Volunteers set to tackle busy time of year

The Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen, which runs out of Memorial Hall in Selkirk, has had a busy year making sure that everyone in our community has a place to go for a meal.

The year started out with COVID-19 restrictions limiting them to take-outonly service, however, they were once again able host sit-down meals later in the year.

"Every year is a great year of serving our community. We see the need every day. We see the need for meals and we try as best we can to support people," said Barb Pasaur, co-coordinator of Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen.

She says that this year, like every year, has been consistently busy but that she does worry about the people in the community that could use their services but that they aren't able to reach.

"For some people, it's a great dis-

tance, or they struggle with mobility issues and can't get to us. That's been the hardest part about this is knowing that there are people out there who could use a meal every day, but that we can't reach them because we don't have the ability to do outreach," she said.

They have continued to support the community in the ways that they can, in addition to providing meals, by also providing some basic non-perishable food items that residents can receive every Thursday along with their meals.

"We have our clientele go through our storeroom and pick out what groceries they can use. We do a lot of this because we get bread and pastry and such from both Safeway and Co-op that we get to giveaway," said Pasaur.

The soup kitchen's hours are Monday to Friday 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Before 11 a.m. they offer a light snack

like a coffee and a muffin. At 11 a.m. lunch is served. The menu changes daily depending on what donations they have received recently.

Because the holiday season is fast approaching the group of volunteers is once again gearing up for their Christmas dinner which will be served on Dec. 22.

"It'll be the same hours as the normal

soup kitchen day but this year we are doing gift cards for our clients. We're doing grocery gift cards, instead of hampers as we found hampers to be just one of those things where you're making decisions for people and we don't really know exactly what kind of food they like," said Pasaur.



In addition to receiving a warm ham, potato, and gravy dinner with dessert and a grocery store gift card, they have also put together some small stockings for the children of the families that use their service.

Of course, the volunteers that keep the whole operation going also have to celebrate the holidays with their families but they are keeping the disruption to meal services to a minimum. The only day that meal services won't be happening is Boxing Day. Services won't skip a beat around New Year at all with the first day of meals taking place on January 2 as normal.

Be cause of the continued service, they will continue to require donations from residents and businesses in the community to keep everyone fed.

"We're always looking for food donations . . . [and] we never turned down money, of course, because every charity needs money. We spend a lot of money on groceries and it fills the cupboards back up because we're getting kind of lean on the usual things like soup and pasta and stuff like that," said Pasaur.

If you have the ability to donate non-perishable food items or to give a monetary donation Pasaur says that the easiest way to connect with them is to drop it off at Memorial Hall during soup kitchen hours.

She also encourages people to spread the word about this service throughout the community so that more people know about it and to stop by to see the work that they do even if you aren't in need.

"I would encourage people to come down and actually look at the soup kitchen. Come down and see what we do and you even have to donate just come down and see what we do. Bring the kids and show them what volunteering is all about," said Pasaur.

St. Andrews School students help creating Big Hearts Hampers

Many students learn about the people in our communities who give back to others at this time of year when they collect food or supplies to help out our community. The grade four and five students at St. Andrews School not only donated but got to volunteering this year by helping to put together hampers for the Big Hearts Christmas Hamper Program.

"Big Hearts reached out to some schools in the division, looking to see if we could set up a donation process. Some of those efforts had gone by the wayside during COVID and a colleague [of mine and I] said that we'd like to do it but we'd like to make it a learning opportunity for our classes, in terms of philanthropy, and also understanding that there are kids and families that struggle at this time of the year, because of financial situations," said St. Andrews School teacher Tricia Hallson.

The whole school got together and raised almost \$600 and donated three truckloads of food, toys, and hygiene items for the hamper drive through a three-week giving campaign.

"The response was immediate, as soon as we put it out the call that first week was incredible.



We had to call Big Hearts to come and do an early pickup because we didn't have a place more to put further donations," said Hallson.

Not only did the school show how generous the people of our region are when we work together but the students got to learn that donating time is often just as valuable as donating

financially.

"Our fifth grade went in the morning and the fourth grade in the afternoon and basically both had the same objective in mind. Each class went for two hours to go and be the crew packing hampers and helping with that aspect of things, said Hallson.

