After a year of almost no change, Canada's private sector job vacancy rate edged up 0.2 percentage points to 2.6 per cent

— or 329,900 jobs — in the second quarter of 2017, according to the latest Help Wanted report compiled by the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB).

In Manitoba, the private sector job vacancy rate decreased slightly to 2.1 per cent, representing 8,900 unfilled

"We are starting to see a growing number of unfilled jobs in most provinces across country," Ted Mallett,

chief economist at CFIB, stated in a release recently.

According to the report, British Columbia continues to have the highest vacancy rate in Canada at 3.1 per cent representing 56,000 unfilled jobs. Quebec, which has seen the biggest climbs in unfilled positions in recent quarters, has a vacancy rate of 2.8 per cent (78,600 jobs) and is followed by Ontario with a vacancy rate of 2.7 percent (134,300 jobs).

Selkirk hosts overdose response training workshop

Twenty community and area members now know how to better spot an overdose and administer the lifesaving drug naloxone following a training workshop held in Selkirk last

The session, which was organized by the Manitoba Harm Reduction Network and the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, was held at the Selkirk Community Health office last Tuesday afternoon.

"We are definitely going to be holding other sessions in Selkirk, given the interest that has been shown," said Anlina Sheng, a harm reduction project facilitator for the Interlake-Eastern region.

People invited to take part in the training included those who use drugs, friends and family of people who use drugs and service providers. Those who completed the training, and who were eligible under the province's free take home naloxone program, had an opportunity to receive a naloxone kit, which is otherwise available in some pharmacies.

Kits include three doses of naloxone, three syringes with retractable needles, alcohol swabs, gloves and instructions.

Although Maniotba's take-home

naloxone kit program was launched in January, this was the first time the Interlake region has held a public training session on the drug.

The training included how to identify symptoms of overdose from different types of drugs, including hallucinogens, stimulants and depressants as well as what to do and not do in response to each type of overdose.

Participants were told to look for symptoms such as blue lips, small pupils, slow breathing and a rasping or gurgling sound.

Training emphasized ways of decreasing the risk of overdose, such as to avoid mixing drugs. Other suggestions were to never do drugs alone, and to avoid injecting a drug because it enters into the blood stream very quickly, whereas swallowing or snorting drugs is a slower route and therefore less risky.

Caution was also advised for those with health issues, stress, fatigue or dehydration — all factors which put people at higher risk of an overdose.

The training highlighted the importance of knowing how to perform CPR, and performing it even before one injects naloxone, the antidote to fentanyl, since opioids attach themselves to the same receptor sites that control breathing.

"Naloxone usually doesn't work instantly,"

afternoon.

Sheng said. "You need to keep doing make them feel better. rescue breathing."

Sheng explained that naloxone is a very safe drug, which only works for opioids by "kicking them off" the receptor sites and binding to them instead.

Sheng cautioned to never get a stimulant to try to counteract an opioid overdose, and to never give more drugs to the person who has just received the naloxone in an effort to

Staying with a person after a drug has been taken is also important, according to Sheng. An overdose can occur up to three hours after ingesting a drug.

Aspects of pot legalization concerns Manitobans: survey

Manitobans have some issues with the upcoming legalization of marijuana, according to recent poll results.

Results from a Probe Research survey conducted on behalf of *CTV Winnipeg* showed that most Manitobans view marijuana's effects more negatively than alcohol.

The survey also found tougher rules surrounding marijuana use should be in place before the federal government legalizes the drug, particularly for young people.

The survey also found that 67 per cent of Manitobans would be uncomfortable to learn their neighbour was a frequent marijuana user as opposed to an alcohol drinker. But not everyone agrees.

"Personally I'd rather live next to someone who smokes marijuana as opposed to a heavy drinker," said Annie Penny of Selkirk. "(Heavy drinkers) are usually loud and obnoxious, If my neighbour was some quiet stoner type, smoking weed in their backyard, I wouldn't say anything.

"Pot smokers mind their own busi-

ness.

Jack Lubinski of St. Andrews said that he wouldn't have any problems living next door to a responsible marijuana user.

"Over the course of my life, I've met several people who use marijuana in a recreational way," Lubinski said. "As long as someone is responsible with their (marijuana) use, I'm fine with it."

The current Liberal government has promised to legalize the drug sometime by July 2018. Many details of the

legalization remain unknown.

