# Trying to break the cycle of abuse

# Nova House opening sheds light on need for emergency shelters

Melissa's face and arms are covered in cuts and bruises and her voice is still strained from screaming for help.

The Winnipeg woman says her boyfriend abused her for three days straight before she fled to Selkirk.

"It got so bad that I got dragged out onto the train tracks and people that were near us saw me and took me to the hospital," the 34-year-old said. "I was screaming really loud and they heard me and then he took off."

Just hours before Nova House's grand opening last week, the Record spoke with three women currently staying at the new emergency shelter for women and children escaping abuse. The Record has given the women names to keep their real identities anonymous.

Nova House executive director Anna Pazdzierski says they currently have 13 women and four children staying at their new shelter, which officially opened its doors in May.

"I wish we weren't needed but we are," Pazdzierski said.

Melissa said when she arrived at Nova House last Tuesday she wasn't sure what to expect.

"I'm really scared right now. I don't think I've ever been this scared in my life," she said. "But I feel safe here and everything is super secure."

For 37-year-old Carol, this is her second stay at Nova House.

"When I first came here in December, I was only 95 pounds," she said."I just couldn't deal with my issues."

Carol said she's now learning how to move on and stay away from abusive relationships.

"I think the hardest thing to do is to leave but it's also the best thing to do," she said. "At first you feel guilty for leaving, like you're doing something wrong, but you're not ... you're helping yourself.

"It's just better to leave and start

Carol said her ex-boyfriend was an alcoholic and after months of emotional and physical abuse, she decid-

"I had a feeling that I was going to end up dead," she said. "I didn't leave so much for myself but for my family.

"I didn't think it was fair for my mother to have to bury her daughter."

Carol's new found strength is evident when she talks about her past relationships.

"Nobody has the right to put their hands on anybody," she said.

Sharon and her two young children were also escaping an abusive relationship when they arrived at Nova House in May.

"I got beaten up by my ex ... and I was in a pretty bad state when I got here," she said. "I had a concussion and I thought I had a broken nose.

"All my confidence was just gone."

In a couple of weeks, Sharon said counsellors have helped her feel like herself again. She said the new facility "feels like a home."

"When I first got here I was lost, I've never been to Selkirk before, I felt really out of place," she said. "But these ladies are very helpful, they talked to me and they didn't make me feel pressured or anything."

Nova House hosted their new shelter's official grand opening and rib-

bon cutting at Selkirk's Gaynor Region-Family al Library last Wednesday evening.

The new \$2.9-million building replaces an older facility in Selkirk that the shelter outgrew years ago. It houses 22 emergency shelter beds and four apartment units to help women and families transition back into the com-

The home also has play areas for children and office space to facilitate on-site resources and referrals.

"Nova House is a critical lifeline to

show women and children in crisis that they are not alone when they leave dangerous and abusive situations," said Families Minister Scott Fielding during the shelter's grand opening.

Local dignitaries and community members also took the time to thank the Jim and Betty Ann Gaynor family, who donated more than \$550,000 to the project, during the grand opening.

"You guys are amazing for everything you've given to Selkirk," Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan said during his address to the dozens in the crowd. "What you're doing in Nova House will affect and touch so many lives in such a positive way."

# Locally made Mosaic Mural celebrates Canada 150

Just days before Canada's 150th birthday, the City of Selkirk unveiled an 800 tile mosaic created by community members from across the Interlake.

Selkirk was one of about 150 communities across the country that created a Canada 150 Mosaic Mural, made from 800 tiles, each painted by a community member.

The tiles were placed together to create an image of a tree with roots, attached to a steel beam, riding on a railway flat.

Murals from all communities are riding on a railway flat as trains and railroads are the connective theme of the 150 Mosaic Mural.

"The Canada 150 Mosaic Mural demonstrates what Selkirk is all about," said Selkirk Mayor Larry Johansson to a crowd of more than 50 people at the

Gaynor Family Regional Library last Tuesday."It shows the pride we have in not just our hometown but our country as well."

Sisters and Selkirk residents, Joan Burzuik and Sandra Kurbis attended the unveiling to get a glimpse of the tiles they painted at one of the paint nights held at the Selkirk Rec Complex last fall.

"It was like we were all a family. Everyone was giggling and smiling ... it was something we knew we wanted to do for Canada's birthday," said Bur-

The mural is for future generations, Kurbis added, saying that it's something she wants her grandchildren to look back on with pride.

