# Teen arrested after threats made against Selkirk high school

A 16-year-old St. Andrews boy was arrested Sunday night in connection with threats made on social media against students at high schools in both Selkirk and Winnipeg.

The threats, involving Kildonan-East Collegiate in Winnipeg and the Selkirk Comp, were made early Sunday

evening on Snapchat.

"I guess I'm going back to jail tomorrow I'm going to kill someone," part of the first post read.

A second post sent shortly after read: "Don't know how much people I am going to kill tomorrow."

RCMP spokesperson Sgt. Paul Manaigre said calls about the social media

post started coming in around 4:30 p.m. on Sunday. He said the St. Andrews teen was arrested for uttering threats.

"The RCMP takes these types of complaints seriously and the officers in Selkirk worked quickly to identify and locate the individual responsible," said Sgt. Paul Manaigre of the Manitoba RCMP. "We are continuing to work with the Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School and taking all the necessary steps to ensure the students and staff are safe at school.

"I can confirm with you that there are currently no safety concerns with the High School staff and students and that school officials have been kept up to date with the incident."

Lord Selkirk School Division Supt. Michele Polinuk said staff were informed of the threat towards the Selkirk Comp on Sunday evening and the teen, who she confirmed is a Selkirk high school student, was arrested shortly after.

"I'm just so thankful that the community and parents monitor their kids and social media because they are the ones who alerted police," Polinuk told the *Record* during a telephone interview on Monday morning. "I'm just very thankful for this community, for the community of parents and the RCMP.

"It's because of working together that we were able to have this resolved (Sunday) night."

Polinuk said parents of students at the local high school were notified of the threat via an automated call from the division.

Dozens of volunteers are teaming up to brighten up Selkirk's old downtown district along Manitoba Avenue.

The 75,000 Lights for the Darkest Days project aims to string Christmas lights across Manitoba Avenue, from the BMO Bank to Eveline Street. Volunteers started to unwrap 3,000 strings of lights on Monday, and the work was expected to continue for the next few days.

Gayle Halliwell, one of the organizers behind the event, said she got the idea while visiting her family in Napanee, Ontario.

"They started to light their downtown area ... Napanee is a town identical to Selkirk. People travel from all around Ontario to see it," Halliwell said. "They've experienced more interest, and a revitalization, but it's just so stunning."

Halliwell brough the idea to Shirley Muir, one of the organizers behind the upcoming Holiday Alley, who then started figuring out how this project could be brought to life.

# Selkirk couple raising awareness about acromegaly

When Adam Vagi started noticing changes in the size of his hands and feet in his early 20s, he didn't give it too much thought.

But over the span of a couple of years, Adam was forced to get his wedding ring resized several times and his shoe size went from a size eight to an 11.

In April 2014, at the age of 29, Adam was diagnosed with acromegaly, a rare disease in adults which is most commonly caused by a benign pituitary tumour, which leads to abnormal growth and enlargement of the hands, feet and facial features. It can also lead to increased spacing of teeth, headaches as well as problems with vision.

"Looking back on all of that ... if I would have known about the disease, I could have been diagnosed a lot earlier," the 33-year-old said while sitting inside his Selkirk home last Friday.

Not only does Adam and his wife Charity now know more about the disease, Adam was recently named a Manitoba acromegaly ambassador. The couple has since created a Facebook support group, "Acromegaly Manitoba," in an effort to raise more awareness and connect people in the province struggling with their own diagnosis.

"The biggest thing is if somebody does get the diagnosis and they do reach out I can guide them because I've been through it," Adam said. "I've had my ups and downs over the last four years for sure and this definitely is a different chapter in my life."

Acromegaly also has hidden family, work, social and psychological im-

pacts and often causes those affected to suffer in silence and isolation.

Adam said he'd never heard of the disease before so when he was diagnosed, he felt "lost and scared."

"We were scared, we were overwhelmed," Charity said. "I think we were a little scared to face the reality of a diagnosis. And everything we read on the Internet was a bit depressing.

"I think we were in a bit of denial."

Although between three and four million people are diagnosed with acromegaly each year, statistics show that at least 2,000 Canadians affected by the disease go undiagnosed, Adam said.

"When we are out and about we can almost pick people out who may have it because we now know what to look for," he added. "It's such a slow progression ... they figure I had it when I was 20."

Although Adam had brain surgery to remove 95 per cent of his benign pituitary tumour shortly after his diagnosis, the disease has affected the bone structure in his face, hands, feet, chest and hips.

