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Blaze destroys Hawthorn Estates in St. Clements

Owners plan to rebuild popular wedding venue

A St. Clements couple says they are devastated after the 1940s era barn they spent years transforming into a picturesque wedding venue burnt to the ground last Friday morning.

Hawthorn Estates owners Robert and Tammy Belanger say they were woken up around 6 a.m. on Friday by a vehicle honking in their driveway.

Robert said when he looked out the window, all he could see were flames coming from the barn.

"It's like a sick feeling in my stomach," Robert said while standing outside on his property last Friday afternoon. "It's like a nightmare."

He added three fire crews from Brokenhead, East Selkirk and Narol showed up to help battle the blaze, which started sometime during the night, but it was already too late.

"It was already gone, it was already engulfed, they couldn't save it," Robert said.

The couple sent an email to several couples last Friday morning informing them the barn had been destroyed by fire and that they would be getting their deposits back.

Jeff Ward and his fiancée Carly Brown were one of the couples who had booked their wedding there for October 2018.

"We were really looking forward to having our wedding there,"Ward said. "It's such a gorgeous piece of land and

the owners have been so great and accommodating.

"I suppose the silver lining here is ... we have time on our side."



Robert and Tammy bought their home in 2000 and then later purchased the historic barn from their neighbours across the street. After moving the barn on to their property close to their home in 2006, they spent two years fixing it up and transforming it into what became a popular and well-known wedding destination.

"We've had hundreds of weddings

since we opened three years ago and there were hundreds more to come cause they were booked for the next two years," Robert said. "Hawthorn Estates was so well-known in the province. Everything we did here was top shelf. All the vendors and photographers knew our place."

Thieves target homes being built in West St. Paul

A West St. Paul councillor says anyone building a new home in the RM should be on high alert after thieves targeted a number of homes under construction, including the one he is currently building.

"I'm building a new house right now, and the house was broken into and a bunch of stuff was stolen,"West St. Paul councillor Peter Campbell said on Monday.

Campbell's new house is being built at the Legend Estates development in West St. Paul off of Pipeline Road, approximately one kilometer north of the Perimeter Highway.

He said his new home was broken into in August and again in October of this year.

"General building supplies, electrical supplies, wires, and electrical boxes were all taken from the house," Campbell said. "They basically took anything valuable that wasn't bolted down."

He added he recently had a situation where he went to his new home and found strangers walking around

Campbell also said he knows of other residents in the area who have dealt with theft at houses under construction this year.

"There are other people out there for sure," he said. "One of the neighbours down the street had his place targeted as well."

CTV News reported that Sylvester Gajdamowicz, who is currently building a home in West St. Paul in the same area near Pipeline Road and Grassmere Road, had his home broken into in November and a \$13,000 trailer was stolen.

Gajdamowicz's new home was also broken into again last Thursday and thieves made off with the front end of his bobcat worth about \$3,000 and they also attempted to steal another

trailer but were unsuccessful.

Campbell said he has since put security cameras at his construction site, and he suggests others do the same if they have the means.

He also wants anyone building a home in West St. Paul to get to know the neighbours who live around the new home.

"Get your neighbours engaged in helping out," he said "They live there and they are there all the time so have them keep an eye out for you.

"They can be that extra set of eyes and ears when you are not around."

West St. Paul Mayor Bruce Henley said he and council are aware of recent thefts at homes under construction, and he said they are working with both local RCMP and the West St. Paul Citizens on Patrol program to try and find solutions.

"We're aware of it and it's not uncommon that thieves target homes under construction," Henley said. "It's an ongoing problem and a concern for home builders, for developers and for residents because they know that nobody is around and they know there are often materials available.

"It seems that as of late West St. Paul is a target because we have a lot of new homes under construction."

Henley said RCMP have told him that thieves often travel in vehicles with stolen license plates, so just getting a licence plate does not always help police.

"Of course we want to get a license plate but also get a good description of the vehicle and take a picture if possible," Henley said. "And if you see something suspicions call it in right away and don't' wait."

RCMP spokesperson Tara Seel said although RCMP know of a number of recent thefts in West St. Paul she said property crimes are actually down in West St. Paul so far this year.

"We did a review of crimes related to

property (this includes break and enters, theft, mischief damage to property) over the past three years," Seel said via email on Monday.

Seel said their review showed that from Sept. 1 to Dec. 12 in West St. Paul there were 51 cases of property crime in 2014 while in the same time period there were 53 in 2015, and 33 in 2016.

"The numbers are down considerably," Seel said via email. "However any amount of crime is concerning to local law enforcement.

"There is a lot of new construction in the area which can be attractive to thieves."

Seel said RCMP need the public's assistance to help stop theft and property crime both in urban and rural areas of Manitoba.

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Hep C treatment centre coming to Brokenhead


Chief says centre will help educate community members

A hepatitis C treatment centre coming to Brokenhead Ojibway Nation will be able to help those living with the disease and work to prevent others from contracting it, according to the community's chief.

