welbers said, right after taking part in mounted shooting competition in Selkirk Park last Saturday.

The local event even brought some guests from across the border to Selkirk including Kyle Wavra of Minnesota.

"Many of my Canadian friends here always come down to our shoots in

Minnesota, so I thought I should come to Selkirk and support them," Wavra said.

Organizers said the event was an opportunity to bring the sport to the Tri-S area and introduce it to those who

Mounted shooting sees participants ride horses through a track and shoot blanks at balloons that are set up as a series of targets.

Those who can complete the track in the best time while hitting the most balloons ultimately come out on top.

The MMSA, which holds similar competitions across Manitoba, put on the event in Selkirk last Saturday.

MMSA member Todd Craplewe of East Selkirk said the sport is slowly growing in Canada.

"It's huge in the United States," Craplewe said. "But I think in the next few years it should really grow here."

He added the sport is relatively new, as it has only been around for about 15 years.

The sport seems to have an even amount of both men and women that take part, Welbers said, and the organization would like to get even more people involved.

Peguis First Nation election wasn't rigged, audit finds

A federal audit investigating alleged election fraud in Peguis First Nation has found allegations against the band's rookie Chief Cindy Spence were unfounded.

Froese Forensic Partners, an investigative Toronto accounting firm, conducted an audit for Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) after allegations of election fraud were made last year.

The *Record* obtained a 51-page report by Froese prepared for INAC through Access to Information legislation.

The report from March 31, 2016 reveals auditors focused their investigative efforts on six allegations made by former chief Glenn Hudson, who filed an appeal after losing the election last March.

The report states auditors found no evidence to support allegations that a polling station wasn't properly managed, that Spence intimidated voters, ballot boxes were tampered with, and lastly that Spence offered voters \$5,000 to \$10,000 if they voted for her.

The report starts by noting there were witnesses mentioned when the allegations were filed that "for unknown reasons" did not contact auditors.

The only allegation the report found supported by evidence was related to an altercation the night before elec-

tion day that occurred at the Peguis band office.

That night it was alleged campaign workers for Hudson encountered harassment as they tried to leave the office.

The report states the workers were blocked by a group of 20 people, who "aggressively" shouted profanity while "giving them the finger."

The group surrounded a truck the two workers were trying to get to and had to be escorted by security. Spence was outside at the time observing

when the altercation happened, the report said.

Auditors said the actions could be perceived as intimidation, but found no evidence to indicate Spence herself was intimidating voters.

She could not be reached for comment last week and has not returned repeated requests from the *Express* for an interview since being elected last year.

Hudson said he wouldn't be making another appeal with the federal government.

"We've basically given up hope on that," Hudson said calling the feds' appeals process broken and costly.

But he said he will be re-running in the next Peguis election, which is just eight months away.

"They want to see Peguis with a vision and to get back on track," he said speaking of band members he's said have asked him to re-run.

When Spence was elected chief last year, she ended a nearly eight-year reign Hudson had as leader of the community and made history as the band's first woman chief.

Peguis is Manitoba's largest First Nation.

Former St. Andrews mayor earns national award at FCM

Former St. Andrews Mayor Don Forfar was recognized with a national honour at a recent gathering in Winnipeg that brought municipal leaders together from across Canada.

During the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) 2016 Annual Conference and Trade Show in Winnipeg, Forfar was named to the FCM Roll of Honour for 2016, after being nominated by current West St. Paul

Mayor Bruce Henley.

He is one of only two people in Canada to be honoured in the FCM Roll of Honour in 2016.

Outgoing FCM President Raymond Louie presented Forfar with the award at a ceremony on June 5.

Forfar served as the FCM Manitoba director from 2009 to 2014, and Henley said a big reason he nominated Forfar was because he "worked tirelessly" to get every Manitoba municipi-

pality to become a member of FCM.

"I felt Don was an excellent candidate," Henley said. "Manitoba is the only province in Canada with 100 per cent participation in FCM, and Don single-handedly lobbied more than

20 municipalities that were not members, and he convinced them to join."

Forfar served as mayor of St. Andrews for 16 years before deciding not to seek re-election in 2014.

He agreed that getting a number of municipalities to join FCM was a big reason he was honoured at the conference.

"When I started out, of the 196 municipalities in Manitoba we had 162 in FCM, and I managed to get them all in," Forfar said.

When asked why many of those municipalities were not in FCM before he lobbied them, Forfar said he believes no one had made the effort to reach out to them.