Adam is currently on disability from his job as a constable with the Winnipeg Police Service. He is scheduled to undergo hip surgery in February to relieve some of his pain and discomfort and he's hoping to recover quickly so he can get back to work.

"Some days are good, some days are bad," he said. "My mobility is probably the top thing that is affecting me right now."

To keep his symptoms at bay, Adam is visited by a nurse every four weeks to receive two needle injections which

are meant to help block the growth hormone.

For an active person who used to go to the gym every day and play hockey, Charity said the disease has been tough on her husband both physically and mentally.

Charity believes mental health therapy needs to be made available for those living with rare diseases in Manitoba.

"It's just not offered so a lot of people are just left alone, confused, depressed, scared and I think that's part of our mission to raise awareness," she said.

Charity added one of the biggest misconceptions about the disease is that it makes people appear deformed or look like an "ogre."

"We know people who have acromegaly that don't look like they have acromegaly and we're surprised that they have it," she said. "So there's a bit of a misconception that you have to have those certain characteristics."

Charity said the disease is diagnosed with a very simple blood test, an IGF-1 blood test, something they are also hoping to raise more awareness about.

On Nov. 1, which was National Acromegaly Day, part of Charity's Facebook post read: "If you suspect that you may be suffering from acromegaly, or you think someone you know may have it, please don't hesitate to share the name of that test with them. It could save their lives. Because the truth is, my husband's day-to-day life is heavy. Really, really heavy. But had he gone undiagnosed, and gone untreated, he could have died. This disease does take lives....but I won't let it take Adam's."





# Local woman earns Canadian leader in mental health award

Bonny Wynnobel still remembers the first time she walked into the Selkirk Mental Health Centre.

She was a local high school student on a class field trip and during their tour she realized she wanted to work towards a career in mental health.

"I came to the centre and thought 'I kind of like this work,'" Wynnobel said. "Then I went into psychiatric nursing and here I am."

Wynnobel went on to start working at the centre as a psychiatric nurse in 1979. Today, 38 years later, she is currently the centre's acting director of operations.

"It's a fantastic place to work," the Selkirk resident said. "I work with many great people that help make change happen."

Wynnobel was recently named one of the 150 Leading Canadians in Mental Health by the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health. She received her award during an event on Oct. 23 in Alberta.

In April 2017, the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health launched a cross-Canada call for nominations of people influencing change in this area.

Wynnobel said she was both "shocked" and "surprised" when she found out she was among the list of

"That was the first thing, and then to be selected was rather humbling and a very great honour," she said. "I've really had the best career that anyone could ask for."

Over the span of her 38 years at the Selkirk Mental Health Centre, Wynnobel has helped shape her work-

After noticing a gap in training

and professional development, she became the centre's education coordinator, helping to integrate ideas around recovery and psychosocial rehabilitation into the centre's care practices.

She later took on the role of redevelopment co-ordinator and patient advocate and has led numerous redevelopment projects at the provincial facility, including the construction of the Tyndall Building, a 108-bed residential unit that provides people with individual rooms, private bathrooms and features natural light.

Wynnobel said one of the biggest changes to mental health she's noticed over the years is a more recovery oriented approach.

"Recovery oriented is that you are basically helping people to have hope that life can go on and the illness isn't their whole life," she said. "It's that message of hope."

What hasn't changed over the years however is the Selkirk centre's person and family centred approach, she

"You're hearing the person and not just treating them like an illness ... and helping them to reach out and discover themselves," she said.

Although earlier this year the Selkirk Mental Health Centre received exemplary status, the highest level of accreditation possible for a healthcare centre, Wynnobel said they are constantly looking at ways to improve.

"There's always ways to improve, particularly in mental health because mental health is still one of those areas that needs a lot of research," she said."We're having to try to help people be hopeful and be able to reach for their own recovery whatever that is for them."

Although she will retire in March 2018, Wynnobel said she plans to continue volunteering in the mental health field at the local level.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed my career, I couldn't ask for anything better," she said. "I've been privileged to actually work with the people who come to the centre."

The Selkirk Mental Health Centre is a 252-bed facility that provides specialized inpatient mental health and acquired brain injury treatment and rehabilitation services to Manitobans.

Services are provided through five specialized patient programs: Acute, Geriatric, Rehabilitation, Forensic and Acquired Brain Injury.