Although an opening date is still up in the air, Chief Jim Bear says they are doing their part to iron out the details and hope to open sometime in late

Bear said the centre will have multiple goals, as it will work to assist

those living with hepatitis C, and will also test community members for the virus so they can receive treatment as quickly as possible if needed.

He also wants the centre to be a place where community members can learn ways to prevent contracting the virus.

"We have to look at prevention and education," Bear said. "We will work with staff to work on prevention, intervention and education as well as

According to the Canadian Liver Foundation, hepatitis C is a liver disease caused by the hepatitis C virus, which attacks the liver.

Many who become infected with hepatitis C never feel sick and go on to recover completely, while others with the disease can get a brief, acute illness that can lead to fatigue, loss of appetite and yellowing of the skin.

If a person's body is not able to

fight off the virus, they can develop chronic hepatitis, which can lead to cirrhosis, liver failure and even liver cancer later in life.

Hepatitic C can be transmitted when the blood of someone carrying the virus gets into the bloodstream of an uninfected person.

During a hepatitis C education symposium in BON on Nov. 29, Bear announced that a full hepatitis C treatment centre will be opening at the Brokenhead Grocery Pharmacy and Medical Clinic, which sits across from the South Beach Casino and Resort on Hwy. 59.

During the symposium health care professionals from across Canada, BON community members and others listened to presentations and spoke with one another about ways to treat, test for, and prevent hepatitis C in BON and in other First Nations communities.

According to CATIE, a Canadian source for HIV and hepatitis C information, seven to 10 out of every 100 Indigenous Peoples living in Canada has hepatitis C.

Bear said their new hepatitis C treatment centre will offer community members the opportunity to get tested for the virus in BON, rather than having to travel to larger centres such as Selkirk or Winni-

"It will be a place where people will come to get tested, get help and get education," he

Benoit Desjardins, a registered nurse with Liver Care Canada travelled from Ottawa to be at the symposium Nov. 29, and show how a FibroScan machine can quickly test for the disease and test for the progression of the virus in patients.

He said some of the social issues that can be prevalent in First Nations communities can lead to high numbers of First Nations community members contracting hepatitis C.

"Alcohol and drug abuse are often more rampant in some First Nations communities," Desjardins said. "The virus is passed through the transfer of blood, but if you are drinking or using drugs you are more likely to take part in risky behaviors that could lead to hepatitis C.


"It could be through the sharing of drug needles, or even by blood that has been left on equipment used to take drugs."

Desjardins said early detection of hepatitis C is crucial to help fight and stop the spread of the disease.

"You may have taken part in a lot of risky behaviuors in the last 20 years and then one day you find out you have Hep C," he said. "Often people have no idea how they got it."

The Canadian Liver Foundation calls hepatitis C "a silent disease" because often no symptoms appear until a person's liver is already severely

According to hepatitiseducation.ca of the nearly 300,000 people in Canada living with hepatitis C, 75 per cent had no symptoms when they first contracted it, 50 per cent currently don't know they have the disease, and 25 per cent will get liver disease if not treated.







Refugee family ready for first Christmas in Canada

Dozens of volunteers from multiple churches make up the Red River Churches Refugee Team (RRCRT), which helped bring the refugee family to Selkirk in late July.

The family includes mother Ache and her three sons Yaya, Habib, Awad and daughter Saida. Yaya is also joined by his wife Zara and their baby girl Maisoune.

Before coming to Canada, the family spent 11 years living in a refugee camp in Sudan.

The family now lives in a house in Selkirk which has been filled with donations from community members who have warmly welcomed them to the city.

Last Friday evening the family was busy decorating a small Christmas tree with donated lights and ornaments from Selkirk Walmart.

"We're excited," Yaya Ramadan said with a smile about celebrating Christ-

The family also experienced their first major snowfall earlier this month.

Yaya said they're finding the weather to be "very cold."

"I don't really like the snow but this is the first time," he said.

Some of the family members have also taken up a part time job this winter shovelling snow.

"I like it, it's good, it's fun, "Yaya said. "We want to work more."

The family is still working on their English and have been taking lessons

in Winnipeg since September.

Wilma Nicol, a volunteer with the RRCRT, said the family will be heading to her house for Christmas celebrations

Christmas Day. Another volunteer will host the family on Box-

ing Day and then the Selkirk United Church is hosting a special celebration for them on Jan. 1.

Since all of the family members don't officially have birth dates, they

celebrate their first birthdays in Canada all on the same day.

Nicol said they are making sure they will have birthday presents to open.

She added the amount of donations the family

has received from the community has been overwhelming.

"If we didn't have things donated we'd have to buy them," she said.

As for things they are currently in need of, Nicol said they are looking to gather some pairs of skates, some sleds and hockey sticks. They are also looking for more volunteers to drive the family around. For more information, visit rrcrteam.com.