"I think no one had really asked them, so I sent letters to over 30 and travelled to a number of them, and now they have benefitted greatly from FCM's activities."

Forfar also believes he worked as a strong advocate fighting for the interests of Manitoba's municipalities, and that he was recognized for that work.

"I believe I did a good job of representing Manitoba," he said. "I was a strong advocate for the province and for our provincial issues."

Manitoba smoke shop owner, staffer fined over \$2M

A smoke shop owner and employee have been slapped with more than \$2 million in fines for the possession and sale of contraband tobacco.

Craig Blacksmith, the owner of a smoke shop at Dakota Plains First Nation and Tammy Walters, a shop employee, were fined on a number of charges stemming from a 2014 seizure by the RCMP and provincial taxation investigators of 951,225 non-Manitoba marked cigarettes, 1845 tins of chewing tobacco (snuff), six firearms, cash and one vehicle.

On June 16, 2016, Blacksmith and Walters were each convicted of offences under the provincial Tobacco Tax Act and Tax Administration and Miscellaneous Taxes Act.

Blacksmith faced two charges of possessing and selling non-Manitoba marked cigarettes and possessing and selling other tobacco products (snuff)

under the provincial legislation. He received fines totalling \$8,500 and was assessed tax penalties totalling \$1,159,845.60.

Walters faced similar charges under the provincial legislation. Walters was fined a total of \$6,500 and was assessed tax penalties totalling \$868,009.20.

Each was given 10 years to pay the fines and penalties.

On Jan. 22, 2014, a joint enforcement operation known as Project Debit was undertaken. Members of the RCMP Serious and Organized Crime Unit, RCMP officers from Portage la Prairie and provincial taxation investigators, with the assistance of the Dakota Ojibway Police Service, made a large seizure of contraband tobacco and firearms as well as several arrests at Dakota Plains First Nation, southwest of Portage la Prairie.

A search warrant was executed, and

during the search of the property, 4800 cartons of cigarettes and three firearms were seized. During the search, police became aware of a rental locker paid for by Blacksmith. When that was searched, further seizures were made, including two cases of tobacco and three more firearms.

By law, all cigarettes and tobacco must have a Health Canada warning along with a stamp indicating that the required duties and taxes have been paid. Packages of cigarettes in Manitoba are required to display a stamp indicating taxes have been paid to the Manitoba government.

Manitoba taxes must also be paid on other tobacco products, such as

chew, when imported into the province. Millions of dollars that could fund social programs, education, employment programs and health care are lost when tax revenue to federal and provincial governments is not paid.

Surrounded by friends and family members, 21 students graduated from the Onashiwini Aboriginal Head Start

Program in Selkirk Park last Thursday morning.

The group of four year olds from Selkirk and area will now move up to kin-

dergarten starting in September.

"For us it's a nice time to say goodbye ... and wish them well as they go onto their new adventure," said Angela

Swanson, the program's co-ordinator. "It's an honour to get to know these students and their families and watch them grow and watch them develop.

Swanson said the head start program's aim is to help boost children's kindergarten readiness skills through play-based learning.

"They do a lot of playing and we do a lot of focus on their development needs so if we see that children are struggling with cutting for example we'll provide a lot of activities that support those skills," she said. "We kind of go by the needs of the children."

Children from Selkirk and area can either enter the program at the age of three or four.

Some choose to stay for one year while others complete the full two years before starting kindergarten.

The non-profit community based program provides bus transportation, nutritious snacks and helps teach children how to regulate their emotions, use language and about personal hygiene and nutrition.

Registrations are now open for their three- and four-year-old program.

The federally funded program, which provides free transportation within Selkirk city limits, runs Monday through Thursday from September to June.

Local grad chosen for International Air Cadet Exchange

Next month will be a whirlwind of activity for one member of Stonewall's 301 Alan McLeod VC Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron.

Following her graduation from the Selkirk Comp, WO 1st Class Morgan Herda will be traveling to the United Kingdom for three weeks as part of the International Air Cadet Exchange (IACE) program.

The annual program selects 67 senior ranked air cadets from across Canada to travel to a participating foreign country where the cadets will learn about the country including its military, aviation and culture. Herda is one of four Manitobans selected for

this year's program, and the only one from Manitoba selected for the UK.