The volunteers at Big Hearts

had already sorted all of the donations by the time the kids arrived and the students, separated into teams, then filled all of the hampers with essential items so that they could help to get as many hampers out of the door as possible.

"Their efforts were absolutely amazing. These kids were such hard workers. The entire two



Equine assisted learning program selling calendars

Help support local program by buying a 2023 calendar

Victoria Morse is setting up an equine assisted learning program out of Hearthstone Stables in St. Andrews. This program, which will start in the new year, aims to help young people by having them work with horses. Because Morse wants to be able to offer this opportunity to many at risk youth, she is selling 2023 calendars that will support more kids taking part.

"Our Equine Assisted Learning Program is going to target at risk youth because I grew up as a person who definitely fell into the category of at risk youth. I mean, it's a pretty wide umbrella really and I was blessed enough to grow up in a, as much as it was dysfunctional family, it was a family that had horses. And, to the very core of my being, I am very passionate about the healing impact horses can have on people," said Morse.

To that end, Morse has been certified as an Equine Assisted Learning Facilitator and wants to help children who would benefit from spending time learning about and from horses.

"Everybody says, 'Oh, God doesn't make mistakes.' Well, I believe that was the only mistake God ever made

hours was a constant effort, with everybody feeling very purposeful. I think they took it very seriously and they would make comments about how they were excited about helping people," said Hallson.

She says it's good for the kids to be involved with projects like this because until they are involved sometimes they don't fully understand projects like this.

"They don't necessarily conceptualize things until they're hands-on and considering the entire impact that it has on a person. You can read kids a story, you can tell them about how it is, or show them a video, but it's not ever quite the same as involving them. I think the greater lesson is the feeling inside that they get from volunteering, from contributing, and from donating. And, I already know from teaching this age, that

this is the kind of people I think innately that these young kids are and I think that just gives them a chance to shine and show their best," said Hallson.

She hopes that future students will be able to be involved in projects like this in future years.

Hallson also wanted to give a big thank you to our local Dairy Queen who donated ice cream

to the h a r d w o r k i n g kids at the end of their efforts. and the kind of pain that goes with that, I don't think that that's something that's passed away with another generation or two. I think there are still kids out there that don't believe they have a future, they don't believe they have any hope and their self-esteem is low. They don't have any selfconfidence and this kind of program changes their lives. I've seen it absolutely change lives and I think that we're at a jumping-off place in our society where people are beginning to understand that," she said.

Morse says that the whole point of the program is to have the children engage with the horses and the horse engage with them.

"We're predators and they're prey animals, so, their very existence depends on them knowing what's going on in the other beings around them. They can read us; they can hear our heartbeat from 50 feet away; they know if our breathing changes; they know what we need. If we step up to them, they will give us what they think we need," she said.

From there Morse says that the students in the program can apply the skills that they learn to their other relationships and life

situations. Currently, the program hasn't started yet, however, she hopes to get it up and running for its first six-week session for 11 to 16-yearolds in February. In order to run a program like this Morse says that it can be too expensive for the parents of some of the kids that need it since at risk youth come from a variety of family situations. To that end, she is hoping that the community can help her to offer some students who really need access to the program at a reduced cost by purchasing 2023 calendars.

"We'd thrown around a bunch of ideas and the first thing that we came up with was this calendar. The calendar pictures are taken by a 15-yearold girl [Taegan Lippoway] who goes to the Comp. They're her view of the world, how she sees it and she loves horses," said Morse.

The calendars cost \$20 each with a \$3.89 shipping fee for those that would like their copy mailed to them and can be purchased at the Hearthstone Stables website, https:// hearthstonestables.ca/ as well as by contacting Morse at 204-894-7595. She says that people who pick up their copies can pay cash but they also have e-transfer and paypal options.



The next morning, Acacia woke up and ran downstairs with her little sister. She looked into the livingroom and blinked. There beside the tree was the train-set!



was a lot of art in our home and I wanted to do it, but I wasn't ever very good at drawing," said Boyd. "So I thought, 'Okay, it's not for


me,' and I graduated high school. I got a job and then I ran into another

He also wanted to have his art in a place like WishMe because of the support that they give to artists in the community.





Closely examine new holiday toys for potential hazards



Health Canada is reminding holiday shoppers to closely examine children's toys for potential safety hazards.