Les Hodi of West St. Paul believes new regulations around marijuana won't change much.

"People are going to (smoke marijuana) anyways, so I don't think that having laws against it would make a difference," Hodi said.

Daniel Forese of Selkirk says that he trusts the current government and will support whatever legislation occurs.

"I feel like there's an already es-

tablished position in place, I'd say that there's not much that needs to be changed (with the legalization)," Forese says.

Poll results also showed that younger adults aged 18 to 34, were more likely to be comfortable with marijuana sales, and were more worried about the effects of alcohol over marijuana.

A total of 1,032 Manitoba adults completed the survey between Aug. 8 and Aug. 20, 2017.

Rob Cormack, director of operations at Barney Gargles Restaurant in Selkirk, says the restaurant industry especially has been struggling to attract new staff members. He added they have been looking to hire cooks, prep cooks and bakers for nearly three months.

"What we're finding is that it's pretty hard to attract somebody into the industry," Cormack said. "I don't know if it's a lack of high wages or lack of opportunities ... but if you paid attention to the want ads this summer there were lots of restaurants hiring."

For Selkirk Tim Hortons owner and operator, Victor Martens, one of his main challenges is finding quality mplovees

"Sometimes we struggle because we don't have quality staff," Martens said. Martens added while he prefers to hire locally, about 20 per cent of his employees live in Winnipeg.

"My preference is always local, I do not want to hire outside Selkirk at all," he said. "It's a headache for me to get people out here ... but it's sometimes hard to find quality local people."

"Our transportation into Selkirk is a huge stumbling block," Hebert said. "I think it all comes down to wages and henefits."

According to the latest Help Wanted report, rising vacancy rates were seen in the oil and gas sectors, construction, manufacturing, transportation and hospitality. Vacancy rates also declined in the information, arts and recreation, finance and real estate industries.

According to the CFIB's Manitoba Business Barometer Index for August, 44 per cent of small businesses in Manitoba say their overall state of business is good and 16 per cent of small businesses in Manitoba plan to increase full-time employment in the next three to four months.

The index also showed that insufficient domestic demand remains the main operating challenge at 36 per cent, followed by management skills/time constraints at 31 per cent, and shortage of skilled labour at 27 per cent.

August 2017 findings were based on



706 responses, collected from a random sample of CFIB members, to a controlled-access web survey.





Fire crews save Selkirk man's guitar during downtown blaze

A Selkirk man has local firefighters to thank for saving a special keepsake after his apartment burst into flames.

Lawrence Smith spent much of last Wednesday sorting through smoke damaged boxes of family photos, clothes and tools firefighters from both Selkirk and East Selkirk fire departments managed to salvage following the fire on Aug. 28.

Although he appeared relieved that a few of his possessions were still in tact, he was happiest that a guitar, which used to belong to his mother, made it out of the fire.

"Basically this is it," Smith said while sorting through his things last Wednesday. "I went out for a bit and came back and my house was on fire.

"There was not much I could do so I just sat and watched it burn."

Fire crews battled the blaze for several hours on Aug. 28. Smith had been living in the second storey apartment for nearly three years and was planning on moving out at the end of last month. Selkirk Fire Department Chief Craig Fiebelkorn said the cause of the fire, which started in the attic of the building located at 224 Manitoba Ave.,

MPI, RCMP partner to promote safety on gravel roads

Nearly 500 people are injured in crashes on gravel roads in Manitoba annually, according to Manitoba Public Insurance. Sadly, about 14 people are killed yearly in crashes which occur on Manitoba gravel roads.

"The margin for error is razor thin when drivers make mistakes on a gravel surface," said Insp. Ed Moreland, Officer in Charge, RCMP Traffic Services Unit. "Much like ice, failure to adjust to conditions can have dire consequences."

In efforts to reduce those numbers and heighten road safety awareness, Manitoba Public Insurance and the RCMP have partnered in a joint public awareness and enforcement campaign specific to gravel roads, which began in April and is continuing into the fall. As of the end of July, 460 Highway

Traffic Act offences notices have been issued by the RCMP, highlighted by 190 speeding, 21 non-seatbelt, and 16 short-term roadside suspensions. In addition, 10 impaired driving charges have also been laid under the Criminal Code of Canada.

In efforts to heighten awareness about the challenges associated with driving on gravel roads among new drivers, Manitoba Public Insurance has also announced plans to enhance its high school driver education program starting in September.