To be chosen for the exchange is not an easy feat. After writing a self-narrative on why she should be chosen to represent Canada abroad, Herda was then chosen from her squadron to attend board interviews with both cadet and military officers. During the interviews she was quizzed on everything from military history, to her own participation with her squadron and then it was a two-month waiting game to see if she was one of the four cadets chosen from the 17 that were interviewed.

"It was a pretty nerve-wracking wait but I was very excited when I heard I

was chosen. I initially wanted to go to Netherlands, but the UK is an amazing place as well. I am really excited about this opportunity and as far as I know I am the only air cadet from Manitoba chosen for the UK. To be one of 67 cadets representing Canada I think it is a pretty incredible and a wonderful opportunity," said Herda.

Throughout her stay the cadets will spend the majority of their time in London, England and their trip will include visiting tourist attractions, such as Big Ben and Buckingham Palace, and touring military bases. One part of the trip Herda is most looking forward to is exploring the UK

culture.

"We all get to stay with host families for a few days and that is when we really get to see different parts of the UK. Some of us will be going to Ireland and northern England," added Herda. Chosen in part for her leadership skills and dedication to air cadets, following her exchange Herda will return to the Stonewall squadron this fall for her seventh and last year. As the senior most cadet with the unit, Herda will remain teaching classes and have the opportunity to share what she learned on the exchange with the younger cadets.

Gov't releases framework letters to Crown corporations

The Manitoba government has released framework letters provided to Manitoba Hydro, Manitoba Public Insurance and Manitoba Liquor and Lotteries.

"Manitobans expect Crown corporations to provide top-notch services efficiently and effectively," Crown Services Minister Ron Schuler said in a release last Wednesday. "These framework letters outline the terms of engagement for the Crowns and outline, in an open and transparent manner, how our government will work with these corporations, without political interference, to further improve services for Manitobans."

As a first step, the province will work with the three agencies and more to review the Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act to assess the current governance framework, find ways to improve transparency and more clearly define the government and corporation roles and responsibilities, Schuler said.

Following the governance piece, the work will focus on reducing red tape, improving procurement/tendering practices, and developing stronger advertising and sponsorship models,

he added.

"Our government believes Manitobans deserve to have open, transparent and accountable Crown services," said Schuler. "By working together, we will ensure the Crown corporations continue to provide high-quality services for Manitobans."



Grilled asparagus and sweet potato with curry



Makes 2 servings

Curry adds an exotic flavour to these grilled vegetables. They taste great with pork tenderloin.

Ingredients

1 medium sweet potato (10 oz /300g), peeled and cut into 1 inch (2 cm) wide strips

16 asparagus stalks, tough ends removed

1 tbsp (15 mL) olive oil

1 tsp (5 mL) curry powder

½ tsp (2 mL) black pepper

Directions

Place the sweet potato in a microwave safe bowl and cover with water. Microwave on high for 2 minutes. Drain the water.

Add the asparagus and coat with the remaining ingredients.

Heat the BBQ to medium heat*.

Place the vegetables in a grilling basket and grill for 10 minutes, flipping occasionally.

Serve immediately.

*This recipe can also be made in the oven. Heat the oven to 400° F (200°C). Line a baking sheet with tin foil and cook for 10 minutes, flipping once.

Wheat-Free Pizza With Roasted Vegetables



Makes 1 9-inch pizza

½ eggplant, cubed
1 small red bell pepper, seeded and cut into strips

1 small zucchini, sliced

2 garlic cloves, sliced

⅓ cup olive oil, plus extra to drizzle

3 tablespoons each milk and water, mixed together and warmed

¾ teaspoon freshly squeezed lemon juice

1 egg

½ teaspoon salt

1¾ cups gluten-free white flour

1 teaspoon quick-rising yeast

2½ ounces mozzarella, drained and cubed (optional)

Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Preheat the oven to 400 F.

Toss the eggplant, red bell pepper, zucchini, and garlic in 4 tablespoons of the olive oil and roast in a roasting pan in the oven for 15 to 20 minutes, or until they are beginning to soften.

While the vegetables are roasting, make the batter. Whisk the warm (not hot) milk and water, lemon juice, remaining olive oil, egg, and salt together. Beat in the flour and yeast and mix until well combined. Pour into the prepared pizza pan, cover, and let rise in a warm place for about 20 minutes, or until puffy.

Bake the pizza crust in the oven for 10 minutes to set the dough, then quickly remove from the oven and scatter with the roasted vegetables and mozzarella (if using). Season well, drizzle with olive oil, and return to the oven for a further 10 minutes until the vegetables are sizzling and the pizza has slightly shrunk from the edges. Cut into wedges and serve hot.