She added although warm winter clothing has been donated to the family, they don't always wear it because they aren't used to the cold.

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Battling the storm

City crews spend days cleaning up after first major snowfall of the season

The first major snowstorm of the season fell on southern Manitoba last week forcing local schools to shut their doors, and City of Selkirk crews to spend days digging out the city.

"This snowfall was kind of unique because it just kept on coming," the city's director of operations Dan McDermid said. "The snow started last Monday night and carried right through till Wednesday, so the biggest challenge was that it was such a prolonged event."

McDermid said he estimates about 30 centimetres of snow fell in Selkirk between Dec. 5 and Dec. 7, and that forced snow removal crews to work "around the clock" to get the streets cleaned up.

"We had multiple guys starting at different hours to battle the storm because this snow kept coming," he said.

McDermid added the city was forced to plough some streets in the city as many as three times during the storm last week.

Anyone driving down Main Street or Manitoba Avenue in Selkirk last week may have noticed massive piles of snow along the sides of the roads with pylons surrounding them.

McDermid said those piles were used as a temporary solution before the city could haul that snow to their snow disposal site.

"We did that because of the amount of the snow," he said. "We had split the crews by that point so we could not get it all taken away while still trying

to maintain the streets."

City workers started hauling those piles away last Friday and were still busy taking the snow away on Monday, according to McDermid.

McDermid said it has been years since he has seen snow come down the way it did last week in Selkirk.

"It's been three or four years since I have seen snow like this," he said.

On Monday, McDermid could not yet say what it cost the city to dig out last week, and that he wouldn't know until later this week.

"It definitely has an effect on the budget, but we anticipate events like

All 15 schools in the Lord Selkirk School Division (LSSD) were closed on Dec. 6 and 7 due to the storm.

LSSD Supt. Scott Kwasnitza said about 75 per cent of the division's approximately 4,200 student's use school bus services to get to school on a daily

"In the division, if the buses aren't running the schools are closed to students,"Kwasnitza said."With the conditions on Tuesday and Wednesday the buses could not run."

He added that both students and staff across the division were not required to show up at schools in the division last Tuesday and Wednesday.

"If it's too dangerous for staff to drive to school then we close the schools for staff as well," he said. "We just felt it was too dangerous for our buses and also for our staff to get to school."

Man, talk about mowing the lawn one week and cranking up your snowmobile in a ice storm not long after.

On the bright side maybe we'll be able to go from open water fishing to ice fishing in a really short time. Ron Iverson of Balmoral, his brother Dale Iverson of Stonewall along with his buddy Wes Hurd of Gunton, who I met on the Red riverbank upstream of Selkirk a few weeks ago shared this sentiment. They were joking and teasing each other when I walked up to them and it never stopped until I was out of earshot later back in "old red". I asked Ron who was closest as we introduced ourselves, if he had caught anything, "not a darn thing," he responded, "my brother keeps on catching; I'm just here to look good."

Wes, chimed in, "yea, we pushed our way close to Dale making him move further downstream thinking we might get lucky too. That didn't work." As Wes and I shot the breeze for a bit we couldn't see Dale for the underbrush but we could hear him periodically breaking out in a happy growl over the sound of water splashing, which meant he had landed another fish.

"It's easy to get "ticked off" with Dale," Ron remarked, "he's always lucky and he's always a little smug about it."

Later, when I was about to leave our new friends I asked the guys to hold up some fish so I could take a picture of them. Dale, with a slight smirk offered, "sure, I guess we can use some of my fish."

Unfortunately there are times when I have to make a choice about which stories I will write which also means it gets very interesting when I meet someone who has offered a story but couldn't find it in our papers or on the internet. So it happened that I found myself some three weeks ago standing

in front of two guys, Stefan Stevens, and his son Warren from Stonewall on the Hnausa pier who with accusing looks pointed out, "we checked the Selkirk Record and the Stonewall Teulon Tribune and couldn't find our story."

I searched my mind trying to remember where I had met these fellows. Then it hit me.

Two tall guys with half-length beards and trappers caps on the ice last winter off Chalet Beach. They had been so gracious taking the time to talk to me even though they had been fishing on the ice all day and wanted to be on their way home. Here on the Hnausa pier I apologized for having to make a choice between Stefans' story and others and gentleman that he was offered another story where not long ago he was boat fishing on the Red and caught a huge sturgeon.

It literally dragged him and the boat upstream right up to the Lockport locks where he had to cut his line for fear of hitting the concrete lock di-

Being an open water angler at Balsam Bay is not that easy anymore but that doesn't stop our anglers. Last year one could fish over the metal water barrier but now a newly placed

rock water break is the only place to cast from and you better be part mountain goat. King Cob of Winnipeg, a not that tall, round faced chap with long straight brown hair thought he was one two weeks ago.

