

# Local farmer fears for future generations of growers

The number of farm operators in Manitoba is decreasing, while the average age of farmers continues to rise, according to the 2016 Census of Agriculture results.

Despite the increase in age, only one in 12 farmers said they had a formal plan in place for how their operation will be transferred to the next genera-

For 62-year-old grain farmer Greg Thidrickson these statistics are alarming and he says the next generation of farmers "don't have a prayer."

"The margins are so narrow. There's not a lot of regular guys like me farming anymore. The big guys are taking over and the next generation won't have the money to buy land," he told the Record during an interview on his property in Petersfield.

Thidrickson has farming been for more than 40 years and says he bought 320 acres of land in the 70s for \$60 an acre. Now, he says he's started to sell parcels of his land for upwards of \$800 to \$1,000 an acre.

The rising cost of land is only the first challenge. Cost of equipment, fertilizer and seed has sky rocketed too, he says, adding he now pays \$700 for a tonne of fertilizer as opposed to \$80 when he first started.

Census results also revealed that 44 per cent of Canadian farmers do some sort of off-farm work as a supplementary income. Roughly 30 per cent of farm operators worked an average of 30 hours a week or more off the farm, according to the results.

In Manitoba, total farm area dropped two per cent to 17.6 million acres while the average age of Manitoba farmers

rose by 1.3 per cent to 53.8 years old.

Thidrickson said his main concern with major corporations purchasing his land is that the money won't necessarily stay in the local economy.

For now, Thidrickson believes there's not much luck for the next generation of growers.

"My 28-year-old nephew is trying to start farming but he has to borrow all our stuff or else he wouldn't have a chance. The expenses aren't even realistic," he said. "You've got to get an education now-a-days as a backing because you don't know what could happen with farming now."

# Master angler reveals his catfish catching secrets

The Rock 'n' Roll Fisherman, a City Cats guide and a Cabela's pro staff are only a few of the titles master angler Todd Longley has reeled in over the

But the title Longley thinks describes him best is teacher.

"I love teaching people the right techniques and seeing their smiles," he said. "Fishing is all about confidence. I see guys out there who don't have that and they lose the catch."

When the Record caught up with Longley near Lockport last week, he was on his Alumacraft Competitors 205 boat, playing the role of teacher to a group of kids from the Fishing Fun day camp run by the City of Winnipeg.

"Being in a group home and stuff when I was younger, I kinda have a soft spot for kids now and I want them to get off the streets and enjoy the outdoors," said Longley, who has been fishing since he was 10.

After only 20 minutes of being on Longley's boat, he managed to reel in three massive catfish, each measuring between 35 and 38 inches long.

"The biggest I've ever caught was 37 pounds and 42 inches. That was right here in pretty much this spot," he said, referring to where the boat was anchored only some feet away from the banks of Lockport.

Along with teaching at day camps, Longley organizes and volunteers at several charity fishing events. His most recent project was, Keeping It Reel, which took place on June 23 at

Selkirk Park. The event gives kids living with disabilities and their families a day out on the water with Longley and other professional anglers as their teachers.

So what kind of advice did the master angler have for local and area fish-

"It's all about timing and water temperature," he said, adding that early spring and August are the best times to head out on the water and fish. "It dies down at the end of June for spawning then picks up again mid to late July and the fish are biting hard."

When it comes to bait, Longley leaves behind minnows and swears by shrimp and full frogs instead.

"Far none frogs are the best. But only in July, then it's shrimp," he says.

The most common mistake he sees recreational anglers make is setting their hook too soon, explaining that catfish like to play with their food so patience is key.

For rods, Longley says he looks for something eight to nine feet long that is soft but still has enough back bone to"reel in a river monster."

"I always talk up a storm about this city. Selkirk is the catfish capital of North America and I've brought thousands of people here from around the world to fish," he said, adding that actor Chad Lowe was the most recent celeb he took fishing.

