

"It's only week one of our Checkstop and we're already seeing high numbers of intoxicated drivers behind the wheel," Inspt. Ed Moreland, Officer in Charge of Manitoba RCMP Traffic Services stated in a release last week. "Be assured that our officers will be out in full force over the holidays to stop and arrest any driver that decides to drive impaired.

for a safe ride home to avoid serious, and even fatal,

consequences." During the 2016 Holiday Checkstop program, which runs each year from Dec. 1 to Jan. 1, 122 people were charged with an Impaired Driving Offence and there were 60 alcohol or drug related tiered suspensions, according to RCMP.

A total of 46 people lost their lives due to impaired driving last year, three of them during the holiday sea-

To date in Manitoba in 2017, 76 people were killed and another 166 were seriously injured in motor vehicle collisions. Approximately 30 per cent of these deaths and injuries involved impaired driving, RCMP said.

"In the past decade, there has not been a single year when someone has not died on our road during the holiday," Moreland added. "One more death is too many."

RCMP want to remind motorists to not be a statistic, to buckle up, drive sober, put your phone down and drive for the conditions.

Community donates over \$58K during giving challenge

Gord Henrikson knows when you issue a challenge to Tri S folks, they respond in a big way.

And they did just that on Nov. 18 when they donated

\$58,005 to the Selkirk and District Community Foundation (SDCF) during Endow Manitoba's 24-hour Giving Challenge.

"The people in this community never cease to

amaze me, their hearts are in the right place and they never fail to step up when called upon for a good cause," Henrikson, chair of the SDCF, stated in a release last week. "The foundation is able to grant money to good causes in Selkirk, St. Clements and St. Andrews because of the generosity of this community.

"They deserve a round of applause for always supporting us."

An additional \$4,000 was added to the total, thanks to 'stretch' dollars from the Winnipeg Foundation and the Province of Manitoba, each of whom gave \$1 for every \$5 donated, up to a maximum of \$2,000 each.

This was the fourth year for the 24-Hour Challenge, and in years one and two, the SDCF brought in the most money is the province. Last year, Selkirk fell to second place, behind Pinawa, and the challenge was on this year with Selkirk looking to regain top spot.

They were bested once again by Pinawa, who raised a whopping \$90,951.

In 2014, the first year of the challenge, people donated \$25,688 to SDCF; in 2015, the amount rose to \$62,210 thanks to a large, one time donation from the RM of St. Andrews, and last year, donations totalled \$37,855.

When you add it all up, that's \$183,758 donated by the community to the foundation.

In 2014, Manitobans gave \$245,427 in the first 24-Hour Challenge and this year they donated \$893,449, including stretch dollars, to 52 community foundations.

Holiday Alley shines spotlight on local businesses, downtown revitalization

They may still be crunching the final numbers, but Holiday Alley brought in an estimated \$110,000 in revenue and several local businesses saw record sales during the two-day event, according to the winter festival's lead organizer.

Shirley Muir shared her Holiday Alley recap during the Selkirk Biz's 116th elections and annual general meeting last Wednesday evening at Selkirk's Riverside Grill.

Hundreds of volunteers helped put on the two-day event celebrating art, sound and creativity, which was held

on Dec. 1 and 2 in downtown Selkirk. On the Friday night alone, 3,000 people descended on the alley, Muir said.

"To some people this festival was just about having fun ... but the end game here is reviving and investing in the downtown," Muir said.

Although they brought in roughly \$110,000 in revenue, the event itself costed around the same amount but many local and area businesses, organizations and grants helped make it possible, Muir explained.

"Contrary some of the rumours you may have heard, no taxpayers dollars were used to light those buildings or to buy those lights," Muir said. "The city did provide lots of services in putting the man power out there to put the lights up but the lights were purchased with the seed money from the Selkirk foundation and the building owners themselves."

The event also benefitted downtown businesses, she said.

Throughout the two-day event, the Gary Theatre handed out 1,545 coupons and saw a 35 per cent increase in attendance, The Mighty Kiwi Juice Bar and Eatery saw a 260 per cent increase in sales, the Riverside Grill said they had record sales three times more than what they do in a typical day, and The Gypsy Traders said more than 1,000 people visited their store and they saw a 300 per cent increase in sales. The Gwen Fox Gallery saw a 500 per cent increase in sales on the Friday and a 1,000 per cent increase on the Saturday.