I stopped there to see who was catching what and when I met King he couldn't wait to tell me how he ventured out onto the rock barrier and got soaking wet. He had caught an eating sized pickerel and balancing on the rocks strung it and continued fishing. A few minutes later he noticed his caught fish slip the string but become corralled in a hollow of rocks with shallow water. King sprang to action sprinting from one rock to another down to the waters' edge to reclaim his fish. He should have remembered that wet rocks are slippery. Up went his feet and down King splashed into the water right up to his waist. To his credit he didn't lose sight of his objective, rolling to one side he reached over and grasped his fish holding it high as others on the rocks cheered his victory.

Well, with this cold our waterways are making two or three centimeters of ice cover a day; terrific.

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RCMP investigating after alleged break-in at YFC

Youth worker says nearly \$1K worth of items, cash were stolen

Dion Peterson can't understand how anyone would want to steal from an organization that he says does so much good for local youth.

"I feel disappointed that someone would steal from a non-profit organization that is so willing to give to the kids in this community and try our best to accommodate any needs they have," Peterson, a youth worker for Youth For Christ Selkirk (YFC) said last Sunday. "Why would somebody steal from us?"

Dion said that last Saturday around 1:35 a.m. the YFC Selkirk building located at 426 Clandeboye Ave. was broken into and thieves allegedly made off with two Xbox 360 video game machines, a cash box, pool balls and some canteen items.

Dion estimates the value of the stolen goods and cash at around \$1,000.

RCMP confirmed they have been made aware of the incident and are investigating.

Dion said the robbery last weekend will make it more challenging for them to assist local youth and they are always accepting donations from residents, businesses and organizations.

"If people feel the need to help supportYFC Selkirk any donations would be greatly appreciated, and yes it does affect us financially because the items stolen were used regularly and need to be replaced."

The centre accepts donations of cash, food and clothing and anyone that would like to make a donation or inquire about what kinds of dona-

tions are needed can call YFC Selkirk at 204-482-3435.

According to Dion, YFC offers "a safe comfortable environment where youth and teens are free to express themselves and have somebody to genuinely care and listen."

Youth who go to the centre can play video games, play pool and have lunch through their canteen lunch programs. They also offer junior high, alpha and high school drop in pro-

Dion, who is 24, added he joined YFC as a youth worker because he used to be a teenager who was "on the wrong

"I also grew up on the streets of Selkirk and understand how easy it is to follow the wrong path, and that's why I do what I do now, because YFC helped me turn away from a life of crime," he said.

In regards the alleged robbery, Dion said he can also understand there are different reasons and situations that can lead some to make bad decisions, and choose to commit crimes.

"It would be great to get what was stolen back and if people are willing to keep an eye open that would

be greatly appreciated," he said. "But more importantly to pray for the perpetrators that they find it in their heart to return the items because we would be willing to forgive and accept them into our program and do our best to meet their needs as well."

YFC Selkirk runs a junior and senior high drop in program on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., an alpha program on Wednesdays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., and a junior high free lunch program on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 11:45 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

On Monday morning Selkirk RCMP Cst. Jim Dao confirmed they have received a report about the incident and are investigating.

He said that as of Monday afternoon RCMP did not know how many suspects entered the building on Saturday morning, and they do not know the age or sex of any suspects.

Dao said the suspects allegedly gained entry through the east side door of the building.

Oak Hammock Marsh to host Christmas Bird Count

Bird enthusiasts will be flocking to Oak Hammock Marsh this weekend for the 117th annual Christmas Bird Count.

The event is one of more than 2,000 that will be held across North America between Dec. 14 and Jan. 5. Run in Canada by Bird Studies Canada and in the United States by the National Audubon Society, the annual count aims to help monitor North America's birds. Volunteers count birds that they see and hear within a circle that is a 24-kilometre diameter. Conservation biologists and naturalists use the data to monitor population trends and bird distribution. In total, more than 50,000 observers take part each year.

At Oak Hammock Marsh, this year's

bird count will take place on Saturday, Dec. 17 from 8 a.m. to noon, followed by a lunch. Prizes will be awarded for most birds, most species, and other categories.

No experience is needed since more experienced participants will take newcomers under their wing.

"It helps to get a snapshot of what is around at this time of year. It's done all across North America during the same two-and-a-half-week frame. That way, we get an idea of where all of the birds in North America are and if there are any changes," said resident naturalist Paula Grieef.

Original reclaimed wood from the barn was used throughout the interior to give it a rustic feel and large chandeliers hung from the ceiling.

On Sunday evening, Tammy and Robert emailed 20 of their clients to let them know that they plan to rebuild.

"It has now been 2 days since our tragic loss however the support that we have received and kind words have been amazing," the couple said via email.

They added they plan "to rebuild a venue that will be unique and one of a kind in a different way than our barn was."They said they are looking at being back up and running for January

"We will assure you that it will be

your special day," the couple said via email.

The cause of the fire is still being investigated and likely won't be known until sometime this week.

An Office of the Fire Commissioner member was seen on the property last Friday sifting through the rubble.

Robert said he wasn't sure if the cause of the fire was electrical or not.