On average, 38 per cent of gravel road fatal crashes in Manitoba are alcohol related, while speed is attributed to nearly 20 per cent of gravel road fatal crashes. There are about 3,200 crashes reported annually on gravel roads based on Manitoba Public Insurance data.



GoManitoba app aims to make carpooling easier

Commuting to work from Selkirk to Winnipeg might be a lot easier now, thanks to a new carpooling initiative called GoManitoba.

GoManitoba is an app that uses your work and home addresses to find people you can commute with to your workplace. It aims to help facilitate carpooling arrangements, public transit usage, and even walking and biking groups.

Mel Marginet, co-ordinator for Go-Manitoba's Workplace Commuter Options program, said that it's often for large companies to make commuting arrangements for their employees.

"All of these major institutions were trying to find carpool partners for their employees within their own workplace. It was really hard because there wasn't that critical mass of people," Marginet said. "But with this technology, you're connected to everyone ... If somebody lives in your neighborhood, and they work close to you, then why not potentially (carpool) with them as well?"

GoManitoba uses a system called RideShark, which according to Go-Manitoba's website, says that they match users based on proximity to

origin, destination, actual travel route, and personal preferences. It is available to all Manitobans.

But some Manitobans don't see the immediate benefits of the program.

Thomas Sutton has to commute from Selkirk to Winnipeg every day for his legal assistant job. Sutton said that everyone who has to go to Winnipeg for work has no reason to use the service.

"I'm glad that there's something available for people who might need to go from Selkirk to Winnipeg for work, but I don't think (GoManitoba) will get a lot of use," Sutton said. "Everybody who would need something like this, already has a way to get to

GoManitoba is planning to have a launch event sometime this month.

It was initiated by the Green Action Centre, and has partnered with organizations like the University of Winnipeg and the Partnership of the Manitoba Capital Region. After the September launch, GoManitoba plans to travel to other parts of the province in the fall, to find partners in other towns and cities.

Marginet thinks that the program has a lot of potential, since there isn't that many commuting options for Manitobans.

"There's so much potential, especially in our province where we don't have a lot of 'in between town' transit options. I grew up in rural Manitoba, and you're just really limited if you don't have a vehicle."

Motorists reminded to drive with care in school zones

Motorists in Manitoba are being reminded to drive with extra care in school zones as annual speed restrictions came back into effect on Sept. 1.

"The month of September means thousands of Manitoba students are soon returning to school," Infrastructure Minister and St. Paul MLA Ron Schuler stated in a release last week. "With school-zone restrictions in Manitoba taking effect ... we ask that all drivers take extra precaution by reducing their speed and remaining alert when approaching school zones.

"Drivers affected by these areas may need to consider providing more time for their commute or altering their travel route. There is never an excuse to be in a hurry when traveling through school zones in our province."

Pedestrian, school bus and private vehicle traffic will greatly increase in school areas as classes begin in September. Motorists are advised to drive with extra caution and be alert to the increased presence of children in school areas.

Over a two week period from Feb. 6 to 17 and Nov. 29 to Dec. 9 of last year, drivers recorded 340 and 309 violations respectively. Based on their survey results, a driver illegally passes a school bus an average of 36 times per

LSSD transportation supervisor Mike Munday said they are in the process of installing stop arm cameras on their school buses, which will help provide video evidence for the RCMP to use while issuing tickets.

Failing to stop for a bus that has its red lights flashing and stop arm extended can carry a \$672 fine and two demerit points.

"We don't want people to get fined, we just want people to stop," Munday said in a previous interview with the Record. "We want to ensure this remains about informing the public and does not require a tragedy to change driver behaviours."

Gov't funds fuel upgrade projects at 4 Selkirk schools

Nearly \$3.7 million in provincial dollars are helping fund five upgrade projects at four Selkirk schools.

"Provincially our government is ramping up the much-needed renewal and upgrading of school infrastructure," Selkirk MLA Alan Lagimodiere stated in a release last Tuesday. "We're investing \$53.7 million towards 110 projects to ensure safe and healthy environments for students, support staff, educators and administrators in Manitoba's public schools."

Projects within the LSSD include a gym upgrade at École Selkirk Junior High, a boiler replacement at both Happy Thought School and Ruth Hooker School as well as an exterior curtain wall replacement and brick ledge structural remediation at the Comp.