# RCMP urge motorists to buckle up

RCMP in Manitoba are reminding motorists to buckle up.

In the first 10 months of 2017, Manitoba RCMP have responded to numerous fatal motor vehicle collisions where the victim was not wearing a seatbelt and was ejected from the vehicle.

A review of all fatal collisions in Manitoba from Jan. 1, to Nov. 2, has determined that seatbelt use was a causal factor in 52 per cent of deaths.

"It is tragic that we are seeing such

a high number of fatalities due to the lack of seatbelt use," said Sgt. Paul Manaigre of the Manitoba RCMP. "This year, we have already seen 33 people lose their lives because they weren't wearing a seatbelt. Vehicles are designed and engineered with a life space that will protect occupants in a collision, but it only works if you are wearing your seatbelt."

The Manitoba RCMP is reminding the public to always wear their seatbelts, no matter the speed limit or distance travelled.

# Pawed Pals looks to build community based animal rescue centre

A local animal rescue organization is looking to build a centre for stray dogs and cats in Selkirk.

Pawed Pals Animal Rescue is hosting their Annual General Meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 28, at Selkirk United Church. The organization will be discussing what they accomplished in 2017 as well as a plan for construction of a new animal rescue centre.

Jo-Anne Wilson, Pawed Pals chairperson, says the centre will not only be a shelter, but an opportunity for community and area members to learn more about their pets.

"There's so much of a need for a centre like this," Wilson said. "This centre will not only be a place for animals that need a home, we want it to be a learning centre ... People can learn the importance of spaying and neutering your pets and responsible pet ownership ... The centre will be community based."

The centre will be built on a plot of land close to the Selkirk Transfer Station, on Whisky Ditch Road. The land was donated by Gary Polinuk, while his mother Doreen pledged more

than \$500,000 in cash towards the building's construction.

Doreen Polinuk said she donated the money because she believes Selkirk needs a place like this. A place where stray animals can call home.

"I've always been a pet lover, before my husband passed away, we had the airport. We've always had this need to care for pets ... I saw that some people were hosting 14 or 15 cats at a time, and it's a shame because these animals need a place to go ... We need a place where people can bring a stray, which they can't keep for whatever reason, to somewhere that can take care of them," Doreen said.

The centre will also host multiple community events, such as a Seniors Walk Dogs event, where community members will get to interact and learn about their pets in different ways.

Pawed Pals is still seeking additional community support before they break ground on the centre.

Their Annual General Meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 28 at the Selkirk United Church at 6:30 p.m. is open to the public.



# Connecting to Selkirk 'does not make financial sense,' Pike says

Public hearings regarding the St. Andrews wastewater plan were held last week.

Municipal board hearings took place at the St. Andrews Community Club. The hearings detailed the RM's plan to connect the municipality's wastewater to Winnipeg, as well as the option to connect to Selkirk's new wastewater treatment plant.

St. Andrews Mayor George Pike said their decision to connect to Winnipeg is a financially sound business decision.

"The cost to phase two residents remains the same, whether the St. An-

drews sewage goes north to Selkirk, or south to Winnipeg, it's \$7,390 for the required modifications," Pike said last week. "However, the additional to go to Selkirk will be an additional \$5.5 million, which will also apply an additional \$1.1 million to phase 3 ... (going to Selkirk) does not make financial sense."

The additional \$5.5 million cost to connect to Selkirk comes from a required force main pipeline that would travel around the city and connect to the city's new wastewater treatment plant directly.

According to a statement released by the City of Selkirk, the city's engi-

neers recommended that the system connect directly into the treatment plant. This is because the sewage system being constructed by the RM of St. Andrews is different than Selkirk's main sewage system.

St. Andrews resident Bruce Mellon, who attended one of the hearings last Thursday, said that he doesn't believe that the RM has done its due diligence in exploring the Selkirk option.

"That price quote from the RM (regarding the required pipeline to Selkirk) should be checked by a different engineering company ... Based on the evidence I provided, I do not believe that (St. Andrews council) had done

its due diligence regarding the Selkirk connection option," Mellon said.

Mellon also presented a letter from Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson, which appeared in the Nov. 2 edition of the *Record*, to the board last Thursday.

The final part of the statement read: "After reviewing the information provided to council, we believe that there may be further opportunities to make the City's proposal even more costeffective for St. Andrews residents. Should the RM ever want to discuss those options, we are always willing to work with our neighbours."