The mural will forever welcome visitors to the Gaynor Family Library, said director of library services, Ken Kuryliw. It hangs just inside the library's main entrance across from Ubuntu Café and Bakery.

"The Gaynor Family Regional Library is thrilled to be the home of this beautiful mosaic mural," said Ken Kuryliw, director of library services. "Once again showing how our community comes together to do truly amazing things."

The Government of Canada's Department of Canadian Heritage funded the project in 150 other communities across the country.

Selkirk CAO Duane Nicol said the mural is very much a regional project.

"We invited local organizations, who serve our entire region, to participate in the painting of tiles," he said. "Citizens from St. Andrews and St. Clements joined Selkirk residents in capturing our shared heritage on these tiles. In keeping with the metaphor used in the mural, the roots of this community stretch deep into our neighbouring RMs."

# Selkirk awaits newly approved mosquito control product

New provincial legislation that bans the use of Malathion for mosquito control and a shortage of the recently approved replacement product will put mosquito fogging in the City of Selkirk on hold for the time being.

Dan McDermid, the city's director of operations, said a product called Delta Guard has only recently been approved by Health Canada for use in Manitoba for mosquito control.

The city has been unable to purchase Delta Guard, which costs about twice as much as Malathion, because suppliers don't have it in stock yet. This, combined with a surprise reduction in provincial funding for mosquito control of more than \$20,000 – or 82 per cent – has the city in a holding pattern.

"All those things rolled together have put our planning for fogging at a stand still," McDermid said.

Since Delta Guard is a new product, it's also unknown how effective it will be in controlling mosquitoes.

"It could be not as effective and we might have to do more applications or heavier applications. But we don't know until we try it, basically," Mc-Dermid said. The city has, however, been doing biological larviciding since late April. Larviciding is a treatment designed to kill immature mosquitoes while they are still developing in pools of standing water. The biological larvicide is applied directly onto standing water by way of a spray nozzle and can greatly reduce the number of adult mosquitoes.

McDermid said larviciding, along with the fact it's been a relatively dry year to this point, has helped keep the mosquito population in check.

Larviciding is an effective way to control populations, McDermid said. When you target larvae in ditches, pools and containers, very large numbers of mosquitoes are killed before they reach the flying adult, biting stage.

Citizens can help with the city's mosquito control program by preventing artificial mosquito breeding sites by:

- ensuring that rain barrels are covered:
- garbage and recycling bins are covered or turned upside-down;
- emptying or changing the water in birdbaths and other lawn ornaments twice a week; and
- keeping eavestroughs clear.

# Selkirk Trailer Park residents face eviction

When Val Goertzen purchased her mobile home and moved to the Selkirk Trailer Park in October of last year, she never dreamed she would one day be forced to leave.

"This was supposed to be my forever home," the 64-year-old said while standing outside of her home along Dominique Drive South on Sunday.

But last week trailer park residents were surprised to find eviction notices taped to their doors. The owners of the land that they have been renting from say have decided to close the trailer park and all tenants and trailers must be moved by Dec. 31.

Goertzen said approximately 46 to 47 families currently live at the trailer park. She said there is roughly 50 trailers in the park.

"I'm new here but I've met a lot of the people and everyone is really welcoming," she said. "We're all just wondering what to do."

Trailer park residents say the land is owned by Canwest Development. The Winnipeg-based development company has also started the rezoning application process for the land and plans are in the works to build single family lots, duplexes, row housing and a condominium apartment building on the site.

The Record reached out to the company on Monday but calls weren't returned by press deadline.

"We wish to advise all tenants that this decision did not come easily and has nothing to do with the re-zoning application that was recently submitted," a letter from the company reads. "The owners had every intention of keeping the park open for the next few years."

The letter goes on to say that over the years several maintenance issues have come up,"which have caused severe financial losses," and it is no longer possible to operate the park under these conditions.

"The sewer line has broken in a few locations and repairing will not solve the problem. To replace the sewer lines, trailers would have to be moved from each lot and cost is not even financially feasible."

The letter also states that the water bills are no longer financially manageable and the rents charged don't cover the water consumption by each

After putting nearly \$20,000 of her savings into renovating and upgrading her trailer, Goertzen said she wasn't planning on moving anytime soon. She said her and others are now waiting on more information as

well as an official eviction notice from the province's Residential Tenancies Branch.

She, along with a couple others, have also put their trailers up for sale in hopes that someone will buy them and move them.