Toys can contain components such as button batteries or magnets that can be swallowed and cause serious injury or death. Gifts for older children and adults might also contain small pieces that can cause injury to small children.

"Look for sturdy, well-made toys that are appropriate for your child's age, size and abilities," said Health Canada product safety officer Susan Talbot in a safety message. "Many toys contain small parts that make them unsafe for younger children. Some playthings that come to mind

are puzzles and building blocks that have small pieces, or toys with battery compartments that don't close securely."

Talbot said there are a number of toy safety tips people can keep in mind such as following the safety messages and instructions that come with toys, considering toys that have battery compartments which require screws rather than slide-to-open levers, throwing out or recycling all toy packaging like plastic bags, plastic wrap, foam, staples, ties and protective film right away as a child can suffocate or choke on these items, and teaching children how to safely use their new toys.

Manitoba 511 is a free traveller information service operated by the Manitoba government. The service is available by phone, computer and mobile device. In 2021, there were approximately six million visits to the Manitoba 511 site and telephone line.

Manitoba 511 can be accessed on a computer or mobile device by visiting the Manitoba 511 website at: www. manitoba511.ca or by downloading the app to a mobile device. It can also be accessed toll-free (within Manitoba) by calling 511.

Current users of the Manitoba 511 app will receive an automatic update when it is launched today. Users who do not have the auto-update feature enabled on mobile devices will need to update the app.

Travellers should always check the Manitoba 511 website for current road conditions to ensure safety prior to making the decision to travel. The





Most pet parents agree: their animals are part of what makes the holiday season so magical. While it's an excellent opportunity to integrate furry family members into all the special holiday traditions and make memories together, there are a few things you should keep in mind to keep your pet safe and healthy throughout the festivities:

Opt for pet-friendly decorations: Many favorite holiday decorations need to be kept out of pets' reach. Mistletoe, pine needles, ivy garland, holly, lilies and poinsettias can be toxic to pets when consumed. This is why I recommend artificial Christmas trees to those with particularly curious pets that like to chew on plants. If you don't choose an artificial tree, it's important to note that some water additives for real trees can be toxic, so you should make sure your pet can't access this water source. When decorating your tree, it's best to avoid tinsel and breakable ornaments to prevent potential hazards, and you should always secure

your tree to prevent a climbing cat from tipping it over.

Keep pets warm and dry: As the weather gets colder, pets may need a few extra layers to stay comfortable and safe while outdoors. Booties can help prevent a pup's paws from getting ice in them and offer protection from salt-treated walkways. At home, use pet-safe ice melt rather than salt, which can be irritating to pets' paws, mouths and stomachs. You can keep them feeling warm and looking stylish on winter adventures with sweaters and jackets. A cozy handwarmer lead will help keep you warm as well while you're out and about. When you return home, always dry off their coats and paws to remove debris and ice clumps in fur and between paw pads.

• Choose and wrap gifts wisely: Make sure pets only have access to and open presents while supervised so they don't ingest any paper or tape. I recommend sticking to wrapping paper for pet gifts, as ribbons, bows and accessories can be dangerous when ingested.

• Be aware of toxic holiday foods: Common holiday foods such as chocolate, turkey skin and bones, ham, grapes and raisins, garlic, caf-

feine, alcohol, onions, certain spices and sweets, especially any containing xylitol, should be avoided. For festive pet-safe foods, there is a variety of sweet and savory dog treats just for the holidays. If you think your pet has accidentally ingested a toxic food or other material, contact your veterinarian immediately.

Prioritize pet health and wellness: Involving pets in holiday traditions can mean taking them along for a road trip, introducing them to new people or staying in unfamiliar environments-all things that can cause anxiety in pets. It's important to keep your pet's mental health top of mind during the holiday season and yearround. When possible, pets should be introduced to new people and pets in a neutral environment, individually and at their own pace. For pets that experience anxiety in the car, practicing with short drives or sitting in the car while parked, followed by treats and positive reinforcement, can help the adjustment and prepare them for a long ride. Calming products can help mitigate anxiety in pets, and you can also consult your veterinarian for anxiety or motion sickness treatments to help make travel easier. Training in advance of any holiday plans is also a good idea.





To make marinade: In large bowl, combine lemon juice, olive oil, oregano and garlic.