Orange Peel Beef & Broccoli Stir-Fry With Brown Rice

Serves 4

For Sauce:

2 tablespoons reduced sodium soy sauce

1 tablespoon plus 2 teaspoons rice vinegar

1 tablespoon cornstarch

2 teaspoons honey

½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

¼ teaspoon Chinese 5-spice powder (or ¼ teaspoon cinnamon and ⅛ teaspoon each ground fennel and cloves)

1 tablespoon dark sesame oil

For Stir-Fry:

5½ cups bite-size broccoli florets

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced ginger

(or ½ teaspoon ground ginger)

⅛ teaspoon salt

1 pound flank or flat iron

steak, or top sirloin, thinly sliced against the grain in 1½-inch pieces

1 tablespoon expeller-pressed grapeseed or canola oil

1 orange, 2 teaspoons grated

zest, inner segments sliced

2 teaspoons sesame seeds

3 cups cooked brown rice

To make the sauce: Stir together all of the sauce ingredients in a small bowl and set aside.

To make the stir-fry: Heat a large frying pan or wok over high heat, add 1 cup of water and bring to a boil. Add broccoli, reduce heat to a low boil and cover with a lid or piece of foil, leaving a gap for steam to escape. Steam for 5 minutes until almost fork-tender. Move broccoli to a plate, reserving cooking water in another container.

In a medium bowl, sprinkle garlic, ginger and salt evenly over the beef. Scrape the pan clean, place it on high heat and add the oil. When the oil is shimmering, add the beef in an even layer and cook for 2 minutes undisturbed until brown. Toss with a



wooden spoon to break up the pieces, reducing heat to medium-high as needed. Add orange zest and sesame seeds and cook until beef is done, another 2 minutes. Swirl in the sauce, add broccoli and stir-fry to reheat. Add a splash of reserved broccoli water if mixture seems too dry. Serve hot and garnish with orange segments.

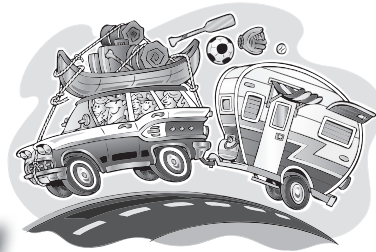

National chief welcomes \$50M Skills and Partnership Fund

The federal government's announcement of funding and support to strengthen the First Nations labour market is a step in the right direction to address decades of underfunding, according to national Chief Perry Bellegarde.

Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Labour Canada MaryAnn Mihychuk made the announcement on May 25 during the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations Spring Legislative Assembly.

"We are the fastest growing population in this country and our people are seeking jobs and good training," Bellegarde said in a release late last month. "We need initiatives that start to close the gap in employment, income and education between First Nations people and the rest of Canada. We look forward to working with the federal government on First Nations employment, training and labour market needs based on a na-

tion-to-nation relationship and a new fiscal relationship based on respect."

AFN Saskatchewan Regional Chief Bobby Cameron stated: "We welcome the federal government investment into the development of our people's skills and training needs. Our First Nation people require education and training opportunities to build healthier families and communities. This is a positive step forward to the importance of life-long learning. We look forward to our continued nation-to-nation Inherent and Treaty based relationship."

On May 25, the federal government announced a new call for proposals for the \$50 million Skills and Partnership Fund and funding for at-risk communities and the Aboriginal Skills and Employment Training Strategy (ASETS).

Mihychuk announced a new call for proposals for the Skills and Partnership Fund, with a total value of \$50 million.

Elements for evaluation are parks and green spaces, medians, boulevards, sidewalks, streets; municipal, commercial, institutional and residential properties; ditches, road shoulders, vacant lots, signs and buildings; weed control, litter clean-up (including cigarette butts and gum), graffiti prevention/removal and vandalism deterrents.

In 2015, the City of Selkirk scored 125.50 out of a possible 150 points for tidiness.

2015 Judges Observations:

Overall Selkirk is very clean and tidy with very little evidence of litter. There are many litter and recycling receptacles.

No graffiti was noticed, however there was evidence that some had occurred and had been covered over or removed.

Most of the industrial areas were also clean and tidy. As always, a few could benefit from a little more attention.

The transfer station, although not open when judging occurred, appeared to be very well looked after - nicely done for a facility of this nature.