"I went to every trailer park around here ... every place I could find looking for a trailer park to move this but there's nothing," Goertzen said, adding at this point she's running out of options."I'm starting to look for a job ... this is everything I have."

Goertzen said while her trailer is bought and paid for, there are other residents who have mortgages.

"People have put all of their money into them," she said. "This is low income here, people don't have \$20,000 in the bank to start over."

Terry Lesko, who has called the Selkirk Trailer Park home for six years, said he doesn't know where he is going to live once the park closes. He added his trailer, along with many others, aren't in any shape to be moved.

"Honestly 95 per cent of these are not moveable," Lesko said.

A spokeswoman for the Red River Planning District (RRPD) says those who object to the trailer park's rezoning application can sign up to speak during their upcoming board meeting

Those unable to attend the meeting can also submit something in advance by dropping it off at their office.

# 'It's too late'

War against zebra mussels in Lake Winnipeg is hopeless, fisherman says

It was 25 years ago when commercial fisherman, Robert T. Kristjanson says he first warned people about zebra mussels coming to Lake Winnipeg.

"People looked at me like I had two heads when I first started talking about them," the 83-year-old told the Record during an interview at his home in Gimli. "Everybody said 'oh they're not going to come here.""

In the 80s and 90s, Kristjanson spent his winters travelling the Great Lake system, selling commercial fishing nets. When zebra mussels were found in Lake Erie in 1986, Kristjanson said he knew it wouldn't be long before they started popping up in Manitoba. So when the species was discovered in Lake Winnipeg in 2013, Kristjanson said he was disappointed nobody listened to his pleas earlier.

"This destruction could have been stopped before it began. Now, it's too

According to the Lake Winnipeg Foundation, zebra mussels are an invasive species that attach themselves to hard surfaces, like boats, motors, docks and pipes. Experts believe they arrived in Lake Winnipeg from North Dakota via the Red River.

The concern is that zebra mussels will impact lake's ecosystems, contribute to algae problems and species destruction.

There's no hope for stopping their breeding in Lake Winnipeg, Kristjanson believes, but there's still time to prevent zebra mussels from invading other lakes in the province.

"It's the weekend boaters who need to be aware about this. People need to wake up and think about what they're doing when travelling with their boats everywhere," he said.

Though the government has set up highway inspection stations and decontamination areas throughout Manitoba, Kristjanson says something more needs to be done.

"They can live in motors and pipes for 12 days where you don't see them. There needs to be a law about bringing your boat from lake to lake."

Until Kristjanson's requests are heard, boaters should inspect, clean and dry their boat for at least five days before transporting it to a different body of water.

"We can try and slow down the species in Lake Winnipeg but good God don't pollute every lake in Manitoba," Kristjanson begs boaters.

# **RCMP** emphasize fraud prevention after bank skimming incidents

Numerous types of scams and frauds operating on global, national, and local levels undermine the confidence of Manitobans by stealing their hard-earned money. These crimes are often borderless and have no specific target demographic

Over the past several months, the RCMP have received several reports from residents who have had monev withdrawn from their accounts. The withdrawals look to be coming from various locations in the United States. The incidents appear to be in the form of card skimming, where the victim's debit card numbers are captured along with the PIN number, which then allows the fraudster to withdraw funds unsuspectingly from the account.

If you believe you've been a victim of fraud, there are several things you should do:

• Gather all information you have about the fraud, including docu-

ments, receipts, emails and/or text messages.

- Report the incident to your local police and obtain a police report number that may be requested by your financial institution and/or credit card company.
- Contact the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre at 1-888-495-8501 and complete a report.

In terms of fraud prevention, we encourage everyone to do the fol-

- Monitor your bank accounts and financial statements regularly and report any suspicious transactions.
- Update your PIN # and any online financial institution passwords you use on a regular basis.
- Monitor your credit history on an annual basis through either Equifax Canada or TransUnion.

Prevention is key and every Manitoban needs to do their part in recognizing the signs, reporting it, and stopping it.

## **WSP** hosts ward boundaries open house

An open house was held June 28 at West St. Paul's Sunova Center to allow residents to participate in a ward boundaries review, currently being undertaken by independent consultant Deepak Joshi and the Senior Elections Officer.

Approximately 19 people attended the open house.

The review is being conducted in accordance with the Municipal Act, which requires municipalities with wards to review them from time to time to ensure population is distributed evenly throughout the wards.

The RM of West St. Paul has four wards, which were established through a bylaw. That bylaw is now 20 years old.