Lay steak in flat container with sides and pour marinade over steak. Marinate at least 20 minutes, or up to 24 hours, turning several times.

To make yogurt sauce: Combine cucumber, yogurt, lemon juice, dill, garlic and salt. Set yogurt sauce aside at least 15 minutes to blend flavors. Sauce can be prepared up to 1 hour in advance and refrigerated.

Preheat broiler to high with rack 3 inches from heat source.

Broil steak about 10 minutes on each side to minimum internal temperature of 145 F. Let cool 5 minutes before carving.

Slice thinly across grain into 12 slices. Serve three slices with 1/2 cup yogurt

sauce. Tip: Serve in sandwich with pita bread, lettuce and tomato.

Teriyaki-Glazed Salmon with Stir-Fried Vegetables

1 tablespoon scallions, rinsed and minced

1 tablespoon light soy sauce

Preheat oven to 350 F. To prepare salmon: Mix terivaki sauce,

mirin, rice vinegar, scallions and ginger well. Pour over salmon and marinate 10-15 minutes.

Remove salmon from marinade.

Place salmon on baking sheet. Bake 10-15 minutes, or until fish flakes easily with fork in thickest part and reaches minimum internal temperature of 145 F.

To prepare vegetables: Thaw frozen vegetables in microwave or place bag in bowl of hot water about 10 minutes. In large wok or saute pan, heat oil. Add garlic, ginger and scallions; cook gently, but do not brown, 30-60 seconds.

Add vegetables and continue stir-frying 2-3 minutes, or until heated through. Add sov sauce.

Serve one piece of salmon with 1 cup vegetables.

Ask the Money Lady

Dear Money Lady – I have not topped up my TFSA, should I do it now in December or wait until January?

Ken

Great question Ken - I think a lot of people are wondering this too. I don't believe in timing the stock market; however, December and January have specific attributes that the other months of the year just don't have. So, let's talk about that Ken.

For those of you that regularly invest in the equity markets, you may have noticed that your portfolio always takes a bit of a hit at the end of November. This is due to the month-end pension fund portfolio rebalancing done by large mutual fund companies and institutional managed accounts. Typically, markets are always headed into a bit of a soft patch towards the Christmas season, and we should expect a slight pullback. Often viewed by advisors as the "sweet-month," this is usually a good time to put money into the market to continue to build a higher return anticipated to come in the new year. We expect a 1-2.3% pullback this month and for those that have not contributed yet to their RRSP or your TFSA, now would be the time to continue putting money into the market to work for you next year in 2023. If we look at the past as an example, December tends to gain strength towards the end of the month as we go into January, with an average monthly gain expected to be 1.67 per cent this year. The odds still favour a small "up" month-end price increase, despite the inauspicious last few months and possible looming recession.

Another thing to keep in mind if you are thinking of investing at the end of the year is the "January Effect," which is often viewed as a seasonal increase in stock prices. Since 1928, analysts have been tracking stock movement and have found that the S&P tends to rise on average 60.5% of the time in January alone. Analysts who have studied this theory (economic data of market trends from 1905 to 2005) speculate that January has a 4-6 times greater increase in stock performance

One theory is that many investors tend to sell high-year-end stock in December due to capital gains tax and then purchase weaker stock picks in January. It is my view that year end selloffs tend to attract January buyers interested in low price deals which then in turn drive the stock up again. Investors usually know that the drop in stock prices in December is not based on corporate fundamentals, but rather tax loss harvesting, and therefore prices get driven up abnormally higher in January due to buying frenzies.

I am the first to suggest that you should never try to "time the market" when planning to invest, however the stats from tracking December to January buy/sell movements over the last 100 years, speak volumes. Talk to your advisor. This new year in 2023, with all the concerns of food supplies, inflation, unemployment, and the war in Ukraine, has been predicted by economists to only have a nominal increase of approximately 1.7% to the global GDP. While I agree that this is indeed low based on previous years, it is not too bad. This is the time to "tuck-in," and make that financial plan and spending budget for next year. The markets will be choppy in the coming year so if you can, invest with your advisor to capitalize on buying opportunities. For others, it is now the time to finally pay off your debts, lines of credit, personal loans and financed toys and vehicles. I know many believe that saving isn't easy and for some impossible. 