"That's the first thing you think of ... but there was nothing left on," he said. "We're in here every night and everyday we check it all the time.

"Making sure everything's fine, that there's enough heat so we have no idea."

Robert added it's difficult to put a price tag on what they lost in the fire.

"We had some vintage antiques in there ... worth thousands of dollars, just gone," he said.

Dog pound passes inspection following complaint, city says

The City of Selkirk's Animal Retention Facility has been the temporary home to 202 dogs since 2013 and has had a high success rate when it comes to re-homing dogs in its care.

Out of the 202 dogs that came to the facility, either because they're running at large or have been relinquished by their owners, only two have been euthanized and in both cases it was due to medical reasons.

David Thorne, the city's director of protective services, said the two bylaw officers responsible for the animals brought in to the facility go above and beyond to make sure they are well cared for.

"Caring for the animals at the facility is the first task of their day. They go let the dogs out first thing in the morning and make sure the outside runs and inside kennels are clean, and they check on the animals several times throughout the day," Thorne said. "They care about the welfare of the animals in our care."

That care was evident when a provincial Animal Protection Officer (APO) performed an unannounced inspection of the facility last month. The APO was responding to a complaint to the Provincial Chief Veterinary Officer that dogs at the Selkirk facility were living in unsanitary conditions.

The APO found no concerns with the treatment of four large-breed dogs and two cats that were housed at the facility during the initial unannounced inspection and a follow up with Thorne and a bylaw officer a day

Thorne said he welcomed the inspection of the Animal Retention Fa-

"Our bylaw officers are meticulous about the cleanliness of the Retention Facility," Thorne said. "The standards laid out in the City's Bylaw and the Province's Animal Care Act are strictly adhered to."

The APO's report said the four dogs were in their own kennels, had food and fresh water as well as a dog bed to lie on. The APO learned that the bylaw officer who was looking after the dogs was actually on his day off, but still came in to care for them.

The APO's report said the dogs appeared to be"in good body condition" and they were "playful and seemed

Both of Selkirk's bylaw officers received training from the Chief Provincial Veterinarian's Office in relation to animal protection in 2014.

The Selkirk facility works with the Winnipeg Humane Society and other Winnipeg area shelters to find homes for animals that are not claimed or have been relinquished.

The four dogs that were in the facility recently had been there for an extended period of time. The Winnipeg Humane Society and other shelters that Selkirk deals with were all experiencing high volumes of dogs and no one could take them in. For that reason, the city cared for the dogs for two and a half months.

Thorne said all dogs have now been rehomed.



Silicon plant coming down



Local man helps missing senior find his way home

A local man's decision to drive to work in a winter storm last week could be the reason why an 82-yearold Winnipeg man will get to spend Christmas with his family.

Landon Navitka said he spotted a man walking down Highway 59, about 10 kilometres south of Victoria Beach, while on his way to work in Selkirk last Tuesday around 8:30 a.m.

"By the time I left ... it was fairly blistery almost white-out conditions," the Hillside Beach resident said. "And then I saw someone walking down the road.

"There was very limited visibility ... but as I got closer I realized he wasn't dressed appropriately for the weather"

Once he pulled over, Navitka said the man told him he was lost. He added the man "was covered in ice from head to toe."

"His face was frozen solid and he had his hands wrapped up pretty



tight in his pockets," he said. "He was not in very good shape.

"He was very disoriented."

Navitka then offered to drive him to a nearby gas station where they were able to contact police. Navitka was later told that the man was Charles McAulay who had been reported missing to Winnipeg Police last Monday night. "I'M JUST HAPPY HE'S OK AND GETS TO SPEND CHRISTMAS WITH HIS FAMILY."

McAulay left his home near Kenaston Boulevard in Winnipeg last Monday afternoon to pick up his truck from a nearby car dealership and got turned around on the roughly 10 minute drive home, he told *CBC News* last week.

McAulay then lost his way and started driving north near Traverse Bay when he suddenly swerved off the road into a nearby ditch full of ice, snow and water. Once he was able to get out, he decided to start walking and look for help along the highway during a winter storm. He reportedly walked about five kilometres before Navitka stopped and picked him up.

Navitka said since that day several

of McAulay's family members have reached out to him to thank him for what he did and for helping bring their husband, father and grandfather home safely.

McAulay was taken to hospital to recuperate last Tuesday and was released last Thursday morning, Navitka said.

"They've all been very appreciative and he has relatives from all over the world from what I can see and they're all very happy to have him back," Navitka said, adding he was told McAulay will soon get to meet his 10th grandchild.

Navitka said he travels Highway 59 almost everyday and this wasn't the first time he's pulled over to help someone in need.

"I'm always willing to lend a hand," he said with a laugh. "I've changed a couple tires."

He said he's glad he pulled over and was able to help McAulay.

"There's never really a good ending to these types of stories," he said. "I'm just happy he's OK and gets to spend Christmas with his family."