According to data from 2014, the population breakdown in the four wards was: Ward 1 - 772; Ward 2 -1,536; Ward 3 – 1,750; and Ward 4 1,324.

The RM's current population, as de-

termined by the 2016 Canada Census, is 5,368, up from 4,932 in 2011.

The consultant will take information gathered during the open house, as well as from the four councillors who represent the wards, and propose new boundaries that more equally distribute the population.

Other points considered in the review will be present and future population trends, natural and physical boundaries and community or diversity of interests. The goal is that the new boundaries can be used for multiple elections.

Those who attended the open house were given a short survey to fill out. They were also shown maps of the current boundaries and zoning information for the entire municipality.

In order to become better informed about the municipality, Joshi suggests residents visit the Red River Planning website to obtain zoning information about their properties.


# Don't forget to put the drain plug in!

With his trailer submerged he jumped out of his truck, strode to his beached boat, got in and maneuvered it onto the trailer on the first try. He was the picture of a man who did everything right the first time! That perception was soon shaken when our new friend having his rig on dry land, graciously gave us a funny, if not embarrassing story. With bright enthusiasm he told of a day last summer when he couldn't wait to go fishing. He rushed to Cooks Creek East Selkirk boat launching site, backed his rig into the water, launched his boat, moored it and went to park the truck.

Jon told of a time when he and his kid brother, Nicholas were fishing on the Brokenhead River south of Stead near their home. Their dad and some friends came by telling them they weren't going to catch any fish in that part of the river. No sooner had they said that then both boys began catching bass and jackfish. That changed the older men's tune as they rushed back home for their rods and joined John and Nicholas in catching enough fish for supper. In late afternoon they all walked home with their fish joking about their good luck. At home they broke out the barbecue and a family party got going well into the night!

# Crossing guard hangs up her vest for good after 18 years

The reflective vests have stayed the same, but Heather Wensel says the traffic density has changed drastically during her 18 years as a crossing guard for Daerwood School.

"It's gotten more dangerous and a lot busier for kids crossing now," said Wensel, who officially retired last Friday after nearly two decades of service.

Though no accidents ever happened while Wensel was on duty, she does remember when a 76-year-old woman was struck by a vehicle in front of the school last year.

Nova House raised the remaining funds and oversaw the project design and construction along with a committee of community volunteers.

The province's Family Violence Prevention Program (FVPP) assisted in the design process of the new shelter, which is located along Clandeboye Avenue, and increased its annual funding by \$186,000 in this year's budget to support expanded needs in the new facility. FVPP provides \$567,900 a year in funding to Nova House.

Despite the additional funding, Pazdzierski said they will continue their fundraising efforts as their annual programming costs come in at around

Nova House, which provides tempo-

rary shelter, interim housing, counselling, support groups, outreach programs and referrals to community resources, serves the Interlake and North Eastman region of Manitoba along with 19 First Nations. It is also known for having the highest occupancy rate when compared to other emergency shelters across the prov-

"Until we get rid of gender-based violence, until we get rid of family violence, we have to have safe havens like Nova House," Bezan said.

the province every year.

With the population of Selkirk continuing to grow, Wensel urges pedestrians to stay safe and Daerwood students to join the crossing guard

"It's often a struggle to get kids involved but with traffic getting busier it's so important," said Wensel who also worked for the school as an educational assistant.

Despite the traffic concerns, she says she'll miss the students most and their eagerness to please her.

What she won't miss is the bad weather that never stopped her from missing a day of patrolling.

More safety training for crossing guards is her hope for the future she says, adding that she would like to see more funds invested in the school division's program.





# Saving Parker's paradise

# Memorial fund in Sutherland's name aims to help heal Lake Winnipeg

There's a cottonwood tree on the beach at Lake Winnipeg's south basin and though to most it's just one tree among many, to Brenda, Madison and Brandon Sutherland it tells the story of their lives. And it tells the story of Parker Sutherland – Brenda's husband and Madison and Brandon's dad.

For as long as they can remember, they spent their weekends at the beach at the lake. They'd get up early in the morning, get the boat ready, pack the coolers and head for the Red.

Madison says she and her brother learned to swim at the lake. They learned how to build fires and how to fish. She was in awe of her dad's knowledge, especially how he seemed to have a map in his head that guided them to their little piece of paradise.

"I was always amazed at how well my dad knew the waters, it all looked the same to me but he knew exactly where to turn, when, and got us there safely every time," she says. "Dad knew when to turn around, or take a different route, and which spot on the beach would be the best.