Lord Selkirk School Division (LSSD) Supt. Michele Polinuk said exterior changes to the Comp will make it a much more welcoming to new and returning students.

"That will be an ultimate jewel in the end, nothing has been done to that building since it was built," Polinuk said, adding they are hoping that this "extensive project" will start sometime next year. "We are so grateful that we will be able to upgrade that facility.

"All of our students end up there ... so it will be great that we will have a



nice, welcoming exterior."

The Comp was built in 1971 and the local high school's last major renovation project was done in 1987 where the current library sits.

"The work planned for this project was a part of the plans being worked on for the past three years between the LSSD and the Public School Finance Board," Polinuk added.

The funding for all five projects is welcome news to the LSSD's aging facilities, she said.

"It means that our

aging facilities ... are being addressed and being able to be replaced or refurbished so we can continue to have great facilities for our students."

"I feel confident these projects will make a real difference for students and teaching staff in Manitoba and help to extend the lives of many of our public schools," Municipal Relations Minister Jeff Wharton stated in a release.

plans for the Comp.

Wharton noted the projects will be completed within a timeframe of six to 24 months following the award of tenders and start of construction.

The Manitoba government is providing more than \$92.4 million in planned capital spending in 2017-18 for public school infrastructure projects across the province, he added.



While Milt Pedwell, of the the Selkirk Canoe and Kayak Centre, was canoeing down the river with one of his trainees, the only sounds heard were the swaying of the reeds and the paddles moving through the water.

rat trapper in the area hired Pedwell to help him catch prey, and in return the trapper taught him how to paddle.

While up north, he and his Indigenous friends would play a game. One of the hunters would wander into the woods and get lost. The others would wait for 30 minutes, then start tracking their lost friend. This would turn

into an intense game of hide and seek. "That's the way of the north," Pedwell

said.

While most of his family lives in Winnipeg, Pedwell stayed in Selkirk because there "was no way this old bushman can live in a big city like that."

Children who attend the Selkirk Friendship Centre's daycare have been visiting Selkirk Park each weekday this July and August as part of a Day Camping program, which has been offered for the past four years.

Rain or shine, the children, along with four supervising adults, head to the campground where a tent and trailer are set up for them next to the rows of campers in the public campground.

The day starts early, at 7 a.m. If the weather is good, a camp fire is built and the children will then have some free time to play and explore until 8 a.m. Then, it's off to the playground until snack time, and a full day of structured activity follows.

The day camp, part of the Healthy Early Learning Program, is designed for children aged four to 12 and can accommodate up to 20 children.

The program has been offered for the past four summers, and has grown over the years, said Donna Smith, supervisor for the Kids First Before and After School Care.

"The first year only eight or 10 children took part," Smith said. "This year, we've had 12 to 17 daily throughout the summer."

The 200 acre Selkirk Park is an ideal setting for the children to learn as it offers a wide range of opportunities.

With so much to see and do there is little chance any child can become bored. In addition to activities such as swimming and romping through

"It gives kids the experience of being outdoors, camping and exploring nature," Smith said.

The joy of being in the park setting all summer is written on the faces of the children there. Freya, one of the girls enrolled in the program, exuberantly explained how much she loves to spend time at the playground, particularly on the monkey bars.

"My favourite part is going crazy like a monkey," she laughed.

Some other favourite activities have included nature bowling, swimming, playing at the spray park, and boat watching from the launch pad.

Local artist doing the WAVE with coloured pencil

Artist Terry Mellway showcased her stunning coloured pencil works during the WAVE Interlake Artists' Studio Tour held last weekend.

Although many of her subjects are taken from the natural world, Mellway's human subjects are so realistic and full of character, they practically jump off the wall.

"I do my own photography," said Mellway during a brief lull in her Pencil & Brush Studio next to her Sandy Hook home where a steady stream of WAVE visitors filed in to see her work. "And I draw from those photographs."

She had taken a photograph of a man at Cook Point in Hawaii (named after 18th-century British mariner James Cook) where he had been pulling crabs from the water and washing them in a pot. He became the subject of a wonderfully expressive and intricate drawing.

Keeping in mind the ethics of photographing people then possibly turning a profit from their image in the portraits she produces, Mellway said, "I firmly believe in paying my subjects for their photographs."