"Someone said 'people who have lived in this area their whole life and have never visited the art centre, were discovering a new place," Muir said.

The alley's chili cook off also had visitors and community members making their way in and out of various downtown businesses.

"It was non-stop busy," Muir said. "You had to shuffle through to look at stuff.

"This community was creating memories."

During the elections of officers portion of the meeting, Sylvia Magyar-Brambilla of Noventis Credit Union was named Selkirk Biz's incoming 2018 president.

"I've been in St. Andrews for over 20 years so I'm really excited to have this opportunity," Magyar-Brambilla said. "Selkirk is clearly on a upward trajectory through all the different events that are happening on a regular basis and all the new things that are being added like Holiday Alley."

Magyar-Brambilla is replacing Brett Mitchell of the *Selkirk Record*, who served as president for two one-year terms. Mitchell says he will continue his work with Selkirk Biz as one of the organization's 16 directors.

Joining Magyar-Brambilla is first vice-president Shawn Trudeau of Steeltown Ford, second vice-president Jenifer Bilsky of the Selkirk Journal along with roughly 16 other board members with ties to various local and area businesses and organizations.

The swearing in of Selkirk Biz's 2018 officers will take place at a later date.

Jackfish takes a bite out of angler

Hi, nice of you to drop in.

I guess it was about a month ago that I stopped at Smoke N Fish fishing gear shop in Selkirk to say hello.

As I pulled up to the curb I saw a crowd standing around a pickup truck with huge wooden sculptures of fish and eagles in the box. Rick Hall, the sculptor, from Hillside Beach, was standing beside his truck telling the media and an interested gathering how he went about creating these beautiful majestic renderings.

I waited my turn and eventually stood with Rick asking if he had an unusual fishing story. He was a remarkable man with his upbeat nature, darting eyes and rapid fire way of talking. We didn't have time to talk then so last Friday I called him and that friendly deep raspy voice that I remembered from Smoke N Fish boomed from the phone.

Ricks' subtle smiling face came back to me as he said, "I've been thinking of a story. I've got one."Years ago, he began, by Thompson with his brother Carl, some eastern Canadians asked if they would take them out ice fishing. Though it was early spring and in places there was a few inches of water on top of three feet of ice, Rick and Carl agreed to give them their first taste of winter fishing. So off they sped on their sleds across the melting snow to Setting Lake.

It was a beautiful sunny windless day as they pulled their augers off their sleighs, drilled holes, got baited hooks in the water and lunched on coffee and sandwiches. Suddenly one of the easterners eating a sandwich with one hand and holding his rod in the other had it almost ripped from his grasp. He excitedly pranced around the hole reeling in his first fish when the water spread from the head of a monstrous jackfish. The easterner instead of landing the jack by the gills shoved his bare hand into its mouth

and it clamped down hard! In a fit of pain he raised his arm with the fish dangling as blood appeared on his hand and the fishes head! Rick rushed forward grabbing the visitors' arm and the fishes' gills shouting, "Don't try to pull your hand out, the fishes teeth go inward; push your hand further in!" He did it and Rick sensing the move pulled on the gills making the fish open its mouth freeing the easterner's hand. He dropped the fish which fell tail first down the hole leaving a trace of blood on the water. Carl wrapped the injured guys' hand with the newspaper from the sandwiches holding it in place with his mitt.

Things settled down but no one was in the mood for any more fishing so they packed up and climbed on the sleds with the easterners sitting on the back. Now, Rick and Carl had a mischievous sense of humour and as they revved the sleds they shot glances at each other. Then both at the same time tore off straight for a thin layer of water on top of the thick ice. Icy water sprayed over the easterners as Rick and Carl screamed, "We're going to sink and drown!"The easterners were petrified and hung on for dear life. In minutes they were back on hard ice and soon at home. The guests climbed off the sleds vowing never to ice fish

Early last week I walked onto the ice on the downside of the Lockport locks. With my old reliable foot spikes on I stomped over to two guys as one of them pulled a mooneye out of his ice hole. "Mr. Lucky," Dave Barrett, a shorter fellow with a long brown beard and hair and lively nature shot a triumphant look at his buddy, Paul Turner, a taller easy going guy. "Dave's always lucky," Paul declared. We got to talking and because they had lived in Ontario, I asked how folks were dealing with Zebra Mussels. Dave said they had made the water clearer and devoid of algae blooms in Lake Erie.