"For a long time it was like our own private island, we were often the only ones on the beach until we started to share our secret place with friends and family. We then called it 'Paradise' and found our nest at the base of the big cottonwood tree that housed an eagle's nest."

Brenda says she and Parker started going to the south basin around 1982, when they first began dating. They used his dad's boat first, before they got their own pontoon.

The last time they went was about two weeks before Parker passed in 2014. They took Madison and Brandon, and Parker's parents, who hadn't been to the lake in a long time. His dad, Wayne Sutherland, was shocked at how much it had changed.

What used to be a little channel leading to the lake was now a wide expanse of water, to be navigated only by those with knowledge of the waterscape.

"I think it really hit us then how much it's changed," Brenda says. "His dad said he wouldn't even know how to get to the lake anymore. Whatever's going on out there isn't healthy."

Parked passed away on Sept. 17, 2014. The Parker Sutherland Memorial Fund now does the work that Parker was so passionate about. Brenda says Parker was deeply concerned about the health of the lake, having witnessed it deteriorate over the years.

He was an environmentalist and cared about the health of the land, water and sky and it makes Brenda beyond proud to have a fund in his name that will care for those things.

After Parker's passing, Selkirk and District Community Foundation executive director Bev Clegg paid a visit to Brenda, to let her know just how many people had donated to the foundation in Parker's memory.

It was an impressive list, and while families are notified when donations are made in a loved one's memory, this was different.

Brenda recalls Clegg saying they'd never really seen anything like it – the donations in Parker's name kept coming and coming. It was then that Brenda decided the family would start the memorial fund. A minimum of \$10,000 is required to create a fund, so the family put money in, and obtained some matching funds as well.

She's touched by the fact that so many people donated in Parker's memory, and continue to do so.

"I get choked up because it was overwhelming to see, how much and how many people wanted to support the Foundation and put it in Parker's memory," Brenda says. "A small community is certainly so much of what it's about. This community has been amazing to the kids and I. It's overwhelming, but in a beautiful way."

Brenda says the beach at the lake was once their own private paradise, but Parker introduced it to many others, and even more people discovered it on their own. With the fund, people can continue to discover the beauty that surrounds us here and that awareness can propel Parker's dream of healing the lake forward.

"Parker's greatest love, other than his family I believe, was the lake," she says.

"I think Parker would be shocked to see the support."

The Parker Sutherland Memorial Fund will support local environmental projects.

This year, the family also gave an immediate gift to the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium, which triggered another private donor and a matching amount from the Thomas Sill Foundation.

The cottonwood tree is still at the lake, adorned now with a sign that says "Parker's Paradise." Brenda and the kids continue to go, and when the eagle flies above they think of Parker.

"When he got there, that was his paradise. It's important for us to go there, we feel him there. He knew how fast the lake was changing and he had a fear that it wouldn't be there one day," she says. "The memorial fund continues Parker's desire to improve the lake's health. We didn't want it to get lost."

# Magic, versatility surrounds spiral herb garden

Buzz has been growing about a new garden on the grounds of Teulon's Green Acres Art Centre.

"Anybody who's been driving through the park here and has had the opportunity to talk to me about it thinks it's beautiful," said Nicole Dzuba of Teulon Green Acres Art Club.

Urban Eatin' Landscapes constructed a spiral herb garden on the grounds during the DIY Homesteader Festival on June 24.

Herbs make meals more flavorful, used for creating sauces and marinades, infusing oils, or simply sprinkling them freshly julienned over virtually anything. Culinary herbs also have heaps of medicinal benefits, both for preventing and treating chronic conditions like heart disease and dealing with everyday ailments like headaches. They are also amongst the easiest and quickest things to grow, something that can almost instantly end up in the kitchen.

The bed spirals three feet above the ground and is six feet in diameter, which creates plenty of space to grow herbaceous goodness.

Dzuba says Green Acres will eventually offer a course or class to teach people the basics of gardening with the spiral garden.

"It's a great way to learn about different growing habitats and how to accommodate those things for many plants," said Natalie Elizabeth of Urban Eatin' Landscapes, a small group of gardeners committed to using organic and holistic techniques to build and maintain vegetable, herb and native perennials.

The spiral design is not without purpose. It's most certainly a beautiful shape to find in the garden, but it also has practical reasons. By having the spiral raised in the center, spiraling down to ground level, lots of microclimates are created. Some spots of the spiral will get more sunlight, others more shade. Some areas will be hold moisture better while the more raised parts offer the chance for better-drained, drier soil. By having all of these differences, the spiral enables us to grow plants with different needs in a smaller space.