# E. coli concerns at Gimli Beach draw mixed reactions

The province issued an E. coli advisory for Gimli Beach after a July 6 test found high levels of the bacteria in Lake Winnipeg.

Reaction to the advisory was mixed. Despite the warning, dozens of people enjoyed the beach last Sunday.

An advisory sign posted at the boardwalk states that Gimli Beach has experienced "high levels" of the bac-

teria this season, which last for short periods of time, but the "possibility of illness increases with higher levels of bacteria."

Erick, who did not want his surname used, came from Winnipeg with his family for the day and was not aware of the advisory. He said he did not see the sign.

"If I knew, I wouldn't swim in there," he said. "They should post signs ev-

erywhere that warn people. They should have them every 50 metres so it covers almost the entire place."

E. coli levels fluctuate at Gimli, according to Sustainable

Development's Beach Monitoring website.

On June 6, Gimli Beach had a colony-forming unit (CFU) of 119 (average density of E. coli per 100 ml), dropped which later in the month. On July 4, a test showed 39 CFU. Two days later, that spiked to 322 prompt-CFU, ing the advisory. For recreational activities, the acceptable level of E.coli is 200 CFU, according to the province's Water Protection Handbook.

Another beachgoer, who was splashing in the lake with her three kids, said she knew about the advisory, but did not wish to

comment on whether she had any concerns.

To reduce the risk of illness, the advisory states that people should avoid swimming if they have an open cut or wound or are experiencing illness, to wash their hands before handling food and to avoid swallowing lake water.

For Gimli resident Samantha Michaluk, who has owned and operated Viking Rentals (Seadoo rentals) for 20 years, advisories are par for the course.

"The thing you have to look for is how many people really, truly say they got sick from the water?" she said. "I've never heard of people getting sick in my 20 years here."

Gimli Mayor Randy Woroniuk, a retired provincial conservation officer, said he thinks the gull presence in Gimli is "not out of the ordinary," but they can contribute to E. coli.

What he's more concerned about is what's being dumped into the Red River and making its way north to Gimli.

"I do not believe that dumping raw sewage into the Red River in Winnipeg is not impacting our lake here. I don't believe it," said Woroniuk. "I don't believe it's being diluted to such a point that it's not having an impact."





# Damage to Marine Museum a hit to the community, manager says

Recent damage caused by a suspected group of vandals at the Marine Museum of Manitoba is a hit to the community, the museum's manager says.

"It's a hit not only to us as the museum but to Selkirk and it's history," Shaylene Nordal said.

Nordal said sometime between the hours of 6 p.m. on July 2 and 9 a.m. on July 3 a large lifeboat that was positioned near the edge of the M.S. Chickama II was pushed off of the ship and badly damaged once it hit the ground below.

"It had to be more than one person, it was a big lifeboat," she said. "The front end was smashed, it would all have to be rebuilt."

Nordal said at this point they are unsure if they'll be able to bring the boat back to it's original state. She added it's difficult to put a price on the life-

"That was irreplaceable, you can build another one but it's not the original that was on here."

Nordal said Selkirk RCMP are aware of the situation and the museum is working closely with the City of Selkirk to help increase security in the area. "I just hope that it stops," she said.

Nordal is asking anyone who sees any suspicious activity around the museum after hours to contact police.

"If people see anybody on the ships ... I'd really like it if they phone police."

Duane Nicol, chair of the museum's board, said they also erect barriers to keep people off the ships when the museum is closed. Nicol said this recent incident is "very disappointing."

"Each incident is a big set back for us," he said. "The money that we were going to use for improvements and enhancements go to fixing things."

Nordal said setting up a fence around the museum to keep people out after hours just isn't an option.

"We want people to be able to come down and walk around the grounds," she said. "We want to be able to leave it open.

"Our museum is the ships and they just happen to be outside."

Nordal said they have six employees this summer along with several volunteers. She added July and August are their busiest months and they are expected to welcome thousands of visitors to the museum during that time.