It take about 50 hours to create a finished work owing to the thousands of painstaking strokes and colour blending involved in the medium.

"It used to take me a lot longer than it does now," she laughed. "Some people who work in acrylics finish in an afternoon."

Mellway has been an artist for most of her life and has created works using acrylics and watercolours. But in the last 10 years or so, she's concentrated on coloured pencil.

"Years ago I worked with a [photography] studio where we used coloured pencils to re-touch old photographs,"

Because the warmth of the hand can smudge a work in progress, Mellway uses a piece of paper on which she rests her palm while she draws then seals the finished work with a fine art spray.

She has won awards in both local and international competitions and has been featured in a number of magazines, including Coloured Pencil

Magazine and CP Treasures, Volume IV. She's also a member of the Coloured Pencil Society of America, the Manitoba Society of Artists, the Manitoba Arts Network and the Gimli Art

She sells framed and unframed works as well as greeting cards.

Two tour participants inquired about coloured pencil classes, which Mellway intends to offer this fall in her studio. The six-week classes will comprise about 18 hours of instruction for about \$250.



Playing junior hockey? Better get dental insurance

All Clint Torfason wanted to do was try to win a Keystone Junior Hockey League championship for his Arborg Ice Dawgs.

But he has been forced to pay a very steep price for his championship ambitions.

The 21 year old from Winnipeg Beach was left with a monstrous dental bill after getting hit in the face with a high stick in a KJHL playoff game against the Peguis Juniors back on April 1.

"When the accident happened, my whole mouth was vibrating but there really wasn't much pain at the time," said Torfason, noting it was both disappointing and frustrating to hear that some of the opposing fans were cheering when he was spitting out blood and teeth on the ice.

"You're in shock when it happens but finding out after what the costs are hurts more."

Torfason suffered a fractured jaw, lacerations, and lost five teeth from the incident. Torfason will need dental surgeries, numerous implants, and bone grafting to his jaw.

This is estimated to cost between \$35,000 and \$40,000 which is well beyond what insurance will

Torfason's mother, Gail, has been told that it will take over a year from now to have all of the dental procedures done on her son.

"I didn't realize how long the process was going to be," she admitted, noting her family has dental coverage through Blue Cross."And until something like this happens, you don't realize what's not covered. There are a lot of things that are exempt...and there's a maximum, too."

Clint's injuries were quite extensive.

"When one of the specialists looked at Clint's face, he said, 'It was the worst damage that he has seen from a hockey accident." Gail noted. "He said, 'He can't believe that stuff like this still happens in hockey.""

Torfason was reimbursed only \$2,500 - the maximum payable per accident - under Hockey Canada's dental insurance program. Hockey Canada's Todd Jackson was quick to warn that that this is a "secondary" policy.

"It kicks in after private insurance has exhausted," Jackson explained last Thursday afternoon. "If a player does not have private insurance then it would act as primary in those cases."

Jackson said Hockey Canada does not get many claims over the course of a season from minor hockey players that wear cages.

It is a different story, however, at the junior level.

"I can't give you numbers because I don't have numbers in front of me," Jackson admitted. "But we get a fair amount of claims that come in from a dental perspective. "We are a secondary (insurance) and we pay after the primary is exhausted."

But many would argue that Hockey Canada's dental insurance coverage is a slap in the face to play-

"For any kids that are playing hockey, it's an eye opener," Gail Torfason said. "I don't even know if there is extra insurance that you can get to cover this. I really don't know. You think that you're covered for everything and then you realize that you're

Chris Poponick, a longtime coach with the Selkirk Fishermen in the Keystone Junior Hockey League, said dental insurance should be a concern for parents and players.


"We go into this sport knowing Hockey Canada covers us for certain things," he said. "But when the (dental coverage) is only \$2,500, a player can have much more (of a cost) after one crosscheck to the face or a shot to the face, whatever it might be.

"There must be a way to look at subsidizing something additional for those who don't have (primary) dental coverage."

On Hockey Canada's website, it describes its insurance as "an exceptional insurance program that has been built with the needs of its members in mind."

But it shows that only eight per cent of the premiums paid into its insurance program go towards accident and dental coverage.

"You think that playing for 15, 16 years under Hockey Canada that they would help out their players," Clint Torfason argued. "But right now, they're just handing out some pocket change.