Anglers go head-to-head with fisheries envoy

Gimli and area fishers wrangled with a mediation company that was hired by the provincial government to tout the benefits of the open market it intends to cast fishers into next year.

If any of the 40 or so fishers were in favour of the Conservatives' plan to opt out of the federally run Freshwater Fish Marketing Corporation, they did not make a public declaration during a two-and-a-half-hour meeting on Dec. 1 at the Waterfront Centre when fisheries envoys Gerry Friesen and Perry Mohr from Signature Mediation took to the floor.

But those concerned about fish companies negatively affecting fishers' wages and small fishers' ability to sustain a viable operation certainly made their voices heard.

"Fifty years ago our fishermen were living in tin shacks and had a hard time paying their hydro bills," said long-time Lake Winnipeg fisher Brent Matechuk, referring to the gouging of fishers by fish companies before the advent of Freshwater in 1969 and the stabilisation of the industry. "Us guys under the FFMC are now living in half-million-dollar houses and we don't have any trouble paying our hydro bills. That's the difference. And that history proves my point."

It became clear that the envoys did not come to consult with fishers per se, but to break down opposition to the government's plan.

After an hour and a half of heated debate, Mohr admitted they were hired guns required to tell the province what it wants to hear:

"We've been given a job," said Mohr. "And I'll be honest with you...when I got hired, one the people that hired me, I said to him, 'What if I come back to you and tell you this is the worst idea in the world?' He said, 'That's not a viable option because the province has already made the decision.'"

How much the government is paying Signature Mediation to conduct meetings with fishers across the province

is unknown. A spokesperson for Sustainable Development said that may be "proprietary information" and provided nothing further by press time.

It's unclear what percentage of Manitoba's commercial fishers had asked the government to cut ties with Freshwater or whether the government had considered holding a referendum before announcing its intent to opt-out next year.

Kris Isfeld, fisher and spokesperson for Lake Winnipeg fishers, questioned Mohr's upbeat forecast (job creation, better prices than FFMC's, etc.) for fishers in an open market system, catching him off guard a number of times with fishery questions to which Mohr had no answer.

"Please research pre-1970," said Is-

Lake Winnipeg fisher Ray Isfeld voiced his opinion on what the provincial opt-out could mean to fishers' wages if private companies get the upper hand and drive Freshwater out of the game.

"So the Freshwater board will say it's \$2.00 a pound for pickerel," he said.

"The private guys come and pay \$2.50. Freshwater board goes belly up. The private guys come in and they pay \$1.50"

Mohr's personal success transitioning his Manitoba Pork Marketing company to the open market was discounted by fishers. He and fellow envoy Gerry Friesen used to work in the hog industry at the time the then Conservative government enacted a change in legislation (1996) that saw the industry move from single-desk marketing to dual marketing.

Isfeld asked Mohr how many Manitoba pork producers there were in 1994 before dual-marketing and how many remain today.

Mohr said there was a decline.

According to the Census of Agriculture, hog farms steadily declined between 2006 and 2011, from 1,188 to 590. Mostly small farms were affected.

A 2015 Manitoba Pig and Pork Industry study prepared for the University of Manitoba shows that number has declined to 550.

Mohr said based on the numbers of phone calls [unspecified] he has re-

ceived from the Gimli region, there is "a tremendous amount of optimism."

Isfeld disagreed, saying fishers are "very split" on the viability of the open market. "You guys are saying, 'Here's the potential plus side. Is the next part of your presentation about the potential negatives?"

Mohr agreed there may be some downsides to open marketing such as "additional costs to the system" and "some inefficiencies," but that there will be no shortage of companies wanting to buy their fish.

"If FFMC was paying you guys the best price in the world," said Mohr, "I don't think all of these buyers would be coming in here looking at this as an opportunity."

Isfeld asked Mohr how he knows what the best price in the world is because "you just said there is no known price out there for pickerel or for whitefish."

Mohr said a politician told him that fish prices will increase. At the same time, he said fishers' wages are of no concern to fish companies, only their own profits.

"Two or three times is what one of the politicians told us that you guys are going to get paid," said Mohr. "I heard the same thing in the hog industry and my knee-jerk reaction to that is, 'If it's too good to be true, it probably is.' There are people...looking at the Manitoba situation as an opportunity to come in and make money. All of these companies that are going to build here... are in it to make money. They're not looking at this to make the fishers more money. At the end of the day that might be one of the side effects, but they're in it to make money for themselves."

Lake Winnipeg fisher Chris Kristjanson broached the issue of potential regulatory changes to fishers' quotas.

"I really want to hear more what the province says that they want to do with the rules and regulations of my quota," he said. "I want to know now what my quotas, my family's quotas and my kids' quotas are worth, and what they're going to be worth on the decisions that the province makes."

"And there's a lot of smiles on a lot of faces," Pazdzierski said. "Lots of excitement."