Repairs and improvements to the museum are also ongoing. Painters could be spotted putting a fresh coat of paint on the museum's lighthouses last Wednesday afternoon.

The Marine Museum of Manitoba, located at the corner of Eveline Street and Queen Avenue at the entrance to Selkirk Park, officially opened in May 1974 in Selkirk.

"When we first started, we were across the street in a restaurant parking lot," Lemire explained. "It was called the 'Lily Pad Restaurant,' and that's how the name came about."

Although the car is perfectly clean and polished now, he says there is always more work to be done.

# Selkirk hospital home to upgraded cancer care services

Since the Selkirk Regional Health Centre officially opened on June 25, thousands of Interlake patients have walked through the region's new hospital.

One of the changes many patients say they're happy about is the bigger and more efficient CancerCare Program services.

"People don't realize what services are available to them until they're diagnosed with cancer so patients have been really pleased when they see what we have," said Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority spokeswoman, Lauralou Cicierski.

The new space on the hospital's second floor has a larger square-footage area for treatments, more windows for natural light and additional treatment rooms. The upgrade also includes two new dialysis chairs, allowing a total of seven patients to receive chemotherapy at a time.

"The staff are really enjoying the bigger space. They have more privacy,

they're not tripping over one another. Audra Nesbitt-Hume, the clinical The mood is definitely happy," said team manager for Selkirk oncology,

dialysis and outpatient unit.

The new space currently treats 125 patients but Nesbitt-Hume says CancerCare Manitoba is aware they can accommodate even more.

Additional staff have also been hired, which will allow the hospital to increase their patient intake, she says.

Allowing people who live in the Interlake to stay close to home while receiving treatment is necessary to the recovery process, she said, adding that local or area residents diagnosed with cancer can contact CancerCare Manitoba to be referred to the Selkirk Regional Health Centre.

A new Cancer Navigation Services office is also fairly new to Selkirk, opening its doors last spring. The resource gives patience and their families emotional support and the practical education needed regarding treatment.



# Honey helps sweeten the job for local beekeeper

When Brad Hogg and his wife Carol were both laid off from their jobs only a few short months apart, Brad says it was his faith that kept him optimistic.

"We both have a strong faith in God and we just knew that we had to have faith about where our lives would go from here," said Brad, who lives on a 20-acre property in Libau located 20 minutes north of Selkirk.

With his IT job gone, Hogg decided to trust his faith and follow his dad's passion for beekeeping.

In 2014, he bought nine hives and quickly grew his colony to 74 the next year. Meeting the province's standards as a commercial beekeeper, Hogg had to come up with a name for his company.

"Calling it 'Faith Apiaries' just felt right," he says.

Now, the couple has more than 90 hives, harvesting close to 100 pounds of honey each year.

They sell their honey for \$8 a pound at local and area farmer's markets, on their website and to family and friends.

"If people are in the Interlake area, I don't mind doing deliveries either,"

Turning a profit is why Faith Apiaries first started, but Hogg says that's not his only goal.

"I'm really, really interested in helping new people because I know how difficult it is to find relevant information to this area. You can't listen to someone in Tennessee tell you how to keep bees. It's totally different here," he said.

Brad has hosted workshops at Selkirk's Gaynor Family Library, created Facebook groups to share information with hobby beekeepers and joined the board of the Manitoba Bee Keepers Association.

His door is always open, he says, encouraging anyone who's interested in beekeeping to get in contact with him.

"Whatever level someone wants to be involved at ... working bees, buying

bees, just learning about them ... they can come to me and I'll help them."

The best way for people to support the "save the bees movement" though is buying local honey, he says.

"That helps me keep more bees and helps me pay the scientists to find out how we can combat stress on bees."

Owning an apiary isn't an easy job and Carol says her husband is often working from "dawn until dusk." But Brad says he doesn't mind spending so much time with the insects he calls

"They're the most fascinating thing I've ever encountered. There just isn't that much brain power in an insect for everything they know."