High stick costs Ice Dawgs player \$40,000 in dental bills

A stick across the jaw during a junior league hockey game left an Arborg Ice Dawgs player without a number of teeth and his family facing almost \$40,000 in dental reconstruction costs.

Clint Torfason, a 21-year-old hockey player from Winnipeg Beach, was slashed across the mouth by a Peguis Junior player April 1 during a KJHL championship final and lost five teeth in his upper jaw despite the mouth guard he was wearing.

"There was probably nine minutes left in the third period, and I was kind of at the end of my shift at that point and I had control of the puck," said Torfason last week. "Just outside the Peguis blue line, I dumped the puck in prior to a change. Right after I dumped the puck in, I got the blade of a stick. It was kind of like a pitchfork motion right into my mouth."

He said he fell to the ice and kind of went into shock.

"There was a lot of blood," he said, recalling how his mouth vibrated. "My teeth didn't all come out at once. They were shattered. I was spitting piece by piece out. I didn't bother picking them up because those teeth were shattered, so I just skated off the ice."

The following morning, the family were able to obtain an emergency appointment with their dentist in Selkirk, and the shattered teeth in his jaw had to be pulled out as there was no way to save them.

Torfason said he's unsure whether it was a deliberate act of aggression, but he could "make a few assumptions about it."

What is certain are the massive dental reconstruction bills he and his parents have to pay, and the year and a half of dental appointments, bone grafting surgery, and pain and suffering ahead of him before he gets replacement teeth.

"Right now I have two specialists working on my teeth," he said. "One guy is going to be putting the screws in for the implant process and other guy is working on impressions for the teeth. I'll need bone grafting done first. They will probably take bone from my hip and put some in my jaw. Then I've got to let that heal. After that heals, they'll put the implants and screws in and let that heal. Then

they'll insert the teeth."

He said his prosthodontist's assistant told him they've dealt with a lot of hockey injuries in the past, but in her 20 years of practice, his injuries were the worst she's ever seen.

Four referees on the ice that day allegedly did not see the incident.

"The KJHL...had four refs during the finals...to watch all the stuff going on behind the play," said Torfason, "but no ref on the ice saw it happen. It was quite a joke. They had a meeting with Hockey Manitoba and with my general manager at that time, and they said they saw me spit out blood and teeth, but they could not confirm how it happened. So they couldn't do anything about it."

Hockey Manitoba, which governs senior, junior, recreational and minor hockey and enforces game rules, states on its website that it believes in "values of fair play and sportsmanship, including the development of respect for all people by all participants."

Clint's mom said the organization told her it does not consider video recordings as evidence.

"Clint was high-sticked and the building was packed because it was a play-off game. Clint fell to the ice, he was bleeding and he spit out his teeth...and the refs didn't even call a penalty on the guy," said Gail Torfason. "Hockey Manitoba said we cannot use video as evidence."

Hockey Manitoba did not respond to an email request from the *Express* for clarification as to why it doesn't consider video evidence.

The organization has an insurance package that covers about \$1,250 per tooth to a maximum of \$2,500, which will help defray only a small portion of the total dental reconstruction costs.

"We're guessing it will be \$35,000 to \$40,000 for everything," Gail said, reiterating what the dental specialists estimate. "Hockey Manitoba will give us a maximum of \$2,500 and Manitoba Health right now is giving us \$10,000. So we'll still be down about \$30,000."

The family has been forced to take out a loan to pay the bills.

"We had to take out a loan for \$30,000 because everything has to be paid ahead of time," Gail said. "He's had to pay at the time of each appointment."

To help the family cope with the unexpected financial outlay, Clint's teammates, friends and a few family members are in the process of organizing a fundraising social, and they've also set up a GoFundMe page.

Clint will be donating any funds raised over and above what the family requires to a charity.

"It's unfortunate," said Gail. "I didn't realize how invasive this is going to be. It's going to be a long haul for Clint and it will be a painful process. I told Clint the fortunate thing is he didn't have a concussion from the incident, considering the damage and everything."

Despite the aggression and danger of hockey, Torfason said he'll be back on the ice this season to play his final year with the Ice Dawgs.

"There's always that thought in the back of your mind. Guys are very aggressive with their sticks on the ice," he said. "You got to be very smart and careful about it. That's all there is to it."

In September 2018, he'll be able to

eat corn on the cob.

"You kind of do get used to it [having no teeth]," he said. "But corn on the cob is not too easy to do."