# Manitoba unveils hybrid model for distribution, sale of marijuana

The smoke has finally cleared surrounding Manitoba's plan for marijuana retail and distribution.

On Tuesday the province revealed how it plans to regulate, monitor and sell marijuana once it's legalized on July 1, 2018.

Manitoba's model will see the Liquor and Gaming Authority (LGA) given an expanded mandate to regulate the purchase, storage, distribution and retail of cannabis. The Manitoba Liquor and Lotteries Corporation (MBLL) will secure and track supply of cannabis sold in Manitoba, while the private

sector will operate all retail locations.

"Legalization of cannabis is a major shift in public policy and safety remains our top priority," Premier Brian Pallister stated in a release on Tuesday afternoon. "MBLL oversight of supply and distribution will ensure safety, and retail by the private sector will ensure competitiveness and accessibility which will help achieve our goal of getting gangs out of the cannabis business."

Private-sector retail supports the decision not to co-locate cannabis retail with the sale of alcohol, eliminates the need for immediate public invest-

ment in new storefronts and provides consumer choice through different retail experiences, the premier added.

"This approach is designed to meet our objectives of eliminating the black market, keeping cannabis out of the hands of youth and creating new opportunities in the marketplace," said Growth, Enterprise and Trade Minister Blaine Pedersen. "The private sector's role in encouraging competitive pricing supports these goals. At the same time, provincial oversight will help maintain supply chain integrity and prevent the diversion of product."

Provincial regulation of wholesaling, distribution and retail will be through LGA, the minister noted, and a regulatory framework and licensing regime is in development.

MBLL will be responsible for central administration, supply chain management and order processing. The Crown corporation will oversee the wholesale and distribution of product including leveraging economies of scale through bulk purchasing to undercut black-market pricing and sup-

port a diverse retail sector.

All cannabis sold in retail stores must be purchased from MBLL, which will source product from federally licensed producers. Safe storage and shipment of product will be managed through either MBLL-owned and operated facilities and/or contracted third parties licensed through the LGA.

"This is a step-by-step process," said Pallister.

The first step was introducing The Cannabis Harm Prevention Act to target drug-impaired driving and send a clear message that driving under the influence of cannabis is dangerous and unacceptable, he noted.

On July 27, the Manitoba government issued an expression of interest to determine market place interest and capability to provide services for the production, distribution and retail of cannabis. The 60 responses received indicated significant private-sector interest in participating in the emerging cannabis industry, the premier added. "There is still plenty of

work to do," he said.

The premier confirmed the province will be issuing a request for proposals seeking the opportunity to operate one or more retail locations. The deadline for submissions is Dec. 22, with initial locations to open July 2, 2018.

# Loaf and Honey continues with cheese-making tradition

Say cheese!

A catering company with local connections is stirring up interest in its efforts to carry forward a historical cheese-making tradition.

Dustin Peltier and Rachel Isaak have partnered up in life and in business with the launch of Loaf and Honey catering company. The culinary couple draws on decades of experience in the food industry to create mouthwatering meals and decadent desserts.

As part of their offerings, they have delved into making Trappist cheese using a recipe that dates back hundreds of years.

Last summer, Peltier spent time in a monastery Holland, Man., where he learned the technique from an 83-year-old Trappist monk named Brother Alberic. The monk, who has been making this cheese for more than five decades, is one of few people left in North America who still pursues the labour-intensive task.

After his experience in the monastery, Peltier

brought the newfound knowledge home to share with his partner.

"Brother Alberic was very adamant that I teach Rachel," said Peltier, who is originally from Woodlands. "He had taught a couple other people, but no one took it on. He was really happy that we have kids, so hopefully we can pass it on to them too."

As part of the production process, Brother Alberic created a fully enclosed cave-like cellar for the cheese to ripen.

"The cheese sits on wood planks for a month. Every day, he goes down to the cellar and washes each wheel by hand with a salt and culture brine. He flips them over and gets a feel for each cheese, and he finds out when they're ready by feel and look. Then the cheese sits for another month to age and cure a little bit more," Peltier said.

"In our test run, we're just going to have a dry walk-in fridge, so we won't be able to reenact that process exactly. But we're going to have some rocks and minerals in the fridge to get the mineral fla-

vours and that sense of breathing of the earth."

Since Trappist cheese is made with unpasteurized milk, the flavour is stronger than cheese made with pasteurized

"It's got a salty exterior and an edible rind on it," Isaak said, "and it's creamy in the middle."