Last weekend, on the ice pack a half mile from the Chalet Beach shore I headed toward a far off lone angler for a story for us. I walked alone with my thoughts, the picks of my spike shoes squealed as they ground into the glare ice, my strides wide against the tearing wind. It was hard to talk in the howling wind with our new brother, young, blond haired, Mark Lucas from Winnipeg when I got to him. He hadn't caught anything and didn't care, he said he loved being on the vast flat ice pack. "Soon there'll be hundreds of anglers out here," he said, "It won't be the same." I nodded, smiling, shook his hand and left him to his solitude.

the "B Strong Disaster Relief" fund. According to Vitt, roughly 98 per cent of the money will go directly to relief efforts in Puerto Rico.



Community Vigil Walk helps raise awareness, remember lost loved ones

Thirty community and area members braved the cold last Tuesday evening to walk in support of women and children who suffer from or who have lost their lives due to abuse.

The 11th annual Community Vigil Walk started from the Selkirk Friendship Centre and ended at city hall. Following the walk, which is put on by the Business and Professional Women's Club of Selkirk with help from the friendship centre and Nova House, attendees heard presentations from guest speakers, including Marie Walker.

Walker, a social worker who works in the Interlake, shared her story of her own daughter.

"I am a mother who knows the heartache of losing a child," Walker said. "In February of 2009, I lost my eldest child to a fentanyl overdose. I never felt like my daughter had any justice."

She went on to talk about how the police didn't take her concerns seriously, how the coroner's report said her daughter died of an overdose, but she was heavily beaten and bruised, and how she believes the police didn't investigate her daughter's death further

"It's scary as an Aboriginal woman,"

she said."It's scary anyways, but when you've got kids and grandkids, you have to be aware of your surroundings all the time. All the time. Especially with drugs, people are looking for easy money.

"You can't trust anybody."

The vigil concluded with reading the names of 10 women who have died in 2017. They also read the names of three women who died in 2016, as the details or investigations surround-

ing their deaths had not been made known to the public.

Elaine Elliott, the president of the Business and Professional Women's Club of Selkirk, said that she's glad that the number of deaths has gone down over the years.

"I wish it was zero, and maybe someday it will be," Elliott said. "I can recall when (a presenter) was reading out around 30 names of women who've been murdered. Now it's down to

10 names, but it shouldn't be any ... We need to provide counseling to the abused and the abuser, because they just throw the abuser in jail, and once they are released, they just do the same thing to another partner."

According to Statistics Canada, there were 1,191 cases of missing or murdered Aboriginal women in Canada between 1980 and 2012.

Nova House lunch and learn event explores forms of domestic violence

A Nova House lunch and learn event recently helped shed some light on the stigma that still surrounds domestic violence.

Nearly 10 community and area members attended the event on Nov. 22 at Selkirk United Church hosted by Lisa Karol, one of Nova House's core counsellors since 2005 and Tracy Curle, Nova House's outreach counsellor since 2014.

Karol said one of the main messages she wanted to get across is that not all forms of domestic abuse are physical. "In society we have this idea of what we think that domestic violence is," Karol said. "People think that domestic violence is physical abuse, it actually isn't just physical abuse.

"Abuse is where there is power and control, where somebody is trying to control another person by either physical, emotional or psychological means."

The types of abuse, Karol explains, includes physical, sexual, emotional, psychological, financial as well as spiritual or cultural.

Karol said lots of the women that reach out to Nova House don't always directly identify with domestic violence, instead they say they are having other feelings and aren't sure where to turn.

"We get a lot of people that maybe

call us because they are feeling depressed in their relationship, they're feeling stuck, they're feeling like they're not going anywhere, all of these different kinds of things are happening," she said. "I would say the psychological and emotional abuse are ones that people aren't really fully aware of because again it is that stigma that domestic violence is physical abuse.

"Physical abuse is so much more than your partner laying their hands on you."

Karol said Nova House clients often say "it's not always bad" but she explains that abuse is "a build up and wearing down of self."

Karol added domestic violence takes place in all different kinds of communities and impacts both men and women.


"Domestic violence doesn't discriminate," she said. "It is one of those things that isn't talked about ... but it is happening in our community."

Karol advises anyone who suspects a friend or family member may dealing with an abusive partner to practice healthy listening skills, to remain non-judgemental and provide information on how to reach a local crisis line

Vital Signs study to shed light on hidden challenges facing communities

Dozens of community members and local leaders gathered in Selkirk last week to share their ideas on how to move the region forward during the Selkirk and District Community Foundation's (SDCF) second Vital Signs town hall.