2015 Judges Recommendations:

Would it be possible and or feasible to encourage business owners to look after the public space in front of their establishments? Small things, like removing weeds growing the sidewalk cracks, can make a significant difference in appearance.

Continue to add recycling and garbage containers as needed as they do make a difference.

Continue with your anti-graffiti program - it is working!

St. Andrews glass artist returns to WAVE tour

St. Andrews artist Angel Calnek returned to the Interlake WAVE Artists' Studio tour on June 10 and 11 with glass art she's been creating since 1994. However, this time with a new philosophy she developed after a life-changing event in 2013.

"I'm here, I have all this beautiful work around me, what complaints could I have?" said Calnek on June 11.

Three years ago, the St. Andrews artist had brain surgery to remove a non-cancerous tumour. Although the tumour wasn't cancerous, the condition that spurred it, trigeminal neuralgia, had put her in constant pain since 2010.

"They call it the suicide disease," said Calnek, who explained it comes from an artery pressing against a raw nerve in the head. This can cause excruciating pain.

Calnek suffered permanent mental and visual damage from the surgery and still takes medication for her condition. Fortunately for Calnek, it has not affected her ability to create nature-themed stained and warm glass.

Recently, Calnek has been screen printing with glass. In a bit of a com-

plicated process, Calnek takes pictures of dragonflies and water and then works the images into her glass.

One piece she showed on the WAVE tour had a picture of water in a blue glass bowl. The water itself revealed a hand, which Calnek highlighted with custom moulds.

"There was a hand in the shadows on the water," explained Calnek.

The hand is symbolic and shows that people are responsible for caring for the water. Many of Calnek's works hold these deeper meanings that draw attention to environmental issues.

"As beautiful as this is, the real water is even more beautiful and more precious," said Calnek.

Since her surgery, Calnek has stepped away from the sales side of art and instead enjoys the process. As long as she can make enough to keep creating, she's happy, she said.

Calnek's creativity stretches into the music world, where Calnek became a professional folk singer as a teenager. Calnek has since sung blues, country, and rock and roll. She exhibited her 2011 Hillbilly Burlesque CD during the WAVE.

HSC's hand hygiene rap making waves online

Former Selkirk resident says the main message is 'very important'

A former Selkirk resident with a passion for filmmaking is helping promote the importance of hand washing with help from a rap song he wrote and a video produced by the Health Sciences Centre.

Ryan Surowich, 29, who grew up in Selkirk, currently lives in Winnipeg where he works as a nurse at the Health Sciences Centre (HSC).

To help promote the importance of hand hygiene at HSC in Winnipeg, hospital staff were invited to submit a 90-second video concept to display commitment to patient safety and promote good hand washing practices.

Submissions were judged on creativity, originality, team participation and good hand washing.

Surowich's original concept, which proposed making a music video of him rapping about hand hygiene techniques was ultimately named the winner.

After recording the song, Surowich said the music video, which is just over one minute long, was produced by the HSC.

The video, which can be found on YouTube under "HSC - Hand Hygiene Rap" has been viewed more than 13,400 times and is featured on the *New York Times* website.

Besides having a passion for filmmaking, Surowich said the message behind the video is "very important," which is why he chose to enter the contest.

"Hand hygiene is obviously really,

really important," he said during an earlier interview with the *Record*. "A lot of people die from infections they get within the hospital so you could save billions and billions and dollars of resources just by washing your hands."

Although he couldn't say how many hours he put into the project, Surowich said it didn't feel like work at all. "I put a lot into it," he said. "This is my pulse. I love doing this."

Nowadays it has become easier than ever for someone to pick up a camera and create something, Surowich said.

"It's just kind of a new brand of nursing," he said. "A lot of people are visual learners."

Katherine Fox, director of communications at HSC, said the video was released in October 2015.

"We wanted to shake things up a little in terms of awareness and sort of break through the clutter and noise of information and get new messag-

ing out so we had opened a contest to our staff to submit an idea," Fox said. "Ryan's piece was selected and then we worked together to produce a music video."

Along with learning more about

the importance of hand washing and hand hygiene practices, Surowich said he hopes people will find some humour in the video.

"Ultimately that's what it's all about."

Citizens on Patrol celebrates 25 years in Manitoba

This year marks 25 years of the Citizens on Patrol Program in Manitoba.

West St. Paul Citizens on Patrol Program (COPP) is proud to be a part of this long-standing program, focused on keeping West St. Paul safer.