Drivers should look for cover nearby in a sturdy building or storm shelter,

heading to the basement and away from windows. If there's no shelter available, drivers should find the nearest ditch or low-laying area and lie flat, covering their head with their arms.


"Whatever you do, don't take cover in an underpass," Miller said. "While it may seem safe, they become wind tunnels, and the underpass could collapse or your vehicle could be blown away."

Severe weather safety tips:

- Remember that tornado season in Canada peaks in June and July.
- Always listen to the local radio station for weather warnings and updates in the area.

Peslaruk hopes to make the Dairy Queen yard sale fundraiser an annual event, raising even more money for other kids like her daughter in the years to come.



# Folk Festival breaks records, welcomes change

Sunshine, bubbles, hula hoops and oodles of musical talent took over Birds Hill Provincial Park last weekend during the 44th annual Winnipeg Folk Festival.

"We're the third biggest community in Manitoba this weekend, which is pretty cool," said the festival's executive director, Lynne Skromeda.

Though exact attendance numbers had yet to be calculated by Sunday night, organizers believe more than 60,000 folkies took in the weekend festivities and that Saturday's walk-up attendance may have broken records. It was also the first time in more than five years the campground sold out.

Not to mention, the rain stayed away. "This has been a really fantastic year. I couldn't have ordered the weather better myself," Skromeda said.

But even after 44 years of success, she says Folk Fest still focuses on improving to give folkies exactly what they want.

"We really like to react to audience feedback and do the best we can to accommodate everyone's needs."

A few changes to this year's fest included composting in the festival area and campground, a partnership with Jardins St. Leon Gardens for a fresh fruit and vegetable stand and additional training for first aid volunteers to deal with opioid overdoses.

"We know of the sensitivity around the opioid crisis and even though it's not really our audience we want to make sure people are feeling safe," said Skromeda.

No naloxone kits had been administered when the Record spoke with first aid volunteers on Sunday afternoon.

The festival also made the choice to distance itself from the Canada 150 celebrations.

"For us it's about celebrating music and people and so we wanted to look at the entire breath of Canadian music ... not only the last 150 years," Skrumeda said, adding that several Indigenous musicians performed

### Selkirk history book author will be remembered as 'a real inspiration'

What Rosalyn Howard remember most about her father is his commitment to his family along with his sense of humour.


"He was really funny," the Dunnottar resident said."I remember him always cracking jokes.

"Right up until his final days he would manage to comment on something and make light of it."

Former Selkirk resident Ken Howard passed away on June 4 in Winnipeg following a brief illness. He was 92.

"Dad was a real inspiration in terms of just keep going," Rosalyn said. "All of the Howards are like that."

Ken's drive and determination to preserve Selkirk's history also led him to release his book, "Stories of Selkirk's Pioneers and Their Heritage," in 2011 at the age of 86.



book printed commemorate Selkirk's 125th anniversary and is dedicated to Ken's late grandmother, father, and mother and to "all Selkirk, Manitoba's pioneers, upon whose shoulders we stand."

The 506-page book, which took him eight years to write, includes stories from the more than 100 interviews he

"He loved the work he did for that book," Rosalyn said. "He felt so honoured to be trusted by people with their stories.

"He loved doing the research and crafting it into something that people would care about."

Ken also tried his best to encourage youth in Selkirk to learn more about their city's history. In 2015, he gifted 360 Comp graduates with a copy of his book in hopes of sparking their interest.

Along with a long list of accomplishments, Ken wrote weekly columns for several publications including a history column for the Record. In the early 1940s he also collected stories for the then edition of the Selkirk Record. His very first job was as a paperboy, earning one cent per day per customer.

"He was passionate about always having a project," Rosalyn said. "He had this incredible commitment to continued learning."