Connoisseurs will notice that the flavour of Trappist cheese gets richer with age.

"The cheese is alive. It hasn't been pasteurized, so all of the enzymes and cultures are in there. It's always growing and changing," Peltier added.

"With the cheese, the good cultures are eating the bad bacteria. That's what gives it the ever-changing flavour. As this cheese ages for longer, it gets a deeper and richer flavour."

While they wade through the regulations for using unpasteurized milk, the couple is busy building a small test plant to set up in Woodlands.

"We also found a dairy farmer in the Woodlands area who has the same milk components that Brother Alberic uses," Peltier said. "The milk is very high in protein and fat, so we should be getting close to those same yields and characteristics in our cheese. That's very exciting for us."

If all goes according to plan, the couple's cheese should be available for purchase by March at DeLuca's in Winnipeg. Further in the future, they hope to open a storefront and small bakery in Woodlands while also supplying cheese to specialty stores and larger grocers.

In the meantime, Loaf and Honey is continuing with its

This year they are also collecting fanny packs, back packs or items that can be used in gift bags for children



# Veteran finds time to visit his comrades

John Malyna may not have gone overseas to fight during the Second World War, but he still found a way to serve his country.

After finishing his service in the army, while he was raising his family, he would find time to make veterans who were in the hospital feel a little less alone.

Malyna spent his later years visiting his fellow veterans in the hospital, helping them feel better about getting the care they needed.

"I made it my business to help them ... A lot of them were too proud to ask for help ... I remember this one veteran, he wouldn't eat any of the food that the nurses brought to him," Malyna said. "So I'd take the food from the nurse, and I'd open it in such a way that the (veteran) would get a nice whiff of a warm

"No matter how proud you are, your stomach doesn't lie, it forces you to eat," he added with a laugh.

He would find out about these veterans in the hospital by reading the newspaper and overhearing conversations at his church. Malyna said he tried to do a lot of things to help these veterans feel at ease.

"I did whatever I could to help these guys out," he said. "I would play cards with them, they'd have a

good game, and I would always lose. He wanted to serve his country. I'd lose on purpose. Having them win a bunch of card games, it helped them feel good, you know? ... They'd always say 'Wow, that was great! You coming to visit tomorrow?""

Malyna was born and raised in East Selkirk. He spent a lot of his time playing games with his friends, but he always wanted something more. 93-year-old said.

So he tried to enlist in the army to go fight for Canada during the Second World War.

"At the time, there wasn't much to do in East Selkirk ... But I wanted to serve my country, I wanted to do my part for Canada, so I moved to Winnipeg and tried to enlist," the now

"This was back in 1941, and since I was 17, they wouldn't let me join the army. I stayed in the reserves, till 1942, when I was sworn in. This was five days after my 18th birthday."

He started training at McGregor Armoury, before being deployed across the country, training to fight in Europe and Asia.

Malyna remembers how him and the rest of the sharpshooters of his training regiment would hold contests to see who was the best shot. They competed in a way that frustrated their trainers.

"They have a rifle range in the basement there ... the idea is to get that bullseye. So what we used to do, among the guys who were good shooters, after we'd get a bullseve, we used to compete among ourselves. You know the thumbtack that used to hold up the target? We'd aim for that ... So



clear their weapons, so someone could go pick up the target." He was stationed around North

America, in places such as Quebec and British Columbia. During this time, he took an interest in collecting patches around the world.

He started by collecting Canadian army patches.

# Community foundation gears up for 24 Hour Giving Challenge

maximum of \$2,000 each.

"So your \$5 donation becomes \$7. That's what's really special about the 24-Hour Giving Challenge, for that one day, your gift gets a top up, which benefits the community in so many ways," Henrikson said. "People

in this area are always extremely generous, but it's nice to know that on the day of the challenge there's that extra incentive, an extra gift from The Winnipeg Foundation and the Province, and that means a lot."

The SDCF is a charitable organization built through gifts from community members. The gifts are pooled


timate setting. He thinks it will give people a chance to connect with his music in a new way.



"It was huge," Evans stressed, noting he suffers from fibromyalgia. "I ate a lot of chicken, a lot of eggs, a lot of egg whites, broccoli and cauliflower."

To reward himself for his firstplace showing, Evans went out for some pizza and a beer.

But he will quickly be back at work in the gym as he prepares for the provincial bodybuilding competition in June.

Evans was joined at last month's competition by several local bodybuilders who also placed very well.