Coding program helps students strengthen their skills

Local students are getting the chance to strengthen their math and problem solving skills among others thanks to a new computer coding program at Happy Thought School.

Grade 4 teacher Danielle Brodeur helped introduce the program to a small group of interested students last year and now more of them are jumping on board.

"I'm trying to get as many kids exposed to this as possible," Brodeur said while standing inside her classroom on Nov. 30. "I hope to see it in more schools and more classes."

Coding, which is what creates com-

puter software, apps and websites, helps students work on various skills including measurement, angles, reading, writing, teamwork, problem solving and critical thinking, Brodeur said.

"With our future everything is going towards technology and we aren't really teaching (students) computer programming or any of those skills so I thought I'd expose them to it now," she said. "Once they have been using code.org and finished the hour of code they can transfer those skills ... they can make their own games, videos or programs."

On Nov. 30, a large group of students

from grades three and four were busy solvproblems and creating their own computer games on laptops, while others attempted to move a circular blue robot the size of a baseball up a makeshift ramp made out cardboard.

"This new robot has gotten them very excited," Brodeur said. "Now they are being able to see those skills put into a real life situation and it's all handson."

Grade 3 student Blake Hallock, who was busy creating his computer game, said he's really been enjoying learning more about computer coding.

"It's just really, really fun," Hallock said with a smile. "It's just really cool."

Brodeur she didn't know anything about coding until she visited code.org two years ago. Although she said there's a bit of a

"learning curve," she is now trying to keep up with her students and figure it out along the way with them.

Brodeur, who has been teaching for six years, says technology is continuing to evolve and play an even greater role in the classroom.

"We use technology in every subject now and that's been changing over the years," she said, adding students are now being provided with more tablets than laptops as they have a better battery life and are more acces-

Brodeur said although some students struggle in certain subject areas, this coding program has helped build their confidence.

"They are good at something and I think it's something that they'll continue with after school."

She added in the future she believes coding will be available at every school division wide.

"I think schools will be teaching computer programming at an early age," she said. "I think that robotics are going to have a key place in schools as well.

"The possibilities are really endless and I don't even fully understand all the jobs that could be available to them in the future."

Mohr said if he came to this meeting to find that out, he's at the "wrong meeting." But in his opinion, quotas would likely increase in value.

Kristjanson said he'd "pass on that optimism."

Other issues such as the provincial role in price reporting, sales tracking, dealer licenses, quota monitoring, index netting, export permits and ecocertification gave rise to more heated debate, but no answers as to what will happen.

Speaking with *Express* before the meeting got underway, Hecla fisher Ivan Grimolfson said without FFMC and its packing plant in Riverton, which shoulders the cost of distributing fishers' catches, he would likely have to fold his nets for good.

"I'm not going to run all the way to St. Laurent or some place to sell my fish," said Grimolfson. "I'm not going to run all over Winnipeg and try to sell it." The envoys are to present recommendations to the province in the spring. The government said it will withdraw from FFMC in August, but did not confirm a date.

One fisher expressed concern about when the province will indicate a withdrawal date to which Mohr responded that without one, potential investors will not "start looking at this."

Former NDP Interlake MLA Clif Evans, who has attended several envoy meetings across the Interlake and sat in on Gimli's meeting, said, "The feds have not heard from the province on a set date for opt-out. All they talk about is August 17 or 18. There's nothing in writing from the province."

Evans was optimistic about Freshwater's ability to support Manitoba fishers once the province opts

"Right now they're [Freshwater] in the process of talking with fishers and others to set up contracts... to sign on with Freshwater."

Evans said the envoys' meeting in Fisher River

Dec. 2 was not a happy affair when the Express contacted him a few days later. Former Chief Lorne Cochrane had allegedly said he didn't consider the meeting a "consultation" and that any changes to their fishery have to be considered within their treaty rights.

Former NDP Minister of Conservation and Water Stewardship Tom Nevakshonoff, who has attended a number of envoy meetings, said he fears that the demise of the quota system in is the works and that northern fishers will suffer the most.

"They're [the Conservatives] setting up the fishery for a corporate takeover," said Nevakshonoff by phone. "The quota system was designed to maintain a core quota in communities."

Nevakshonoff said cabinet can change quota regulations"with the stroke of a pen."

'My greatest fear is that quotas will be posted on the open market," he said. "I think it's a conscious strategy by the Pallister government."




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






















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Portage pounds Selkirk at MJHL Showcase

Cranberry Granola Bars



1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped and pitted medjool dates

1 cup (250 mL) orange juice 1/4 cup (50 mL) soy or nut butter 1 tsp (5 mL) vanilla

1 tsp (5 mL) cinnamon

2 cups (500 mL) large flake oats 1/3 cup (75 mL) wheat germ

2 tbsp (25 mL) ground flaxseed 1/4 cup (60 mL) dried cranberries or raisins Directions

In a small saucepan, combine dates and orange juice. Bring to a gentle simmer over medium heat for about 5 minutes or until very soft. Add soy butter, vanilla and cinnamon and stir until smooth.