Rosalyn added well into his senior years her father kept his computer skills up to date and was always on the look out for new programs.

Two years ago, Ken moved to The Portsmouth in Winnipeg where he made new friends, joined the residents' council and started a poetry

Besides good genes, Rosalyn believes her father's commitment to staying active helped him live a long and full life. Even in his eighties he was still swimming laps. He also loved nature and music and was an avid gardener.

"We're really going to miss him," Rosalyn said. "We've been so lucky to have had him in our lives for this long and that's what we're trying to focus on."

A Celebration of Life for Ken Howard is being held at the Portsmouth Residence in Winnipeg, on Friday, July 14, and his ashes will be buried on Saturday, July 15 at St. Clements Anglican Church in Selkirk.

The Record caught up with Ken shortly after his 90th birthday in 2015. During that time he spoke about his love of Selkirk and the city's history and how he hoped the stories in his book helped document it.

"Each one of these is their own story," he told the Record while holding up his book. "This will benefit so many people ... and it's never ending."

# Three Selkirk streets undergo resurfacing, land drainage upgrades

An investment of close to \$1 million will improve three city streets, drainage and reduce the number of combined sewer systems that still exist in Selkirk.

Dan McDermid, director of operations, said portions of McLean, Sophia and Pacific were selected for resurfacing and land drainage improvements this summer, in accordance with the city's Capital Asset Management Program (CAMP).

Capital Asset Management is an innovative practice that allows municipalities to better catalogue, track and manage their assets. Using predictive modelling techniques, long-range maintenance planning, paired with long-term financial planning tools, capital asset management will allow Selkirk to get the most out of its infrastructure, extending its service life and helping to make better, more cost

effective construction and renovation decisions.

City management completed Phase 1 of its CAMP in 2016 and it confirmed what they already knew - the city's infrastructure was aging and much of it was reaching the end of its useful life.

Duane Nicol, the city's CAO, said that using the robust asset data the city now has in one database will move investment decisions beyond common human biases.

"Without these tools investment decisions can get made by crazy things like which streets Councillors or staff drive on most, or have most exposure to. These tools also help us get beyond simply being reactionary - that is to say, waiting until the asset fails before we rehab or repair it," Nicol said. "A 'worst-is-first' strategy for asset management is, counter-intuitively, not the most cost-effective strategy. Yet without a strong asset management system, that's the trap into which that most municipalities fall."

McDermid said the city's CAMP will help stage and time projects for maximum cost effectiveness as well.

"For example, this year we knew that we had some combined sewer systems on streets that needed resurfacing. So we moved up the sewer separation work planned for those blocks to take advantage of the fact that we were removing the old pavement. In the long run, better project planning and staging will save the city millions, which we can put towards doing more work," McDermid said.

Both McLean and Pacific were on a combined sewer system, meaning rain water and waste water use the same pipe. Both have now been separated.

McDermid said the city has been working to eliminate combined sewers to reduce basement backups and prevent potential overflows of combined sewer effluent being dumped into the Red River.

McLean Avenue was resurfaced from Main to Eveline Street at a cost of \$250,000 and also had land drainage sewer upgrades, which cost \$170,000.

Pacific Avenue resurfacing between Jemima and Sophia Street cost \$200,000 and combined sewer separation cost \$65,500. Sophia Street resurfacing between Superior and Queen Avenue had a price tag of \$300,000.

All projects were paid for from reserve funds with grant support from the Province of Manitoba.



vis Fenske (Stonewall), Devon Casson (Argyle), Tyler Smith (St. Andrews) and Christian Ingram (West St. Paul) and each has made significant contributions to the program.

"We liked the talent when we were scouting them," Bouchard said.

Fenske is a pitcher who also plays third base.



"He has a decent arm and we like his swing," Bouchard said. "He has a good, compact swing and puts the ball in play. He doesn't tend to strike out too much."


Ingram, 16, is a real nice talent with an impressive swing. He hit in the