COPP began in Manitoba in 1991 when partnerships were formed with local law enforcement and citizens desiring to make their communities safer. Its three main goals are deterrence, education and awareness.

The West St. Paul COPP patrols the community by vehicle, walking or bicycle, watching and reporting suspicious activities to the RCMP.

"We work closely with the RCMP so that our patrols take place where they're most effective," group co-ordinator Detlef Hindemith said. "Safety bulletins are periodically sent to residents through email and attached to community bulletin boards."

Members take part in the Speed Watch Program, setting up a radar speed reader board that displays motorist speed. This road-safety initiative shows drivers the actual speed they are travelling in relation to the posted speed limit. This prompts speeding motorists to slow down.

COPP will set up a display at this

year's Canada Day breakfast at the Sunova Center.

To recognize the program's 25th anniversary, COPP will have giveaways at the display. Complimentary Child ID Kits from the RCMP will be available in limited quantities. Having a record of your child's identity, including a photograph, fingerprints and a hair sample for DNA, is useful to help locate and return a missing child quickly and safely. The information should be kept by the child's parent or caregivers.

"We would welcome more members who want to help prevent crime.

Record-breaking performances at junior high divisional meet

Local athletes put together some impressive record-breaking performances at the Lord Selkirk Junior High Divisional Track and Field meet earlier this month.

"It always amazes me that these kids are breaking records almost every year," said Lockport School phys-ed teacher Marco Morelli. "They're getting bigger and more talented."

East Selkirk Junior High's Asha Gurney was fantastic, breaking a pair of Grade 9 girls' records while tying another two. She is an exceptional athlete that is only going to get better.

Gurney set new marks in the triple jump, landing in the sand at an impressive 9.66 metres. She also broke the javelin record with a throw of

32.30m while matching records in the 80m hurdles (13.1 seconds) and high jump (1.40m).

Lockport School's Cienna Palmer, meanwhile, broke the Grade 9 girls' LSSD record in the 1200m race after a time of 4:24.10.

Three records were set in the Grade 8 boys' division by Lockport School's Heath Kurys. Kurys, a fantastic runner, smashed records in the 800m (2:20.20), 1200m (3:44.40), and 2000m (6:43.56).

"That was unbelievable," Morelli enthused. "He was running by himself out there because he was so far ahead. He's so much fun to watch and he's a total character. He's so competitive and refuses to lose."

In the Grade 7 boys' 300m event, East

Selkirk Middle School's Evan Skrupski set a new record with an impressive time of 43.09 seconds.

Lockport School's Ryan Vankooten broke the Grade 7 boys' high jump record after clearing 1.44 metres while the Grade 8 girls' division saw ESMS' Jana King break the record in the 2000m after finishing with a great time of 8:16.13.

Three records, meanwhile, were made by Grade 9 boys' athletes. ESMS' Jordan Simko set a new record in the 1200m after a time of 3:53.20 while Lockport School's Chris Faial's javelin throw of 34.42 set a new record.

Lockport School's 4X100m relay team of Bella Benson, Shannon Campbell, Olivia Weremy, and Palmer set a new record after crossing the

finish line in a lightning-quick time of 51.51 seconds.

As a school, Lockport won banners in five of six categories. They were tops in Grade 7 and 9 boys' and girls' divisions while placing first in Grade 8 girls.

"It wasn't easy," Morelli admitted. "The points were very close...and we were very fortunate that it turned out this way. It very easily could have been three or four (banners) going the other way."

"But we're very happy and obviously proud."

ESMS was first overall in the Grade 8 boys' events, finishing with 78 points. That was well ahead of the rest of the field.

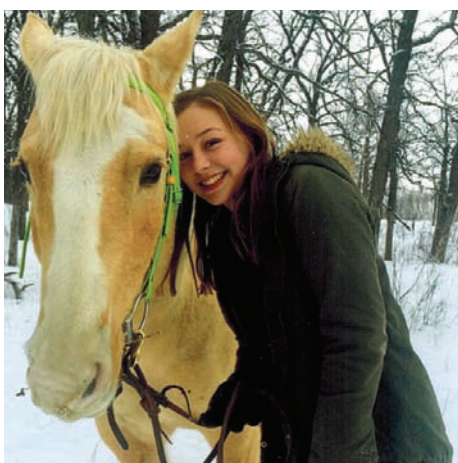