"This is the second part of our community engagement to create the Vital Signs report," SDCF executive director Beverley Clegg said during last Friday's gathering at Selkirk United Church. "We want to do this Vital Signs report but we want to make sure that it takes data and story to action and the action part is what's happening today."

More than 75 community foundations across Canada use Vital Signs studies to help determine where the gaps are in a community and to chart a path to address hidden challenges.

The first Vital Signs town hall in Selkirk was held last November. RCMP, Lord Selkirk School Division staff and students and other local leaders were in attendance last week.

Clegg said some of the common themes being discussed included poverty, housing, green space as well as arts and culture.

"The content gathered today is going to create those pieces in that Vital Signs report," Clegg said, adding collecting this type of data is invaluable to organizations like the SDCF and for the region. "It helps set priority, helps to set actions, hearing about the things that we are good at and the things as a community maybe we're not so great at but we're getting better and can get better."

The finished Vital Signs report is set to be released in mid-April of next year. Clegg added they are working closely with Probe Research on the data collection portion of the report.

"The great value of the data collection was it not only came from Census Canada but more importantly came from the region itself," Clegg said.

Cola and Brown Sugar Glazed Ham

Recipe courtesy of Anolon Gourmet Cookware

Servings: 14-16

11-12 pounds shank half bone-in cooked ham

large Anolon roasting pan

cups cola, divided

cups orange juice, divided

1/2 cup dark brown sugar

cup Dijon mustard

Heat oven to 350 F.

Trim skin and excess fat off ham. With sharp knife, score ham all over in diamond pattern. Place ham in roasting pan then pour 1 cup cola and 1 cup orange juice over it. Cover pan

with aluminum foil and roast 1 hour and 15 minutes.

While ham roasts, in medium saucepan, combine remaining cola, orange juice, brown sugar and Dijon mustard. Bring mixture to boil over medium-high heat and cook about 45-48 minutes, until reduced to 1 cup and mixture is slightly syrupy.

After ham roasts 1 hour and 15 minutes, remove foil and baste with glaze. Continue roasting and basting ham every 15 minutes with glaze until it is glossy and instant read thermometer inserted into thickest portion registers 145 F, about 1 hour and 15-30 minutes longer. Remove from oven and let rest 15-20 minutes before slicing.

12 ounces country ham, thinly

6 slices (about 6 ounces) sharp cheddar cheese

To make chutney: heat oil in skillet over medium heat. Add onion and ginger; cook, stirring occasionally, until slightly softened, 3-4 minutes.

Add curry powder and cinnamon; cook, stirring, 30 seconds. Stir in currants and cook until slightly softened, 2 minutes.

Add water and vinegar and cook until currants plump slightly, about 3 minutes.

Stir in sugar and cook 1 minute. Remove from heat and let cool 10 minutes. Stir in jelly, mustard and salt; refrigerate until ready to serve.

To make biscuits: Heat oven to 425 F. In large bowl, combine flour, baking powder, pepper, baking soda and salt. Using pastry blender, cut butter into flour mixture until it resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in buttermilk until mixture is moistened.

In bowl, knead dough 3-4 times to bring together. Press dough into disk and wrap in plastic wrap; refrigerate 20-30 minutes. On lightly floured surface, roll dough out to 1/2-inch thickness. Using 2-inch fluted biscuit cutter, start at outside edge of dough and cut out biscuits and set on baking sheet. Gently press dough scraps together and roll again to 1/2-inch thickness. Repeat to cut out 24 biscuits total. Brush tops of biscuits with egg yolk.

Bake biscuits in center of oven until puffed and tops are golden brown. Remove from oven and cool 15 minutes.

Split biscuits in half and set aside. Lay ham slices on cutting board in single layer. Using 2-inch fluted biscuit cutter, punch out 24 ham circles and place each on bottom half of biscuit. Lay cheese slices on cutting board and punch out 24 circles to place each on

top of ham. Spoon chutney evenly on top of each biscuit then replace top half of each biscuit.

Note: Biscuits can be assembled several hours ahead of serving and kept in refrigerator.

Add toppings, as desired. For classic deviled eggs, sprinkle paprika and chopped parsley over eggs. For a savory alternative, cook four strips of bacon and chop. Top eggs with chopped bacon and shredded cheese. For a unique variation, try topping eggs with cooked crab meat and chopped scallions.