In a large bowl, combine oats, wheat germ, flaxseed and cranberries. Pour over date mixture and stir to combine. Spread into a parchment paper lined 8 inch (1.5 L) baking pan and press down evenly.

Bake in a 350 F (180 C) oven for about 25 minutes or until golden and firm to the touch. Let cool before cutting into bars.

Tip: Wrap bars individually for ease to pop into lunches. For a chewier bar, simply store in the refrigerator. These bars will last up to 1 week at room temperature or in the refrigerator.

Get some fresh air and exercise, **IERHA** suggests

Overwhelmed by the holidays? Are you ready for Christmas? The Interlake-Eastern Regional Healthy Authority (IERHA) has some tips and tricks to ensure everyone has a happy holiday.

Some people love the rush of the holiday bustle. It fills them with energy and joy. Others find it more troubling or have feelings of stress and anxiety or loss. But you have the power to let go of the struggle to get everything done. You can slow down, simplify and regain your values.

Share your feelings with loved ones. Be clear about your capabilities when it comes to the holiday rush and ask for help when you need it. Learning to say "no" can reduce feelings of frustration and resentment. Polite "I" statements can help frame a problem in the positive. Reducing activities by planning one thing at a time is less overwhelming. Start a journal to help process your feelings. Or regain an attitude of gratitude by starting a list of things you're thankful for.

Adjust your expectations. If you're too stressed to hold a party this year, let someone else do it. Let go of 'all or nothing' thinking and perfectionism. People won't even notice a little dust or dirt on the floor with a couple of decorations and good company. If you start to fret ask yourself,"Will this matter in five years?"

Values: What does the season mean to you? Peace, joy, love, generosity, sacredness, forgiveness ... When your holiday plans align with your values, that's authenticity. What did you like in years past? What didn't bring you joy? Let go of "should;" choose which events to attend and which to say "no" to, graciously. You can start your own inexpensive holiday traditions like camping in the basement, board game nights, or singing songs before dinner. You can also spend time with your family or friends while volunteering. Whether helping at a food bank, delivering hampers, or visiting an animal shelter, volunteering is a win-win situation.

Relax. Whether you're out shopping



or preparing a meal, breathe deeply, slow down and be true to yourself. Offer someone a place in line or help with their groceries. Smile. It'll make you and the people around you feel better. Take a break. Make a point of being in the present. Notice the little positives - a baby's laugh, a friend's smile, the smell of cinnamon, frosty air, rosy cheeks, the jingle of a bell ... It's the little things that add up and make the day meaningful. Schedule yourself some 'me' time. Meditate, pray, use progressive muscle relaxation, do yoga or listen to guided imagery. For those tech-savvy folks, there are numerous mindfulness apps, like Calm in the Storm by Klinic.

Regular healthy habits and stress reduction tips work for the holiday season as well. Grandma was right go outside and get some fresh air and exercise. Exercise is one of the best stress relievers there is. Go for a walk, go sledding, or make snow angels, snow forts and snowmen. Remember to laugh and have fun. When you're back inside breathe deeply and enjoy the moment. Too cold to go outside? Turn up the dance tunes and get everyone involved. Then slow down the music and stretch it out.

A packed social calendar leads to increased stress when it affects our sleep. We all know too little sleep leaves us feeling irritable. Dimming the lights and turning off the screens (TV, laptops and phones) an hour before bed encourages relaxation and a better sleep. Most of us know having caffeine in the evening can keep us awake; for a list of food sources of caffeine see Dietitians of Canada. Alcohol can also disrupt sleep cycles.

Healthy eating will help you avoid sugar highs and lows and maintain a more even mood. If you eat a good quality breakfast and don't skip meals, you'll be less likely to over-indulge. Even though it's winter, make sure to stay hydrated.

Plan and organize to keep it simple. Does some of your holiday stress arise from 'not enough time?' An obvious solution is to just do less; here's where learning to say "no" really helps. Beat stress by planning specific days for shopping and baking or regain some of your time by delegating half the shopping and chores.

During the holidays there is pressure to splurge. Make a menu, a list, and a budget, and stick to it like glue to avoid the January money blues. Financial experts often suggest shopping without your credit cards. If you take only the amount of cash needed, you won't be tempted to buy extras. Sticking diligently to the list ultimately makes life less cluttered. If you want to take your planning a step further, open a savings account in January and make small deposits all year long for the following December.

Menu planning virtually eliminates last minute guessing and extra shopping. We often underestimate the amount of food that goes to waste, but if you plan your meals you can easily use up your leftovers. Having a cookie swap, with friends or coworkers, increases variety and saves time for everyone. Why not preorder? Many stores will take orders for turkey or other holiday treats and have them ready for pick up. And if you prebook that massage or schedule some 'me time,' you'll thank yourself later!

Decorating is a great example of when less is more. It's also a great time to involve the kids.