Some plants, such as many of the Mediterranean herbs, need dry, sandy soil conditions, while others require a moist, bottomland type of soil. The herb spiral accommodates these needs, as it is designed to have different soil conditions at different parts of the spiral. The top is a warm, dry area that gets plenty of sun. The bottom is cool, shady and moist. The middle is, well, in between the two. Herbs that need drier

soil drain easily, and plants that desire moister conditions receive water that flows from above.

"It's really functional for people's home gardens," said Elizabeth.

Having a herb garden near your kitchen can have a lot of benefits.

"It's a way to take the basic things you're eating to another level and have this deeper connection to it."

Shocking for everyone but Walker, who was happy with his result but almost immediately found his mind racing, wondering how he could improve his performance.

"I can't be disappointed, I was happy. It would have been nice to beat the guy at the end but I couldn't quite do it,"Walker said the day after the marathon, which took place in Winnipeg on June 17. "For my first one, it was good ... even a day after I'm already thinking what I could do better and how I could run faster, so ... I think there's lots of room for improvement."

Walker ran track and cross country at the University of Manitoba for

he'd been anticipating hot and humid conditions and had even trained in a sauna to prepare.

Eventual winner Teresa Fekensa (2:38:03.2) pulled out to an early lead and had about a minute and a half on Walker fairly quickly. But Walker pulled even around mile 10 and stayed with Fekensa until about mile 23.

"The last two or three miles he just pulled ahead and at that point my calves were cramping up on me a bit and I guess my lack of experience came back to bite me at that point," Walker said.

He'll likely take the rest of the summer off, give his knees a break from the pounding and train mainly on his bike, riding alongside his wife, Nicole, who's an accomplished triathlete who competed in the World Championships last year.

The fall might bring another marathon for him, and he's definitely considering challenging for the title of Manitoba Marathon winner in 2018.

A desire to improve his fitness for wheelchair basketball led 16-yearold Joshua Brown to his first ever half marathon, and his results were impressive.

Brown finished fourth in the half with a time of 2:04:53.4, despite training for just two weeks.

"I like my results. I felt pretty good about them after," Brown said.

He and basketball teammate Steve Hayward trained together, at coach Jarret Yaworski's urging, and kept pace with each other during the actual race. That was key to his success, Brown said.

Hayward, who finished third with a time of 2:04:45.2, proved what a good friend he is when Brown had a mishap near the end of the race.

"At the very end, I flipped in my chair and he stopped for me, but I told him just to go ... I got up quick,"Brown said."He's a good friend."


Montgomery said the Thunder players and coaches immensely enjoyed playing at the home of the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

# MJHL making players pay to play this season

Athletes looking to play in the Manitoba Junior Hockey League this upcoming season will have to open up their wallets.

A league source confirmed last week that the MJHL has implemented a "pay to play" model. A \$500 fee will be paid to the league for every registered player.

The money – which is estimated to be in the neighbourhood of around \$11,000 per team and \$121,000 in total – will go to the league and not individual teams.

Other junior teams in Manitoba, including ones in the Keystone Junior Hockey League and Manitoba Major

Junior Hockey League, are charging players to play to cover league costs.

Junior leagues in Ontario also charge players to play.

But this is a first for junior "A" hockey in Manitoba. And the MJHL is not yet ready to publicly talk about it.

MJHL commissioner Kim Davis was apparently on vacation and would be "back in the office July 24" when contacted via text last Friday and was unavailable for comment.

Meanwhile, Kevin Saurette, the MJHL's director of operations, said he was travelling on holidays last week and suggested any questions be relayed to commissioner Davis.

Saurette did offer, however, that he would talk with Davis early this week and make sure he is aware of the *Selkirk Record's* interview request.

But as of Tuesday afternoon, no contact had been made between the *Selkirk Record* and Davis.

The MJHL, like every other hockey league in Canada, has to come to grips with the current economic times. But how is this new money going to be used? No one, besides the league's higher ups, would know that answer.

But the MJHL should now be concerned that some of their players may

opt to play in other leagues across Canada and, possibly, in the U.S.

Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League president Bill Chow confirmed Monday morning that their league will not be going to a "pay to play" model this season. He admitted the topic has come up but their league has no plans to implement a system charging players to play in the SJHL.










# St. Andrews teen scores hockey scholarship at York University




